

New Congress' Agenda

The 109th Congress was gaveled into existence on January 4th and we have many important and seemingly intractable issues to tackle. Naturally, terrorism and Iraq top the list of concerns, but here are some of the leading domestic issues I will be working on this year and the next.

Social Security Reform

The Social Security system is facing a long-term funding problem, and there is broad agreement that reforms will be necessary as the baby boom generation begins to retire. Unfortunately, there is no agreement on what form any changes should take, and I've found 6th District residents to be skeptical of any adjustments.

Those currently retired or nearing retirement can rest assured that they will be protected. For everybody else, it's better to act sooner rather than later so that necessary adjustments can be made gradually and so that everybody has plenty of time to plan ahead.

I think we should consider various approaches to the Social Security funding problem. I have my own bill which would provide long-term support for Social Security without diverting payroll taxes, cutting benefits or raising the retirement age.

Health Care

One of today's greatest worries is finding quality health care at an affordable price. Congress is pursuing a variety of improvements designed to provide relief. Included in this are President Bush's efforts to limit the cost of the high malpractice insurance rates which many medical specialists have to pay.

I have been working on making it easier for small businesses to pool their insurance purchases in order to benefit from group rates.

Tax Reform

Experts agree that our tax system is horribly convoluted and that fundamental reform could do a lot to help the economy grow. However, it's not clear how various reforms would affect the distribution of benefits and burdens, creating new groups of winners and losers. President Bush has just appointed a nine-member Advisory Panel on Federal Tax Reform. I look forward to seeing its recommendations.

Higher Education Reauthorization

Congress needs to reauthorize the loan and grant programs for higher education. Many parents feel overwhelmed by tuition increases that are outpacing inflation year after year. As Vice Chairman of the Committee on Education and the Workforce I have been fighting waste and excessive subsidies to banks to increase Pell Grants. Entrenched interests oppose my approach, but the battle continues.

Transportation Reauthorization

Efficient transportation is vital for our economy and quality of life, but the House, Senate and President were unable to come to agreement on funding levels and other matters last Congress when the reauthorization of our transportation program was due. As Chairman of the Highways, Transit and Pipelines Subcommittee, I'm in the thick of the action. We introduced a new reauthorization bill in early

February, and it's on a fast track for consideration.

Immigration Reform

President Bush is calling for immigration reform including a guest worker program, but there is a lot of disagreement over how much and what kind of immigration we should accept for economic, cultural and especially security reasons.

Energy

With \$2 per gallon gas in mind, everybody agrees that the country needs a comprehensive energy policy, but we are having a hard time sorting out the proper balance between traditional energy sources versus new technologies. In the 108th Congress the House approved an energy bill, but nobody from Wisconsin's congressional delegation supported it, partly because it did nothing for Wisconsin's electricity transmission system, the third most congested in the country. In the end, the Senate could not come to agreement with the House on energy legislation.

AROUND THE 6TH DISTRICT

▲ In January, at the request of Sen. Herb Kohl, Rep. Green and I, the Coast Guard reversed an earlier decision to stop regu-

lating highway and railroad bridges over parts of the Fox and Wolf Rivers. Failure to regulate the bridges could have resulted in bridges being opened less frequently, greatly impeding economic development along the rivers.

▲ On June 30th, the Wisconsin Central railroad filed an application with the federal Surface Transportation Board (STB) seeking permission to abandon the **Saukville to Kiel** railroad line which serves the communities of Fredonia, Random Lake, Adell, Waldo, Plymouth and Elkhart Lake. I immediately urged that a way be found to keep the line operating.

At my request, the STB came to Random Lake in August to hold a hearing on the importance of the line to the local economy. Partially as a result, the State of Wisconsin purchased the line in January, and the Wisconsin Southern Railroad took over its management, keeping it functioning.

▲ On February 7th I visited Burger Boat in Manitowoc to see the boat maker's expanded facility there. I'm working with the Army Corps of Engineers to protect jobs by providing for proper dredging in the local waterways.
