# **A BILL**

To provide for the establishment of investigative teams to assess building performance and emergency response and evacuation procedures in the wake of any building failure that has resulted in substantial loss of life or that posed significant potential of substantial loss of life.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "National Construction5 Safety Team Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. NATIONAL CONSTRUCTION SAFETY TEAMS.

7 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Director of the National 8 Institute of Standards and Technology (in this Act referred 9 to as the "Director") is authorized to establish National Construction Safety Teams for deployment after events 10 11 causing the failure of a building or buildings that has resulted in substantial loss of life or that posed significant 12 13 potential for substantial loss of life. To the maximum extent 14 practicable, the Director shall establish and deploy a Team within 48 hours after such an event. The Director shall 15 16 promptly publish in the Federal Register notice of the establishment of each National Construction Safety Team. 17

18 (b) PROCEDURES.—

19 (1) DEVELOPMENT.—Not later than 3 months
20 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Direc21 tor, in consultation with the United States Fire Ad22 ministration and other appropriate Federal agencies,
23 shall develop procedures for the establishment and de24 ployment of National Construction Safety Teams. The
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1	Director shall update such procedures as appropriate.
2	Such procedures shall include provisions—
3	(A) regarding conflicts of interest related to
4	service on the Team;
5	(B) defining the circumstances under which
6	the Director will establish and deploy a National
7	Construction Safety Team;
8	(C) prescribing the appropriate size of Na-
9	tional Construction Safety Teams;
10	(D) guiding the disclosure of information
11	under section 8;
12	(E) guiding the conduct of investigations
13	under this Act;
14	(F) identifying and prescribing appropriate
15	conditions for the provision by the Director of
16	additional resources and services National Con-
17	struction Safety Teams may need;
18	(G) to ensure that investigations under this
19	Act do not impede and are coordinated with any
20	search and rescue efforts being undertaken at the
21	site of the building failure;
22	(H) for regular briefings of the public on
23	the status of the investigative proceedings and
24	findings;

1	(I) guiding the National Construction Safe-
2	ty Teams in moving and preserving evidence as
3	described in section $5(a)(4)$ , $(b)(2)$ , and $(d)(4)$ ;
4	(J) providing for coordination with Fed-
5	eral, State, and local entities that may sponsor
6	research or investigations of building failures,
7	including research conducted under the Earth-
8	quake Hazards Reduction Act of 1977; and
9	(K) regarding such other issues as the Di-
10	rector considers appropriate.
11	(2) PUBLICATION.—The Director shall publish
12	promptly in the Federal Register final procedures,
13	and subsequent updates thereof, developed under para-
14	graph (1).
15	SEC. 3. COMPOSITION OF TEAMS.
16	National Construction Safety Teams shall be led by
17	an individual named by the Director. National Construc-
18	tion Safety Team members shall include at least 1 employee
19	of the National Institute of Standards and Technology and
20	shall include other experts who are not employees of the Na-
21	tional Institute of Standards and Technology, who may in-

- 22 clude private sector experts, university experts, representa-
- 23 tives of professional organizations with appropriate exper-
- 24 tise, and appropriate Federal, State, or local officials.

### 1 SEC. 4. FUNCTIONS OF TEAMS.

2	National Construction Safety Teams shall—
3	(1) conduct investigations to establish the likely
4	technical cause or causes of the building failure;
5	(2) evaluate the technical aspects of evacuation
6	and emergency response procedures;
7	(3) recommend specific improvements to building
8	standards, codes, and practices based on the findings
9	made pursuant to paragraphs (1) and (2); and
10	(4) recommend research and other appropriate
11	actions needed to improve the structural safety of
12	buildings, and improve evacuation and emergency re-
13	sponse procedures, based on the findings of the inves-
14	tigation.
15	SEC. 5. AUTHORITIES.
16	(a) ENTRY AND INSPECTION.—In investigating a
17	building failure under this Act, members of a National Con-
18	struction Safety Team, and any other person authorized by
19	the Director to support a National Construction Safety
20	Team, on display of appropriate credentials provided by
21	the Director, may—
22	(1) enter property where a building failure being
23	
24	investigated has occurred, or where building compo-

1	(2) inspect any record (including any design,
2	construction, or maintenance record), process, or fa-
3	cility related to the investigation;
4	(3) inspect and test any building components,
5	materials, and artifacts related to the building fail-

8	and artifacts as provided by the procedures developed
9	under section $2(b)(1)$ .
10	(b) Avoiding Unnecessary Interference and
11	PRESERVING EVIDENCE.—An inspection, test, or other ac-
12	tion taken by a National Construction Safety Team under
13	this section shall be conducted in a way that—
14	(1) does not interfere unnecessarily with services
15	provided by the owner or operator of the building
16	components, materials, or artifacts, property, records,
17	process, or facility; and

9 (3) MEMORANDA OF UNDERSTANDING.—The Na-10 tional Institute of Standards and Technology shall 11 enter into a memorandum of understanding with each 12 Federal agency that may conduct or sponsor a related 13 investigation, providing for coordination of investiga-14 tions.

