HINOJOSA SECURES \$5,000 GRANT FOR BEE COUNTY CRIME STOPPERS

DEEP SOUTH TEXAS AWARDED \$ 372,286 IN FEDERAL FUNDS FOR EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER PROGRAM

Washington D.C. - Congressman Rubén Hinojosa announced today that \$372,286 has been awarded to Deep South Texas by the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP). Federal funds totaling \$100 million were made available to the EFSP, through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), to bring immediate relief to communities to address unemployment, poverty

and other needs in light of the economic climate faced by our country.

Congressman Hinojosa said, "I am pleased that the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 continues to bring needed relief to the families of Deep South Texas. In these tough economic times, we need to do everything we can to help those in need meet their basic needs for food and shelter. These funds will be put to good use doing that."

Funds will be distributed to support social service agencies in more than 2,500 cities and counties across the country. EFSP grant funds are used to supplement food, shelter, rent, mortgage and utility assistance programs for people with non-disaster related emergencies. Additional jurisdictions in South Texas may be selected at a later date by the EFSP State Set-Aside Committee. The EFSP National Board, chaired by the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and composed of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; United Jewish Communities; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; The Salvation Army; and United Way of America, provides supplemental funding to shelters, soup kitchens, and food banks. One-month awards for rent, mortgage, and utility assistance are also available. The funds are used to help individuals and families with

non-disaster, temporary emergency

needs.

In each funded jurisdiction, a Local Board advertises the availability of the funds, establishes local priorities, selects local non-profit and government agencies to receive supplemental funding, and monitors program compliance. The Local Board's composition mirrors the EFSP National Board, with a local government official replacing FEMA and board members voting to select their chair.

Hinojosa added, "The Emergency Food and Shelter Program is a great program that has continuously been active in helping Texans recover in our times of need. With this increased assistance for 2009, our communities can continue their path towards recovery."

The EFSP has been in existence since 1983 and was authorized under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 1987. With the ARRA funding, more than \$3.404 billion in federal aid will have been disbursed through the EFSP since its inception to communities nationwide, and has accounted for millions of additional meals and nights of shelter to the hungry and homeless most in need across the nation.

HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES EDUCATION GRANT FOR CUERO ISD

Washington D.C. – Congressman Ruben Hinojosa (TX-15) announced today that the Cuero Independent School District will receive \$389,653 through a grant awarded by the U.S. Depart-

ment of Education. The grant is part of the department's Elementary and Secondary School Counseling Program that is designed to enable local education agencies to establish or expand elementary and secondary school counseling programs.

"This is great news for the community of Cuero." Congressman Hinojosa said. "This is an important program that will help the school district provide our students with excellent counseling resources on campus. I have the greatest confidence that the Cuero Independent School District will put these funds to good use."

Grant recipients will use funds to support counseling programs in elementary and secondary schools. Schools will establish or expand counseling programs through hiring qualified school

counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, or child and adolescent psychiatrists with a goal of expanding the range, availability, quantity and quality of counseling services available. Counseling services will use a developmental, prevention approach, and will be designed and implemented with the involvement of parents of the participating students.

CONGRESSMAN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES \$695,000 FROM THE U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE COMING TO TEXAS 15TH DISTRICT

Washington D.C. – Congressman Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is investing \$695,000 in the 15th Congressional District of Texas for projects designed to create jobs, improve facilities, and promote conservation. The funds are part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 that Congress passed this February.

Congressman Hinojosa said, "This investment is great news for the Lower Rio Grande Valley National Wildlife Refuge. With these funds, they will be able to perform needed repairs that protect our local environmental treasures."

The projects funded by this investment include five maintenance projects by the Lower Rio Grande Valley National Wildlife Refuge. These projects range from the rehabilitation of foot trails along the Salineno and Arroyo Los Negros tracts to the rehabilitation of fences and walls.

According to a statement from the Department of the Interior, "All the projects represent priority needs identified by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service through its capital planning process or existing plans. The agency worked through a merit-based process to identify and prioritize projects before finalizing the project list by ensuring the investments met the criteria put forth in the Recovery Act: namely, that a project addresses the Department's highest priority mission needs; generates the largest number of jobs in the shortest period of time; and creates lasting value for the American public."

