


HEALTH CARE SURCHARGE WOULD NOT AFFECT 99.7% OF ALL HOUSEHOLDS

The revised health care surcharge would only apply to married couples with adjusted gross income of \$1,000,000 (\$500,000 in the case of single individuals).

- The nonpartisan Joint Committee on Taxation (JCT) has estimated that the revised health care surcharge would only apply to the top 0.3% of all households in the United States.
- The revised health care surcharge would have no effect on 99.7% of all households in the United States.
 - This 0.3% of households receives 15.9% of all the income earned in the United States. Source: JCT.
 - The average annual income of this 0.3% of households is more than \$2.8 million. Source: JCT.
 - This 0.3% of households pays only 1.6% of their annual income in payroll taxes. The average middle-class family pays 9.4% of their annual income in payroll taxes. *Source: Congressional Budget Office*.
