Republicans Offer No New Ideas, Call For More of the Same

The document Republicans released today is a return to the failed policies of the past that got our country into this deep financial and economic crisis in the first place. Republicans would dramatically decrease investment in critical areas, from education to public safety. The document released today does not address the change Americans voted for in November – it calls for more of the same:

- Tax cuts for the Wealthy: Calls for massive tax cuts for the wealthiest Americans including extending all Bush tax cuts.
- Continuing Corporate Subsidies: Includes huge subsidies to big oil and gas companies.
- **No Help for Lowering Health Care Costs:** While millions of Americans struggle with the rising cost of health care, this document has no plan to reduce costs
- **Promoting Deregulation:** Their answer to the financial crisis is to ask for more deregulation which is what caused the crisis in the first place.
- Their plan will result in deep cuts to vital services, like education and public safety.
