

DFC Grant Opportunities Now Open

The Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) recently announced it is now accepting grant applications for both the Drug Free Communities Support Program (DFC) and the Drug Free Communities Mentoring Program.

DFC grants will award up to \$125,000 per year, for five years, to community coalitions working to prevent youth substance abuse. Coalitions must have been in existence for at least six months, address multiple drugs, and receive support from volunteers in twelve community sectors identified by ONDCP (including schools, business, media, law enforcement, and health care). Approximately 150 applications will be funded through the \$18.75 million

available. The deadline to apply for a DFC grant is March 19, 2010.

DFC Mentoring grants will award up to \$75,000, per year, for two years, to help existing DFC coalitions offer guidance to start-up coalitions in nearby communities. Approximately \$1.1 million is available and is expected to fund 15 new Mentoring grants. To be eligible, a mentoring coalition must have been in existence for at least five years; be a current DFC grantee or grantee applicant; have achieved measurable results in youth rug and alcohol prevention; and have dedicated staff, volunteers. or members to assist the mentee coalition. Communities seeking to be mentored must demonstrate the ability to garner community support from

local key sectors and stakeholders, including youth, parents, businesses, media, law enforcement, government, and religious and civic organizations. DFC mentoring grants are awarded through a competitive peer review process. The deadline to submit a DFC Mentoring grant application is Friday, April 23, 2010.

Both applications will be awarded through a competitive, peer-reviewed process and are administered by ONDCP in partnership with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). 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Oakland County Coalitions Coming Together

On Friday, February 5, 2010 at the Modern Skate & Surf in Royal Oak, 8 Coalitions from around Oakland County came together to host "Youth Advocacy Day" bringing youth together to talk about issues they face and methods to implement change in the community.

The coalitions who were represented are: Royal Oak Community Coalition, Troy Community Coalition, Tri-Community Coalition, Madison Heights Coalition Family Coalition, North Oakland Coalition, Greater

West Bloomfield Coalition, Birmingham/Bloomfield Coalition, and Alliance of Coalitions for Healthy Communities (ACHC). Approximately 300 students, coalition leaders, parents, community leaders, and elected officials came together to support this event.

Kent Roberts, a nationally known facilitator from the National Civility Center led Café Style discussions which gave youth the opportunity to voice their concerns to adults regarding issues they considered important. After the discussions commenced, Miss Michigan, Nicole Blaszczyk delivered the keynote speech in which she discussed the importance of self empowerment and living a healthy lifestyle.

The youth also had the opportunity to view demonstrations by professional skateboarders and BMX bikers, experience an obstacle course from the National Guard, and music by Magic Firewater and The Jam Society.


