## RESOLUTION

Expressing the commitment of the House of Representatives to achieving victory in Iraq.

- Whereas the Iraqi election of December 15, 2005, the first to take place under the newly ratified Iraqi Constitution, represented a crucial success in the establishment of a democratic, constitutional order in Iraq; and
- Whereas Iraqis, who by the millions defied terrorist threats to vote, were protected by Iraqi security forces with the help of United States and Coalition forces: Now, therefore, be it
  - 1 Resolved, That—

1	(1) the House of Representatives is committed
2	to achieving victory in Iraq;
3	(2) the Iraqi election of December 15, 2005,
4	was a crucial victory for the Iraqi people and Iraq's
5	new democracy, and a defeat for the terrorists who
6	seek to destroy that democracy;
7	(3) the House of Representatives encourages all
8	Americans to express solidarity with the Iraqi people
9	as they take another step toward their goal of a free,
10	open, and democratic society;
11	(4) the successful Iraqi election of December
12	15, 2005, required the presence of United States
13	Armed Forces, United States-trained Iraqi forces,
14	and Coalition forces;
15	(5) the continued presence of United States
16	Armed Forces in Iraq will be required only until
17	Iraqi forces can stand up so our forces can stand
18	down, and no longer than is required for that pur-
19	pose;
20	(6) setting an artificial timetable for the with-
21	drawal of United States Armed Forces from Iraq, or
22	immediately terminating their deployment in Iraq
23	and redeploying them elsewhere in the region, is fun-
24	damentally inconsistent with achieving victory in
25	Iraq;

(7) the House of Representatives recognizes
 and honors the tremendous sacrifices made by the
 members of the United States Armed Forces and
 their families, along with the members of Iraqi and
 Coalition forces; and

6 (8) the House of Representatives has
7 unshakable confidence that, with the support of the
8 American people and the Congress, United States
9 Armed Forces, along with Iraqi and Coalition forces,
10 shall achieve victory in Iraq.
