## SNAPSHOT OF UNINSURED IN WEST VIRGINIA

Number of Uninsured: 254,000 people aged 0-64 in 2007<sup>1</sup>

The number of uninsured West Virginia represents 14% of the state's total population. In comparison, the number of uninsured in the U.S. represents 15% of our nation's total population.

- The risk of being uninsured is greatest for adults aged 19-34.2 <
- The highest rates of uninsurance occur in the southern part of < the state, and uninsurance rates have increased for all regions except the eastern panhandle.<sup>3</sup>
- More Than Half of Uninsured (53%) Are Men; 47% Are Women<sup>3</sup>
- Reasons for Lack of Insurance Coverage in West Virginia

The high cost of premiums, co-pays and deductibles remains the biggest obstacle to obtaining health insurance.4 West Virginia spends 13 percent more per person on health care than the national average.5

- Small Business Coverage Because of costs, few small < employers in the state offer health insurance. Nationally, 35 percent of firms with fewer than 10 workers offer health insurance compared to less than 25 percent in West Virginia.6
- Impact of Being Uninsured in West Virginia
  - Families USA estimates that four working-age West Virginians die each week due to lack of health insurance (approximately 210 people in 2006).
  - Between 2000 and 2006, the estimated number of adults < between the ages of 25 and 64 in West Virginia who died because they did not have health insurance was nearly 1,500.9

## BURDEN OF CHRONIC DISEASE IN WEST VIRGINIA

- West Virginia Ranks Among the Nation's Leaders For Many Chronic Diseases. Here are the leading causes of death in West Virginia and how West Virginia ranked nationally (in 2005)<sup>7</sup>:
  - 1. **Heart Disease** 7<sup>th</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - Cancer 6<sup>th</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - 3. **Stroke** Tied for 13<sup>th</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - Chronic Lower Respiratory Diseases 3<sup>rd</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - 5. **Diabetes** 2<sup>nd</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - 6. **Kidney Disease** 8<sup>th</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
  - 7. Infant Mortality Rate 15<sup>th</sup> highest rate in the U.S.
  - 8. **Preterm Birth Rate** 10<sup>th</sup> highest in the U.S.
  - 9. **Low Birth Weight Rate** 5<sup>th</sup> highest death rate in the U.S.
- Major Causes of Chronic Disease in West Virginia are the High Rates of Obesity and Smoking
- Eighty percent (80%) of Health Care Spending in West Virginia is Associated with Chronically III Patients<sup>8</sup>
  - The costs of treating Cancer, Diabetes, Heart Disease, Hypertension, Stroke, Mental Disorders, and Pulmonary Conditions — without counting the costs of the secondary health problems they cause — totaled \$2.3 billion in 2003.9
  - It is estimated that asthma, cardiovascular disease, and kidney disease cost the state more than \$893 million annually.
- Loss of Productivity in the Workplace
  - In 2003, lost workdays and lower employee productivity because of chronic conditions cost the state \$8.1 billion.<sup>4</sup>
  - < Smoking costs over \$1 billion in lost productivity each year.