15 (d) INTERAGENCY PRIORITIES.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para17 graph (2) or (3), a National Construction Safety
18 Team investigation shall have priority over any other
19 investigation of any other Federal agency.

20 (2) NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION SAFETY
21 BOARD.—If the National Transportation Safety
22 Board is conducting an investigation related to an
23 investigation of a National Construction Safety
24 Team, the National Transportation Safety Board in25 vestigation shall have priority over the National Con-

1	struction Safety Team investigation. Such priority
2	shall not otherwise affect the authority of the Team to
3	continue its investigation under this Act.
4	(3) CRIMINAL ACTS.—If the Attorney General, in
5	consultation with the Director, determines, and noti-
6	fies the Director, that circumstances reasonably indi-
7	cate that the building failure being investigated by a
8	National Construction Safety Team may have been
9	caused by a criminal act with intent to cause the
10	building failure, the National Construction Safety
11	Team shall relinquish investigative priority to the ap-
12	propriate Federal law enforcement agency. The relin-
13	quishment of investigative priority by the National
14	Construction Safety Team shall not otherwise affect
15	the authority of the Team to continue its investiga-
16	tion under this Act.
17	(4) Preservation of evidence.—If a Federal
18	law enforcement agency suspects and notifies the Di-
19	rector that a building failure being investigated by a
20	National Construction Safety Team under this Act
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20 National Construction Superg Team and et and The 21 may have been caused by a criminal act with intent 22 to cause the building failure, the National Construc-23 tion Safety Team, in consultation with the Federal 24 law enforcement agency, shall take necessary actions to ensure that evidence of the criminal act is pre served.

## 3 SEC. 6. BRIEFINGS, HEARINGS, WITNESSES, AND SUB-4 POENAS.

(a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—The Director, on behalf of
a National Construction Safety Team, may conduct hearings, administer oaths, and require, by subpoena and otherwise, necessary witnesses and evidence as necessary to carry
out this Act.

(b) BRIEFINGS.—National Construction Safety Teams
shall hold regular public briefings on the status of investigative proceedings and findings.

(c) PUBLIC HEARINGS.—During the course of an investigation by a National Construction Safety Team, the
National Institute of Standards and Technology may, if the
Director considers it to be in the public interest, hold a public hearing for the purposes of—

18 (1) gathering testimony from witnesses; and

19 (2) informing the public on the progress of the20 investigation.

(d) PRODUCTION OF WITNESSES.—A witness or evidence in an investigation under this Act may be summoned
or required to be produced from any place in the United
States. A witness summoned under this subsection is enti-

tled to the same fee and mileage the witness would have
 been paid in a court of the United States.

3 (e) ISSUANCE OF SUBPOENAS.—A subpoena shall be
4 issued under the signature of the Director but may be served
5 by any person designated by the Director.

(f) FAILURE TO OBEY SUBPOENA.-If a person dis-6 7 obeys a subpoend issued by the Director or a National Con-8 struction Safety Team under this Act, the Director may 9 bring a civil action in a district court of the United States 10 to enforce the subpoena. An action under this subsection may be brought in the judicial district in which the person 11 against whom the action is brought resides, is found, or does 12 business. The court may punish a failure to obey an order 13 of the court to comply with the subpoena as a contempt 14 of court. 15

#### 16 SEC. 7. ADDITIONAL POWERS.

17 In order to support National Construction Safety
18 Teams in carrying out this Act, the Director may—

19 (1) procure the temporary or intermittent serv20 ices of experts or consultants under section 3109 of
21 title 5, United States Code;

(2) request the use, when appropriate, of available services, equipment, personnel, and facilities of a
department, agency, or instrumentality of the United
States Government on a reimbursable or other basis;

1	(3) confer with employees and request the use of
2	services, records, and facilities of State and local gov-
3	ernmental authorities;
4	(4) accept voluntary and uncompensated serv-
5	ices;
6	(5) accept and use gifts of money and other
7	property;
8	(6) make contracts with nonprofit entities to
9	carry out studies related to purpose, functions, and
10	authorities of the National Construction Safety
11	Teams; and
12	(7) provide nongovernmental members of the Na-
13	tional Construction Safety Team reasonable com-
14	pensation for time spent carrying out activities under
15	this Act.
16	SEC. 8. DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION.
17	(a) GENERAL RULE.—Except as otherwise provided in
18	this section, a copy of a record, information, or investiga-
19	tion submitted or received by a National Construction Safe-

20 ty Team shall be made available to the public on request21 and at reasonable cost.

