A NOTE FROM SENATOR HARRY REID

Dear Fellow Nevadan,

Nevada's economy is struggling and our families and businesses are paying the price. Our unemployment and foreclosure rates are among the country's worst. As you know, Congress passed and President Obama recently signed a historic \$787 billion economic recovery package. The main purpose of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) was to create the jobs that will put Americans back to work and get our economy back on track.

In order to help Nevadans to take advantage of the ARRA, I assembled this Resource Guide to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, which compiles information on many federal programs and funding opportunities available to individuals, communities and businesses in Nevada.

Under this legislation, Nevada will receive \$1.5 billion in direct aid and Medicaid assistance, as well as millions more in competitive grants that collectively are expected to create and save nearly 34,000 jobs in our state. It is critical that our families, businesses and municipalities have the information they need to access these funds as quickly as possible.

SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG)

\$2 billion was included for the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) program.

Nevada will receive \$14,315,337 million in formula funding.

Description:	Provides subsidized child care services through vouchers or contracts with providers to low-income working families and low-income families in which parents are engaged in education or training.

Head Start Program

\$2.1 billion was included for Head Start Program funding and the expansion of the Early Head Start Program.

Nevada will receive \$3,113,548 million in funding for Head Start Program. The state will receive additional funds for the Early Head Start Program – the amount has not been determined yet.

Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)

\$1 billion was included for Community Services Block Grant (CSBG).

Nevada will receive \$5 million in formula funding.

- Description:** Provides funding to local Community Action Agencies (CAAs) for services for the growing number of low-income families hurt by the economic crisis, such as child care subsidies, jobs skills training, and food pantry assistance. In Nevada, CSBG funds are awarded by the State Department of Health and Human Services to eligible CAAs. The 12 CAAs in Nevada will deliver employment and training and other supportive services to low-income families below 200% of poverty.

Member agencies of the National Board include American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; the Salvation Army; United Jewish Communities; and United Way of America. Child Nutrition School Equipment Grants

\$100 million was included for the School Equipment Grants Program

Nevada will receive \$676,000 in funding.

Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance

\$1.04 billion was included for Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance.

Nevada will receive \$5.0 million in federal matching funding for state expenditures on Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance. To be eligible for this increased funding, states must maintain their Medicaid eligibility standards, methodologies, and procedures as they were in effect on July 1, 2008.

State Fiscal Stabilization Funds

The State Fiscal Stabilization Fund provides \$53.6 billion to provide fiscal relief to states.

Nevada will receive \$396,582,797 in stabilization funds.

Description: To provide fiscal relief to the States to prevent tax increases and cutbacks in critical education and other services. To provide funding for elementary, secondary, and higher education, and for public safety and other government services, including higher education modernization.

The Governor may use 81.8% of the stabilization funds (\$362.78 million) to support elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education and some school construction and 18.2% of the stabilization funds (\$80.7 million) for public safety or other government services, which can include education and higher education modernization, renovation, and repair.

Note: The Governor must submit applications to the Department of Education describing how Nevada will use its allocations.

Special Education

\$12.2 billion was included for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Nevada will receive \$73,411,665 in formula funding.

Description: To assist States and school districts with paying for the rising cost of special education for students with disabilities.

The IDEA Part B, Grants to States program provides formula grants to assist the States in meeting the excess costs of providing special education and related services to children with disabilities.

Education for the Disadvantaged

\$13 billion was included for Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Nevada will receive \$70,605,242 in formula funding.

Education Technology

\$650 million was included for the Enhancing Education through Technology program.

Nevada will receive \$ 4,278,616 in formula funding.

Description: The Enhancing Education through Technology program supports State, district, and school efforts to integrate technology into curricula in order to improve teaching and learning. Funding shall be used for technology hardware, software applications, professional development and related instructional technology staff and services. These funds should be used to improve student academic achievement and ensure that students are college and workforce ready by ensuring that every student has 21st century skills and is technology literate. In addition, the funds should be used to increase ongoing and meaningful professional development around technology that leads to changes in teaching and curriculum and improves student achievement.

Vocational Rehabilitation

\$540 million was included for Vocational Rehabilitation State Grants.

Nevada will receive \$4,217,502 in funding.

Description:	This program provides grants to states to support a wide range of services. Eligible individuals are those who have a physical or mental impairment that results in a substantial impediment to employment, who can benefit from vocational rehabilitation (VR) services for employment, and who require VR services. Priority must be given to serving individuals with the most significant disabilities if a state is unable to serve all eligible individuals.

