Dear Chairman Miller:

On behalf of TASH and the Executive Board of Directors, I am writing to express support for H.R. 911, the "Stop Child Abuse in Residential Programs for Teens Act of 2009".

TASH is an international grassroots leader in advancing inclusive communities through research, education and advocacy, and a leader of the Alliance to Prevent Restraint, Aversive Interventions and Seclusion (APRAIS). Human rights and inclusion for people with the most significant disabilities and support needs -- those most vulnerable to segregation, abuse, neglect and institutionalization -- are the foundation of our activism. TASH is deeply concerned about and sensitive to the use of restraint and seclusion, and other aversive interventions used for the behavior modification of children. There is growing documentation of children in residential and non-residential public and private schools, recreational facilities, and correctional facilities who are brought to the ground and straddled, and strapped or tied in chairs and beds as a means of behavior modification. They are blindfolded, slapped and pinched, sprayed in the face with cold water, deprived of food, and secluded in locked rooms for hours at a time. What many fail to realize is the patchwork of state regulation that allow such interventions.

H.R. 911 is a first step to end the deliberate use of pain, humiliation, exclusion, and immobilization commonly employed by those administering services for students in residential programs and other daily life settings. We applaud the committee for its work and consideration of this important bill. We look forward to continuing to work with you to protect all students, particularly those with significant disabilities and support needs, from unconscionable treatment.
