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OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MAX BAUCUS, A U.S. SENATOR FROM MONTANA, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE The Chairman. We have a quorum present. The business before the committee now, just temporarily, is to report out Kathleen Sebelius as Secretary of HHS. I will now entertain a motion. Senator Grassley. I move. Voice. Second. The Chairman. OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. JON KYL, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 ARIZONA

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Senator Kyl. Mr. Chairman, I appreciate the
Governor's efforts to clarify her relationship with Dr.
George Tiller, as well as my concern about the use of
comparative effectiveness research to deny or delay
health care to Americans under proposed health care
reform.

Comparative effectiveness research can be used to 10 provide patients and doctors with information so that 11 they can make informed health care decisions, but without 12 13 appropriate safeguards the government can misuse 14 comparative effectiveness research to deny coverage. 15 Unfortunately, Governor Sebelius' answers to my questions made it clear that the administration is unwilling to 16 17 support pro-patient safequards. She left me with no 18 assurance that HHS, Federal health care programs, or any 19 new entity, such as the Federal Coordinating Council, will not use comparative effectiveness research as a tool 20 21 to deny care. This should be a matter of concern to all 22 of us.

Her justification relied on two points which were
inaccurate and which contradicted each other, raising
more doubt. First, she said, "The law prohibits Medicare

1 from using comparative effectiveness research to withhold 2 coverage." She is referencing the 2003 prescription drug 3 bill which obviously found the need for Congress to step 4 forward and prevent this kind of research from denying 5 coverage, but obviously it only applies to prescription 6 drugs, not to all other aspects of treatment.

7 So one would assume that if she thought this was a 8 good idea, that she would support applying the same kind of patient protection that we have provided in Medicare 9 10 Part D to the rest of the Federal program, but she does In fact, her contradictory statement was, "When 11 not. authorizing comparative effectiveness research in both 12 13 the Medicare Modernization Act and the American Recovery 14 and Reinvestment Act, Congress did not impose any limits on it." That is true, and that is precisely the problem. 15

16 NIH is already taking steps necessary to make cost-17 based research a priority. The Acting Director said this 18 in a very recent project description: "Cost effectiveness 19 research will provide accurate and objective information to quide future policies that support the allocation of 20 21 health resources for the treatment of acute and chronic conditions." Allocation of health resources is, of 22 23 course, a euphemism for denying care based on cost, yet 24 Governor Sebelius would not agree to pull this project. 25 I believe in the right of every American to choose

the doctor, the hospital, the health care plan of his or 1 2 her choice, and that no Washington bureaucrat should 3 interfere with that right or substitute the government's 4 judgment for that of a physician. I will oppose Governor Sebelius' nomination because of her insufficient 5 6 commitment to these principles. 7 The Chairman.