Teacher Quality Enhancement Competitive State Grants

\$100 million was included for the Teacher Quality State Grants program.

Description:	To provide grants to States to improve the quality of the teaching workforce. States may use grant funds to reform teacher licensing and certification requirements; provide alternative methods of teacher preparation; and provide alternative routes to State certification. The funds provided in the economic recovery bill will assist States in modernizing the teaching workforce, address teacher shortages, and provide new routes to teaching for jobless individuals seeking to enter the teaching field.

Statewide Longitudinal Data Systems Grant Program

\$250 million was included in competitive grants was provided for the Statewide Longitudinal Data Systems Program.

Description:	To make competitive grants to States to enable them to design and develop statewide longitudinal data systems that use individual student data for reporting and improving student achievement and to facilitate research to improve student achievement and close achievement gaps. With these grants, states could increase the capacity of their data systems, provide teachers the information they need to tailor instruction to help each student improve, and give administrators the resources and information to effectively and efficiently manage their data systems.

Student Financial Assistance

\$15.64 billion was included for the Pell Grant program. \$200 million was included for work-study programs. These additional funds will provide immediate financial relief to an additional 800,000 students and their families who are struggling to pay for the cost of a higher education during the economic downturn.

State Energy Program

\$3.1 billion was included for the State Energy Program.

Nevada is eligible to receive \$34.2; however, in order to receive those funds, the Governor must certify that Nevada will seek to “decouple” utility profits from electricity sales to encourage efficiency, and also will implement energy efficient building codes.

\$5 billion was included for the Weatherization Assistance Program. Provisions also expand the eligibility of low income households for the Weatherization Assistance Program and increasing the funding assistance level per dwelling (from \$2,500 per dwelling to \$6,500).

Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG)

\$3.2 billion was included for EECBG.

Nevada will receive \$20 million in formula funds.

Description:	To reduce fossil fuel emissions, decrease overall energy consumption, Improve energy efficiency in the transportation, building, and other energy consuming sectors of the economies of eligible entities. Assists states and local governments in implementing strategies to reduce fossil fuel emissions created as a result of activities within the jurisdictions of the eligible entities and reduce the total energy use. Activities eligible to receive funding include: conducting residential and commercial building energy audits; establishing financial incentives programs for energy efficiency improvements; grants to non-profits organizations to perform energy efficiency retrofits; developing/implementing programs to conserve energy used in transportation; developing and implementing building codes and inspections services to promote building energy efficiency; installing light emitting diodes (LEDs); and developing, implementing, and installing on or in any government building onsite renewable energy technology that generates electricity from renewable sources.

Tribal Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant

\$64 million was included for tribes.

Description:	To reduce fossil fuel emissions, decrease overall energy consumption, Improve energy efficiency in the transportation, building, and other energy consuming sectors of the economies of eligible entities. The program provides federal grants to units of local government, Indian tribes, states, and U.S. territories to reduce energy use and fossil fuel emissions, and for improvements in energy efficiency. Grant recipients could use funds to promote energy efficiency, conservation, and renewable energy programs and projects that are building blocks for a strong economy, curb use of fossil fuels, and improve environmental quality.

million for geothermal energy projects.

Alternative Fueled Vehicle Pilot Grant Program

\$300 million was included for the Alternative Fueled Vehicles Pilot Grant Program.

Description:	To establish a grant program through the DOE Clean Cities Program to encourage the use of plug-in electric drive vehicles or other emerging electric vehicle technologies. Eligible applicants for this competitive grants process are State governments, local governments, metropolitan transportation authorities, air pollution control districts, and private or nonprofit entities. Funding through this grant may be used for the acquisition of alternative fueled vehicles, fuel cell vehicles or hybrid vehicles, including buses for public transportation and ground support vehicles at public airports. The installation or acquisition of infrastructure necessary to directly support an alternative fueled vehicle, fuel cell vehicle, or hybrid vehicle project funded by the grant is also eligible.

Smart Grid Investment Program

\$4.5 billion was included for the Smart Grid Investment Program.

Description: To modernize the electric grid, enhance security and reliability of the energy infrastructure, energy storage research, development, demonstration and deployment, and facilitate recovery from disruptions to the energy supply, and authorized purposes. Funds from this program may be used for research and development, pilot projects, and federal matching funds for the Smart Grid Investment Program to meet the goal of a modern electric grid, enhance security and reliability of energy infrastructure, and facilitate recovery from disruptions to the energy supply. The Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability projects are planned and implemented in concert with partners from other Federal programs; electric utilities; equipment manufacturers; regional, state, and local agencies; national laboratories; and universities.
