ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY:

Open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 1 through September 30 until 7 p.m., the other six months it closes at 5pm. Spend the day at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier (changing of the guard every hour on the hour and every half hour during the summer months), the Amphitheater, the Curtis-Lee Mansion, and the graves of Presidents John F. U.S. BOTANIC GARDENS:

Located on the National Mall across from the U.S. Capitol along First Street, S.W., between Maryland Avenue and C Street. Admission to all public areas of the U.S. Botanic Garden (USBG) is free. The Conservatory is open 10 AM - 5 PM daily. The Conservatory main entrance is located at 100 Maryland Avenue, SW. Visitors are welcome in Bartholdi Park from dawn until dusk and can access it from any of the three bordering streets - Independence Avenue, Washington Avenue or First Street. PUBLIC TOURS - PEAK SEASON - MARCH THROUGH AUGUST - FREE TICKETS ARE REQUIRED-Free tickets are required for all tours from the first Monday in March through the last Friday in August, on a first-come, first-served basis. The ticket booth is located on Raoul Wallenberg Place (formerly 15th Street). We offer same day tickets only. The Ticket Booth opens at 8:00 a.m. - Monday through Friday, and closes when all tickets have been distributed. Lines form early and tickets go quickly, most days' tickets are gone by 9:00 a.m. Please plan accordingly.

PUBLIC TOURS - NON-PEAK SEASON - SEPTEMBER THROUGH FEBRUARY - NO TICKETS REQUIRED- You may line up at the Visitors' Entrance on 14th Street. Please allow 45-50 minutes from the time you enter the building until the end of your tour.

All tour visitors must present a valid photo ID (drivers license, passport or Military ID) at the Tour Entrance located on 14th and C. Streets, S.W. There are no tours on weekends or federal holidays. The BEP is also closed the week between Christmas and New Years.

CAPITOL:

The Capitol is open to the public for guided tours only. Tours will be conducted from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday (the Capitol is not available for tours on Sundays). The Capitol will be open on all federal holidays except Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Visitors must obtain free tickets for tours on a first-come, first-served basis, at the Capitol Guide Service kiosk located along the curving sidewalk southwest of the Capitol (near the intersection of First Street, S.W., and Independence Avenue; Ticket distribution begins at 8:15 a.m. daily. Ticket holders will be directed to the South Visitor Receiving Facility, which is located south of the Capitol; from there they will proceed to the Capitol to begin their tour. Thomas Jefferson laid the foundation for this Library when he sold his own collection (of some 6, 487 books) to Congress for use by legislators. After this beginning, the library continued to increase its holdings. It now contains 45,000 reference books alone. There are over 23 million catalog cards, and 212 desks for visiting readers. Free 45 min Docent-led scheduled public tours are offered Monday-Friday 10:30am, 11:30am, 1:30pm, 2:30pm, and 3:30pm. Saturdays 10:30am, 11:30am, 1:30pm and 2:30pm. Constituents may also arrange special tours by contacting their congressional representative. Congressional tours include: a special greeting by a member of the Visitor Services Office Staff, A tour of the Jefferson Building led by an L.C. docent, and An introduction to the "American Treasures" exhibition.