Congressman Hinojosa added, "I would like to thank the Department of the Interior, and Secretary Ken Salazar, for the leadership and commitment to preserving our natural resources and for the prudent and expeditious use of funds approved by the Recovery Act."

Projects are as follows:

- Lower Rio Grande Valley NWR :Rehabilitate foot trails on Salineno and Arroyo Los Negros tract—\$ 32,000.00
- Lower Rio Grande Valley NWR: Rehabilitate 0.6 miles of degraded existing service-use dirt road on the Arroyo los Negros tract— \$93,000.00
- Lower Rio Grande Valley NWR: Replace barbed wire boundary fence and 4 gates—\$192,000.00
- Lower Rio Grande Valley NWR: Rehabilitate two 40-foot long concrete walls—\$ 32,000.00
- Lower Rio Grande Valley NWR: Replace dilapidated 4strand barbed wire boundary fence—\$346,000.00

Green Infrastructure Municipal Handbook Grows

EPA is developing The Municipal Handbook to help local officials implement green infrastructure in their communities. The handbook is presented as a series of documents (as separate chapters) that cover issues such as financing, operation and maintenance, incentives, designs, codes and ordinances, and a variety of other subjects. The handbook chapters are intended to serve as "how to" manuals on these topics, written primarily from the standpoint of municipal implementation. EPA is producing the handbook in sections, with each new element being released as it is completed. To date, EPA has released chapters on funding options, retrofit policies, green streets, and rainwater harvesting policies. EPA expects to release two additional chapters in 2009, the first focusing on green infrastructure incentives and the second on codes and ordinances. Website:

Clean Water Act Nonpoint Source Grant (Section 319 Grants) Congress amended the Clean Water Act (CWA) in 1987 to establish the Section 319 Nonpoint Source Management Program because it recognized the need for greater federal leadership to help focus State and local Nonpoint source efforts. Under Section 319, States, Territories, and Indian Tribes receive grant money which sup-

ports a wide variety of activities including technical assistance, financial assistance, education, training, technology transfer, demonstration projects, and monitoring to assess the success of projects that have been implemented.

Recovery Act Clean Diesel Programs - Applications are now available to support clean diesel activities through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act). PRESIDENT OBAMA SIGNS LANDMARK NATIONAL SERVICE LEGISLATION



Washington D.C. – President Obama delivered an early victory for a central cause of his Administration by signing into law a sweeping expansion of national service that will engae millions of Americans in addressing local

needs through volunteer service. The President signed the landmark Edward M. Kennedy Serve America Act today at a Washington DC elementary school, joined by Vice President Biden, First Lady Michelle Obama, Dr, Jill Biden, Members of Congress, former President Clinton, former First Lady Rosalyn Carter, and an audience of nonprofit leaders and national service volunteers. The President was introduced by the bill's namesake and longtime service champion Senator Kennedy, who co-authored the legislation with Senator Orrin Hatch.

After signing the bill, the President, First Lady Michelle Obama, Vice President Joe Biden, Dr. Jill Biden, and former President Bill Clinton will plant trees and restore habitat in an environmental service project with AmeriCorps members and high school students at a local park. The Serve America Act reauthorizes and expands national service programs administered by the Corporation for National and Community Service, a federal agency created in 1993. The Corporation engages four million Americans in result-driven service each year, including 75,000 AmeriCorps members, 492,000 Senior Corps volunteers, 1.1 million Learn and Serve America students, and 2.2 million additional community volunteers mobilized and managed through the agency's programs.

This bill had a fast bipartisan sprint through Congress. The President called on Congress to send him the Kennedy-Hatch national service legislation in his joint address on February 25. The bill was introduced on March 8 and passed the House on a 321 to 105 vote on March 18. The Senate followed suit one week later with a 79-19 vote, with final passage in the House on March 31, just 22 days after it was introduced.

"The broad bipartisan support for this legislation, and its remarkably swift journey through Congress, reflect the growing national consensus that service is a powerful response to the economic and social challenges facing America today," said Corporation Board Chair Alan Solomont. "Across the country, people are looking for ways to help their neighbors and their communities. This bill will help us channel more of that energy into meeting local and national needs."