(b) EXCEPTION.—Subsection (a) does not require the
release of information described by section 552(b) of title
5, United States Code, or protected from disclosure by any
other law of the United States.

1 (c) PROTECTION OF VOLUNTARY SUBMISSION OF IN-2 FORMATION.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a National Construction Safety Team, the National Insti-3 4 tute of Standards and Technology, and any agency receiving information from a National Construction Safety Team 5 or the National Institute of Standards and Technology, 6 7 shall not disclose voluntarily provided safety-related infor-8 mation if that information is not directly related to the 9 building failure being investigated and the Director finds that the disclosure of the information would inhibit the vol-10 untary provision of that type of information. 11

(d) PUBLIC SAFETY INFORMATION.—A National Construction Safety Team and the National Institute of Standards and Technology shall not publicly release any information it receives in the course of an investigation under this
Act if the Director finds that the disclosure of that information might jeopardize public safety.

#### 18 SEC. 9. NATIONAL CONSTRUCTION SAFETY TEAM REPORT.

19 Not later than 90 days after completing an investiga20 tion, a National Construction Safety Team shall issue a
21 public report which includes—

(1) an analysis of the likely technical cause or
causes of the building failure investigated;

1 (2) technical recommendations for changes to or 2 the establishment of evacuation and emergency re-3 sponse procedures; 4 (3) recommended specific improvements to building standards, codes, and practices; and 5 6 (4) recommendations for research and other ap-7 propriate actions needed to help prevent future build-8 ing failures. 9 SEC. 10. NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECH-10 NOLOGY ACTIONS. 11 After the issuance of a public report under section 9, the National Institute of Standards and Technology shall 12 comprehensively review the report and, working with the 13 United States Fire Administration and other appropriate 14 15 Federal and non-Federal agencies and organizations— 16 (1) conduct, or enable or encourage the con-17 ducting of, appropriate research recommended by the 18 National Construction Safety Team; and 19 (2) promote the appropriate adoption by the 20 Federal Government, and encourage the appropriate 21 adoption by other agencies and organizations, of the 22 recommendations of the National Construction Safety

7	Not later than February 15 of each year, the Director

8 shall transmit to the Committee on Science of the House
9 of Representatives and to the Committee on Commerce,
10 Science, and Transportation of the Senate a report that
11 includes—

(1) a summary of the investigations conducted
by National Construction Safety Teams during the
prior fiscal year;

(2) a summary of recommendations made by the
National Construction Safety Teams in reports issued
under section 9 during the prior fiscal year; and

(3) a description of the actions taken by the National Institute of Standards and Technology during
the prior fiscal year in response to reports issued
under section 9.

### 22 SEC. 12. ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

(a) ESTABLISHMENT AND FUNCTIONS.—The Director,
in consultation with the United States Fire Administration
and other appropriate Federal agencies, shall establish an

advisory committee to advise the Director on carrying out
 this Act and to review the procedures developed under sec tion 2(b)(1) and the reports issued under section 9.

4 (b) ANNUAL REPORT.—On January 1 of each year,
5 the advisory committee shall transmit to the Committee on
6 Science of the House of Representatives and to the Com7 mittee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the
8 Senate a report that includes—

9 (1) an evaluation of National Construction Safe10 ty Team activities, along with recommendations to
11 improve the operation and effectiveness of National
12 Construction Safety Teams; and

(2) an assessment of the implementation of the
recommendations of National Construction Safety
Teams and of the advisory committee.

(c) DURATION OF ADVISORY COMMITTEE.—Section 14
of the Federal Advisory Committee Act shall not apply to
the advisory committee established under this section.

#### 19 SEC. 13. ADDITIONAL APPLICABILITY.

The authorities and restrictions applicable under this
Act to the Director and to National Construction Safety
Teams shall apply to the activities of the National Institute
of Standards and Technology in response to the attacks of
September 11, 2001.

#### 1 SEC. 14. AMENDMENT.

2 Section 7 of the National Bureau of Standards Author3 ization Act for Fiscal Year 1986 (15 U.S.C. 281a) is
4 amended by inserting ", or from an investigation under the
5 National Construction Safety Team Act," after "from such
6 investigation".

#### 7 SEC. 15. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

8 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Na-9 tional Institute of Standards and Technology for carrying 10 out this Act \$25,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2003 11 through 2005, to remain available until expended.
