To provide for the establishment of investigative teams to assess building performance and emergency response and evacuation procedures in the wake of any building failure that has resulted in substantial loss of life or that posed significant potential of substantial loss of life.

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To provide for the establishment of investigative teams to assess building performance and emergency response and evacuation procedures in the wake of any building failure that has resulted in substantial loss of life or that posed significant potential of substantial loss of life.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Construction
- 5 Safety Team Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. NATIONAL CONSTRUCTION SAFETY TEAMS.
- 7 (a) Establishment.—The Director of the National
- 8 Institute of Standards and Technology (in this Act re-
- 9 ferred to as the "Director") is authorized to establish Na-
- 10 tional Construction Safety Teams for deployment after
- 11 events causing the failure of a building or buildings that
- 12 has resulted in substantial loss of life or that posed signifi-
- 13 cant potential for substantial loss of life. To the maximum
- 14 extent practicable, the Director shall establish and deploy
- 15 a Team within 48 hours after such an event. The Director
- 16 shall promptly publish in the Federal Register notice of
- 17 the establishment of each National Construction Safety
- 18 Team.
- 19 (b) Procedures.—
- 20 (1) Development.—Not later than 3 months
- after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Di-
- rector, in consultation with the United States Fire
- Administration and other appropriate Federal agen-
- cies, shall develop procedures for the establishment
- and deployment of National Construction Safety

1	Teams. The Director shall update such procedures
2	as appropriate. Such procedures shall include
3	provisions—
4	(A) regarding conflicts of interest related
5	to service on the Team;
6	(B) defining the circumstances under
7	which the Director will establish and deploy a
8	National Construction Safety Team;
9	(C) prescribing the appropriate size of Na-
10	tional Construction Safety Teams;
11	(D) guiding the disclosure of information
12	under section 8;
13	(E) guiding the conduct of investigations
14	under this Act;
15	(F) identifying and prescribing appropriate
16	conditions for the provision by the Director of
17	additional resources and services National Con-
18	struction Safety Teams may need;
19	(G) to ensure that investigations under
20	this Act do not impede and are coordinated
21	with any search and rescue efforts being under-
22	taken at the site of the building failure;
23	(H) for regular briefings of the public on
24	the status of the investigative proceedings and
25	findings;

1	(I) guiding the National Construction
2	Safety Teams in moving and preserving evi-
3	dence as described in section $5(a)(4)$, $(b)(2)$,
4	and $(d)(4)$;
5	(J) providing for coordination with Fed-
6	eral, State, and local entities that may sponsor
7	research or investigations of building failures,
8	including research conducted under the Earth-
9	quake Hazards Reduction Act of 1977; and
10	(K) regarding such other issues as the Di-
11	rector considers appropriate.
12	(2) Publication.—The Director shall publish
13	promptly in the Federal Register final procedures,
14	and subsequent updates thereof, developed under
15	paragraph (1).
16	SEC. 3. COMPOSITION OF TEAMS.
17	National Construction Safety Teams shall be led by
18	an individual named by the Director. National Construc-
19	tion Safety Team members shall include at least 1 em-
20	ployee of the National Institute of Standards and Tech-
21	nology and shall include other experts who are not employ-
22	ees of the National Institute of Standards and Technology,
23	who may include private sector experts, university experts,
24	representatives of professional organizations with appro-

25 priate expertise, and appropriate Federal, State, or local

- 1 officials. Team members who are not Federal employees
- 2 shall be considered Federal Government contractors.

3 SEC. 4. FUNCTIONS OF TEAMS.

- 4 National Construction Safety Teams shall—
- 5 (1) conduct investigations to establish the likely 6 technical cause or causes of the building failure;
- 7 (2) evaluate the technical aspects of evacuation 8 and emergency response procedures;
- 9 (3) recommend, as necessary, specific improve-10 ments to building standards, codes, and practices 11 based on the findings made pursuant to paragraphs 12 (1) and (2); and
- 13 (4) recommend any research and other appro-

priate actions needed to improve the structural safe-

ty of buildings, and improve evacuation and emer-

gency response procedures, based on the findings of

the investigation.

