To establish a statute of repose for durable goods used in a trade or business.

Mr. Chabot (for himself, Ms. Slaughter, and Mr. Shimkus) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

## A BILL

To establish a statute of repose for durable goods used in a trade or business.

- Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

  SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

  This Act may be cited as the "Workplace Goods Job
  Growth and Competitiveness Act of 1999".

  SEC. 2. STATUTE OF REPOSE FOR DURABLE GOODS USED

  IN A TRADE OR BUSINESS.

  (a) In General.—Except as otherwise provided in
- 9 this Act—
  10 (1) no civil action for damage to property aris11 ing out of an accident involving a durable good may

- be filed against the manufacturer or seller of the durable good more than 18 years after the durable good was delivered to its first purchaser or lessee; and
  - (2) no civil action for damages for death or personal injury arising out of an accident involving a durable good may be filed against the manufacturer or seller of the durable good more than 18 years after the durable good was delivered to its first purchaser or lessee if—
  - (A) the claimant has received or is eligible to receive worker compensation; and
- 13 (B) the injury does not involve a toxic harm.

### (b) Exceptions.—

- (1) IN GENERAL.—A motor vehicle, vessel, aircraft, or train, that is used primarily to transport passengers for hire shall not be subject to this Act.
- (2) CERTAIN EXPRESS WARRANTIES.—This Act does not bar a civil action against a defendant who made an express warranty in writing as to the safety or life expectancy of a specific product which was longer than 18 years, except that this Act shall apply at the expiration of that warranty.

1	(3) AVIATION LIMITATIONS PERIOD.—This Act
2	does not affect the limitations period established by
3	the General Aviation Revitalization Act of 1994 (49
4	U.S.C. 40101 note).
5	(c) Effect on State Law; Preemption.—Nothing
6	in this Act shall be construed to preempt or supersede any
7	State law establishing a statute of repose applicable to
8	products other than durable goods or governing a claim
9	that is not specifically covered by this Act. Any claim that
10	is not specifically covered by this Act or involves a product
11	not subject to this Act shall be governed by applicable
12	State law.
13	(d) Transitional Provision Relating to Exten-
14	SION OF REPOSE PERIOD.—To the extent that this Act
15	shortens the period during which a civil action could be
16	otherwise brought pursuant to another provision of law,
17	the claimant may, notwithstanding this Act, bring the ac-
18	tion not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment
19	of this Act.
20	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
21	In this Act:
22	(1) CLAIMANT.—The term "claimant" means
23	any person who brings an action covered by this Act
24	and any person on whose behalf such an action is
25	brought. If such an action is brought through or on

1	behalf of an estate, the term includes the claimant's
2	decedent. If such an action is brought through or on
3	behalf of a minor or incompetent, the term includes
4	the claimant's legal guardian.
5	(2) Durable good.—The term "durable good"
6	means any product, or any component of any such
7	product, which—
8	(A)(i) has a normal life expectancy of 3 or
9	more years; or
10	(ii) is of a character subject to allowance
11	for depreciation under the Internal Revenue
12	Code of 1986; and
13	(B) is—
14	(i) used in a trade or business;
15	(ii) held for the production of income;
16	or
17	(iii) sold or donated to a governmental
18	or private entity for the production of
19	goods, training, demonstration, or any
20	other similar purpose.
21	(3) State.—The term "State" means any
22	State of the United States, the District of Columbia,
23	the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Northern
24	Mariana Islands, the Virgin Islands, Guam, Amer-
25	ican Samoa, and any other territory or possession of

- 1 the United States or any political subdivision of any
- 2 of the foregoing.

### 3 SEC. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE; APPLICATION OF ACT.

- 4 (a) Effective Date.—Except as provided in sub-
- 5 section (b), this Act shall take effect on the date of the
- 6 enactment of this Act without regard to whether the dam-
- 7 age to property or death or personal injury at issue oc-
- 8 curred before such date of enactment.
- 9 (b) APPLICATION OF ACT.—This Act shall not apply
- 10 with respect to civil actions commenced before the date
- 11 of the enactment of this Act.
