Department of Justice: the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) announces the availability of funds under the Legal Assistance for Victims (LAV) Grant Program. This program is meant to increase the availability of civil and criminal legal assistance necessary to provide effective aid to adult and youth victims of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, or sexual assault who are seeking relief in legal matters arising as a consequence of that abuse or violence.