18 SEC. 5. AUTHORITIES.

- 19 (a) Entry and Inspection.—In investigating a
- 20 building failure under this Act, members of a National
- 21 Construction Safety Team, and any other person author-
- 22 ized by the Director to support a National Construction
- 23 Safety Team, on display of appropriate credentials pro-
- 24 vided by the Director, may—

- 1 (1) enter property where a building failure 2 being investigated has occurred, or where building 3 components, materials, and artifacts with respect to 4 the building failure are located, and do anything 5 necessary to conduct the investigation;
 - (2) inspect any record (including any design, construction, or maintenance record), process, or facility related to the investigation;
 - (3) inspect and test any building components, materials, and artifacts related to the building failure; and
- 12 (4) move such records, components, materials, 13 and artifacts as provided by the procedures devel-14 oped under section 2(b)(1).
- 15 (b) Avoiding Unnecessary Interference and 16 Preserving Evidence.—An inspection, test, or other 17 action taken by a National Construction Safety Team 18 under this section shall be conducted in a way that—
- 19 (1) does not interfere unnecessarily with serv-20 ices provided by the owner or operator of the build-21 ing components, materials, or artifacts, property, 22 records, process, or facility; and
- 23 (2) to the maximum extent feasible, preserves 24 evidence related to the building failure, consistent 25 with the ongoing needs of the investigation.

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1 (c) COORDINATION.—

- (1) WITH SEARCH AND RESCUE EFFORTS.—A National Construction Safety Team shall not impede, and shall coordinate its investigation with, any search and rescue efforts being undertaken at the site of the building failure.
 - (2) WITH OTHER RESEARCH.—A National Construction Safety Team shall coordinate its investigation, to the extent practicable, with qualified researchers who are conducting engineering or scientific (including social science) research relating to the building failure.
 - (3) Memoranda of understanding.—The National Institute of Standards and Technology shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with each Federal agency that may conduct or sponsor a related investigation, providing for coordination of investigations.

19 (d) Interagency Priorities.—

- (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in paragraph (2) or (3), a National Construction Safety Team investigation shall have priority over any other investigation of any other Federal agency.
- (2) NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION SAFETY
 BOARD.—If the National Transportation Safety

- Board is conducting an investigation related to an investigation of a National Construction Safety
 Team, the National Transportation Safety Board investigation shall have priority over the National Construction Safety Team investigation. Such priority shall not otherwise affect the authority of the Team to continue its investigation under this Act.
 - (3) CRIMINAL ACTS.—If the Attorney General, in consultation with the Director, determines, and notifies the Director, that circumstances reasonably indicate that the building failure being investigated by a National Construction Safety Team may have been caused by a criminal act, the National Construction Safety Team shall relinquish investigative priority to the appropriate Federal law enforcement agency. The relinquishment of investigative priority by the National Construction Safety Team shall not otherwise affect the authority of the Team to continue its investigation under this Act.
 - (4) Preservation of Evidence.—If a Federal law enforcement agency suspects and notifies the Director that a building failure being investigated by a National Construction Safety Team under this Act may have been caused by a criminal act, the National Construction Safety Team, in con-

- 1 sultation with the Federal law enforcement agency,
- 2 shall take necessary actions to ensure that evidence
- of the criminal act is preserved.
- 4 SEC. 6. BRIEFINGS, HEARINGS, WITNESSES, AND SUB-
- 5 POENAS.
- 6 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—The Director, on behalf
- 7 of a National Construction Safety Team, may conduct
- 8 hearings, administer oaths, and require, by subpoena and
- 9 otherwise, necessary witnesses and evidence as necessary
- 10 to carry out this Act.
- 11 (b) Briefings.—National Construction Safety
- 12 Teams shall hold regular public briefings on the status
- 13 of investigative proceedings and findings.
- 14 (c) Public Hearings.—During the course of an in-
- 15 vestigation by a National Construction Safety Team, the
- 16 National Institute of Standards and Technology may, if
- 17 the Director considers it to be in the public interest, hold
- 18 a public hearing for the purposes of—
- 19 (1) gathering testimony from witnesses; and
- 20 (2) informing the public on the progress of the
- 21 investigation.
- 22 (d) Production of Witnesses.—A witness or evi-
- 23 dence in an investigation under this Act may be sum-
- 24 moned or required to be produced from any place in the
- 25 United States. A witness summoned under this subsection