The legislation comes at a time of growing social need caused by the economic downturn and a corresponding "compassion surge" of Americans wanting to help those left vulnerable by its impact. The Corporation reported today that AmeriCorps received 17,038 online applications in March, nearly triple the 6,770 received in March of 2008. In the past five months, the agency received 48,520 online applications, up 234% over the 14,532 applications it received dur-

ing the same five month period a year ago. Many volunteer centers and nonprofits groups are also reporting a recent increase in volunteers.

"The President's call to service at a time of great need is striking a responsive chord with the American public, especially millennials and baby boomers," said Acting CEO Nicola Goren. "In this economic downturn, we need service and volunteering more than ever, and this legislation expresses the country's support for service when it's needed most."

The Serve America Act, which goes into effect on October 1, would increase and enhance opportunities for Americans of all ages to serve by increasing AmeriCorps from 75,000 to 250,000 positions over the next eight years, while increasing opportunities for students and older Americans to serve. It will strengthen America's civic infrastructure through social innovation, volunteer mobilization, and building nonprofit capacity. The new law is also designed to strengthen the management, cost-effectiveness and accountability of national service programs by increasing flexibility, consolidating funding streams, and introducing more competition. "This bill will help unleash a powerful new wave of service and civic action to help tackle our nation's toughest challenges," said Solomont. "We are grateful to Representatives George Miller, Bud McKeon, Carolyn McCarthy, and Todd Platts and to Senator Kennedy, Senator Hatch, Senator Mikulski, and Senator Enzi and all those who worked on this historic bipartisan step for national service. We look forward to working with Congress and the White House to fund and implement this Act."

The bill follows quickly on the heels of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, which provided \$200 million to support up to 13,000 AmeriCorps members serving in distressed communities. Acting CEO Goren will swear in the first 200 Recovery Act AmeriCorps members at a VISTA training this Friday in Albuquerque, putting "boots on the ground" to help citizens affected by the economic downturn.

Commodity Partnerships for Small Agricultural Risk Management Education Sessions

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)

Deadline: 05/11/2009

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), operating through the Risk Management Agency (RMA), announces the availability of approximately \$900,000 (subject to availability of funds) for Commodity Partnerships for Small Agricultural Risk Management Education Sessions (the Commodity Partnerships Small Sessions Program). The purpose of this cooperative partnership agreement program is to deliver training and information in the management of production, marketing, and financial risk to U.S. agricultural producers. The program gives priority to educating producers of crops currently not insured under Federal crop insurance, specialty crops, and underserved commodities, including livestock and forage. A maximum of 90 cooperative partnership agreements will be funded, with no more than nine in each of the ten designated RMA Regions. The maximum award for any cooperative partnership agreement will be \$10,000. Awardees must demonstrate non- financial benefits from a cooperative partnership agreement and must agree to the substantial involvement of RMA in the project. Funding availability for this program may be announced at approximately the same time as funding availability for similar but separate programs-- CFDA No. 10.455 (Community Outreach and Assistance Partnerships), and CFDA No. 10.458 (Crop Insurance Education in Targeted States). Prospective applicants should carefully examine and compare the notices for each program. The purpose of the Commodity Partnership Small Session Program is to provide U.S. farmers and ranchers with training and informational opportunities to be able to understand: 1)The kinds of risks addressed by existing and emerging risk management tools; 2)The features and appropriate use of existing and emerging risk management tools; and 3)How to make sound risk management decisions.

Maximum Grant Size: \$10,000

Number of Awards: 90

Eligible Applicants: State departments of agriculture, universities, non-profit agricultural organizations, and other public or private organizations with the capacity to lead a local program of risk management education for farmers and ranchers in an RMA Region. Individuals are not eligible applicants. Although an applicant may be eligible to compete for an award based on its status as an eligible entity, other factors may exclude an applicant from receiving Federal assistance under this program governed by Federal law and regulations (e.g. debarment and suspension; a determination of non-performance on a prior contract, cooperative agreement, grant or cooperative partnership; a determination of a violation of applicable ethical standards; a determination of being considered "high risk"). Applications from ineligible or excluded persons will be rejected in their entirety.

Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program

CSREES announces the availability of funds and requests applications for the Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program (BFRDP) for fiscal year 2009. The BFRDP provides resources to support the development of education, outreach, curricula, workshops, educational teams, training, and technical assistance programs to assist beginning farmers and ranchers in the United States and its territories in entering, establishing, building and managing successful farm and ranch enterprises. This program will also provide a cooperative agreement to an online electronic and library clearinghouse to provide associated support to individually funded projects, educational enhancement projects and the overall BFRDP program. The estimated amount available for support of this program in FY 2009 is \$17,280,000. The primary purpose of CSREES' BFRDP is to provide U.S. beginning farmer and rancher producers and their families, as appropriate, with the knowledge, skills and tools needed to make informed decisions for their operations, with the goal of enhancing success of beginning farmers and ranchers. Applications from partnerships and collaborations that are led by or include non-governmental and community-based organizations with expertise in new agricultural producer training and outreach will be given priority.

Eligible Applicants: Applications may be submitted by a collaborative state, tribal, local, or regionally-based network or partnership of public or private entities. These collaborations may include the following entities: State cooperative extension services; Federal, State, or tribal agencies; community based and nongovernmental organizations; junior and four-year colleges or universities or foundations maintained by a college or university; private for-profit organizations; and other appropriate partners. Inclusion of beginning and/or non-beginning farmers and ranchers as part of the collaborative group is strongly

encouraged. Individuals are not eligible for consideration under any category applicable to the BFRDP program.

CSREES announces the availability of funds and requests applications for the Community Food Projects Competitive Grants Program for fiscal year 2009 to support: 1)the development of Community Food Projects with a one-time infusion of federal dollars to make such projects self-sustaining; 2)a project that provide Training and Technical Assistance on a nationwide basis to entities interested in developing new Community Food Projects or assisting current grantees; and 3)Planning Projects to assess the food security needs and plan long-term solutions to help ensure food security in communities. CSREES anticipates that the amount available for support of this program in FY 2009 will be approximately \$5,000,000. The primary goals of the Community Food Projects Competitive Grants Program (CFPCGP) are to: 1)Meet the food needs of low-income individuals; 2)Increase the self-reliance of communities in providing for the food needs of the communities; 3)Promote comprehensive responses to local food, farm, and nutrition issues; or 4)Meet specific State, local or neighborhood food and agricultural needs including needs relating to: Infrastructure improvement and development; Planning for long-term solutions; or

The creation of innovative marketing activities that mutually benefit agricultural producers and low-income consumers.

Eligible Applicants: Only private, nonprofit entities meeting the following three requirements are eligible to receive a CFP or PP grant: (a) have experience in the area of (i) community food work, particularly concerning small and medium-size farms, including the provision of food to people in low-income communities and the development of new markets in low-income communities for agricultural producers; or (ii) job training and business development activities for food-related activities in low-income communities; (b) demonstrate competency to implement a project, provide fiscal accountability, collect data, and prepare reports and other necessary documentation; and (c) demonstrate a willingness to share information with researchers, evaluators, practitioners, and other interested parties, including a plan for dissemination of results.

Public agencies may also apply.

The primary mission of the Tony Hawk Foundation is to promote high-quality, public skateparks in low-income areas throughout the United States by providing grants to encourage and facilitate the design, development, construction, and operation of new skateboard parks and facilities. The foundation

primarily considers funding for projects designed and built by qualified and experienced skatepark contractors that include local skaters in the design process, are in low-income areas and/or areas with a high population of at-risk youth, can demonstrate a strong grassroots commitment, have a creative mix of street obstacles and transition/vert terrain, do not require skaters or their parents to sign waivers, encourage skaters to look after their own safety and the safety of others, are open during daylight hours 365 days a year, do not charge an entrance fee, and are in areas that currently have no skateboarding facilities. Grants range from a minimum of \$1,000 to a maximum of \$25,000 each. The foundation may also offer technical assistance on design and construction, promotional materials, training materials, and safety information, and facilitate support from vendors, suppliers, and community leaders. The applicant must be a 501(c)(3) public charity or a state or local agency (including public school systems or public projects). The foundation anticipates approving grant requests twice a year (spring and fall). Applicants may apply for a grant a total of two times. Grant recipients that have received no more than \$1,000 may also re-apply once.