- 1 is entitled to the same fee and mileage the witness would
- 2 have been paid in a court of the United States.
- 3 (e) Issuance of Subpoenas.—A subpoena shall be
- 4 issued under the signature of the Director but may be
- 5 served by any person designated by the Director.
- 6 (f) Failure To Obey Subpoena.—If a person dis-
- 7 obeys a subpoena issued by the Director or a National
- 8 Construction Safety Team under this Act, the Attorney
- 9 General, acting on behalf of the Director, may bring a civil
- 10 action in a district court of the United States to enforce
- 11 the subpoena. An action under this subsection may be
- 12 brought in the judicial district in which the person against
- 13 whom the action is brought resides, is found, or does busi-
- 14 ness. The court may punish a failure to obey an order
- 15 of the court to comply with the subpoena as a contempt
- 16 of court.

17 SEC. 7. ADDITIONAL POWERS.

- 18 In order to support National Construction Safety
- 19 Teams in carrying out this Act, the Director may—
- 20 (1) procure the temporary or intermittent serv-
- 21 ices of experts or consultants under section 3109 of
- title 5, United States Code;
- 23 (2) request the use, when appropriate, of avail-
- able services, equipment, personnel, and facilities of
- a department, agency, or instrumentality of the

United States Government on a reimbursable or 1 2 other basis; 3 (3) confer with employees and request the use of services, records, and facilities of State and local 5 governmental authorities; 6 (4) accept voluntary and uncompensated serv-7 ices: 8 (5) accept and use gifts of money and other 9 property, to the extent provided in advance in appro-10 priations Acts; 11 (6) make contracts with nonprofit entities to 12 carry out studies related to purpose, functions, and authorities of the National Construction Safety 13 14 Teams; and 15 (7) provide nongovernmental members of the 16 National Construction Safety Team reasonable com-17 pensation for time spent carrying out activities 18 under this Act. 19 SEC. 8. DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION. 20 (a) General Rule.—Except as otherwise provided 21 in this section, a copy of a record, information, or investigation submitted or received by a National Construction

Safety Team shall be made available to the public on re-

quest and at reasonable cost.

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- 1 (b) Exception.—Subsection (a) does not require the
- 2 release of information described by section 552(b) of title
- 3 5, United States Code, or protected from disclosure by any
- 4 other law of the United States.
- 5 (c) Protection of Voluntary Submission of In-
- 6 FORMATION.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
- 7 a National Construction Safety Team, the National Insti-
- 8 tute of Standards and Technology, and any agency receiv-
- 9 ing information from a National Construction Safety
- 10 Team or the National Institute of Standards and Tech-
- 11 nology, shall not disclose voluntarily provided safety-re-
- 12 lated information if that information is not directly related
- 13 to the building failure being investigated and the Director
- 14 finds that the disclosure of the information would inhibit
- 15 the voluntary provision of that type of information.
- 16 (d) Public Safety Information.—A National
- 17 Construction Safety Team and the National Institute of
- 18 Standards and Technology shall not publicly release any
- 19 information it receives in the course of an investigation
- 20 under this Act if the Director finds that the disclosure
- 21 of that information might jeopardize public safety.
- 22 SEC. 9. NATIONAL CONSTRUCTION SAFETY TEAM REPORT.
- Not later than 90 days after completing an investiga-
- 24 tion, a National Construction Safety Team shall issue a
- 25 public report which includes—

1	(1) an analysis of the likely technical cause or
2	causes of the building failure investigated;
3	(2) technical recommendations for changes to
4	or the establishment of evacuation and emergency
5	response procedures;
6	(3) recommended specific improvements to
7	building standards, codes, and practices; and
8	(4) recommendations for research and other ap-
9	propriate actions needed to help prevent future
10	building failures.
11	SEC. 10. NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECH-
12	NOLOGY ACTIONS.
13	After the issuance of a public report under section
14	9, the National Institute of Standards and Technology
15	shall comprehensively review the report and, working with
16	the United States Fire Administration and other appro-
17	priate Federal and non-Federal agencies and
18	organizations—
19	(1) conduct, or enable or encourage the con-
20	ducting of, appropriate research recommended by
21	the National Construction Safety Team; and
22	(2) promote (consistent with existing proce-
23	dures for the establishment of building standards,
24	codes, and practices) the appropriate adoption by
25	the Federal Government, and encourage the appro-

1	priate adoption by other agencies and organizations.
2	of the recommendations of the National Construc-
3	tion Safety Team with respect to—
4	(A) technical aspects of evacuation and
5	emergency response procedures;
6	(B) specific improvements to building
7	standards, codes, and practices; and
8	(C) other actions needed to help prevent
9	future building failures.
10	SEC. 11. NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECH
11	NOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT.
12	Not later than February 15 of each year, the Director
13	shall transmit to the Committee on Science of the House
14	of Representatives and to the Committee on Commerce,
15	Science, and Transportation of the Senate a report that
16	includes—
17	(1) a summary of the investigations conducted
18	by National Construction Safety Teams during the
19	prior fiscal year;
20	(2) a summary of recommendations made by
21	the National Construction Safety Teams in reports
22	issued under section 9 during the prior fiscal year
23	and
24	(3) a description of the actions taken by the
25	National Institute of Standards and Technology dur-

- 1 ing the prior fiscal year in response to reports issued
- 2 under section 9.

3 SEC. 12. ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

- 4 (a) Establishment and Functions.—The Direc-
- 5 tor, in consultation with the United States Fire Adminis-
- 6 tration and other appropriate Federal agencies, shall es-
- 7 tablish an advisory committee to advise the Director on
- 8 carrying out this Act and to review the procedures devel-
- 9 oped under section 2(b)(1) and the reports issued under
- 10 section 9.
- 11 (b) ANNUAL REPORT.—On January 1 of each year,
- 12 the advisory committee shall transmit to the Committee
- 13 on Science of the House of Representatives and to the
- 14 Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of
- 15 the Senate a report that includes—
- 16 (1) an evaluation of National Construction
- 17 Safety Team activities, along with recommendations
- to improve the operation and effectiveness of Na-
- 19 tional Construction Safety Teams; and
- 20 (2) an assessment of the implementation of the
- 21 recommendations of National Construction Safety
- Teams and of the advisory committee.
- 23 (c) Duration of Advisory Committee.—Section
- 24 14 of the Federal Advisory Committee Act shall not apply
- 25 to the advisory committee established under this section.

1 SEC. 13. ADDITIONAL APPLICABILITY.

- 2 The authorities and restrictions applicable under this
- 3 Act to the Director and to National Construction Safety
- 4 Teams shall apply to the activities of the National Insti-
- 5 tute of Standards and Technology in response to the at-
- 6 tacks of September 11, 2001.

7 SEC. 14. AMENDMENT.

- 8 Section 7 of the National Bureau of Standards Au-
- 9 thorization Act for Fiscal Year 1986 (15 U.S.C. 281a)
- 10 is amended by inserting ", or from an investigation under
- 11 the National Construction Safety Team Act," after "from
- 12 such investigation".

13 SEC. 15. CONSTRUCTION.

- Nothing in this Act shall be construed to confer any
- 15 authority on the National Institute of Standards and
- 16 Technology to require the adoption of building standards,
- 17 codes, or practices.

18 SEC. 16. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 19 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Na-
- 20 tional Institute of Standards and Technology for carrying
- 21 out this Act such sums as may be necessary for each of

- 1 the fiscal years 2003 through 2005, to remain available
- 2 until expended.
