- 19 The subcommittee met, pursuant to call, at 10:06
- 20 a.m., in Room 2141, Rayburn House Office Building, Hon.
- 21 Elton Gallegly [chairman of the subcommittee] presiding.
- 22 Present: Representatives Gallegly, Poe, Lofgren, and
- 23 Pierluisi.

- Mr. Gallegly. Good morning.
- At this time, pursuant to notice, the chair calls up
- 27 for consideration the adoption of the Rules of Procedure
- 28 and Statement of Policy for Private Immigration Bills and
- 29 the Policy on Granting of Federal Charters.
- The primary focus of the rule is to establish the
- 31 standard requirements for the consideration of private
- 32 immigration bills, which are essentially a request to
- 33 circumvent current law. Without these statements, the
- 34 Congress could potentially be inundated with requests for
- 35 private bills.
- 36 The subcommittee will also consider adoption of the
- 37 policy of not granting new Federal charters to private,
- 38 not-for-profit organizations. This policy has been adopted
- 39 by the subcommittee of jurisdiction since the 101st
- 40 Congress, and it reflects the subcommittee's belief that
- 41 charters are unnecessary for the operations of any
- 42 charitable organization and falsely imply to the public
- 43 that an organization and its activities carry congressional
- 44 seal of approval.
- This policy also reflects the subcommittee's belief
- 46 that significant resources required to properly investigate
- 47 prospective chartered organizations and monitor them could
- 48 and should be spent instead of subcommittee's large range
- 49 of policy matters. These are the same rules and statement
- 50 of policy that we had in the last Congress. They have
- 51 served us well, and I recommend that we adopt them again in
- 52 the 112th Congress.
- I would now recognize the ranking member for any

- 54 statement she may have.
- Ms. Lofgren. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- Indeed, these rules are the same as those that guided
- 57 the subcommittee in the last Congress. I agree with
- 58 readopting these rules.
- I would ask unanimous consent to put my statement in
- 60 the record and would merely note that in the last Congress,
- 61 some of our colleagues on both sides of the aisle
- 62 circumvented the charter rule through floor action, with
- 63 the best motives in the world, I understand. But I think
- 64 the subcommittee should counsel our colleagues that that is
- 65 contrary to our policy, and the policy is rooted in sound
- 66 rationale so that we don't experience a raft of that again.
- But that is really something we need to do off
- 68 calendar. And with that, I would yield back with thanks.
- 69 Mr. Gallegly. Does the gentlelady have a unanimous
- 70 consent request to have all of the statements made a part
- 71 of the record and rather than taking oral testimony this
- 72 morning?
- 73 Ms. Lofgren. As to the private bills that are before
- 74 us?
- 75 Mr. Gallegly. Right.
- 76 Ms. Lofgren. I would, in fact, move that reports be
- 77 requested from the department on each of the bills and ask
- 78 unanimous consent to put my statement in the record on each
- 79 of the bills.
- Mr. Gallegly. Without objection, that will be the
- 81 order for all Members.
- [The information follows:]

83 Mr. Gallegly. Copies of the proposed rules are before

- 84 each Member. Without objection, the rules will be
- 85 considered as read and open for amendment at any point.
- 86 If there are no amendments, the question on adopting
- 87 the Rules of Procedure and Statement of Policy for Private
- 88 Immigration Bills and Policy on the Granting of Federal
- 89 Charters. I assume there are no amendments.
- 90 All those in favor will signify by saying aye.
- 91 [A chorus of ayes.]
- 92 Mr. Gallegly. Those opposed, no.
- 93 [No response.]
- 94 Mr. Gallegly. The motion passes.
- 95 And is there a roll call on the question?
- 96 Okay. I would now like to turn to the matter of
- 97 requesting reports from the Department of Homeland Security
- 98 for the potential beneficiaries of several private bills:
- 99 H.R. 316, for the relief of Esther Karinge; H.R. 357, for
- 100 the relief of Corina De Chalup Turcinovic; H.R. 794, for
- 101 the relief of Allan Bolor Kelley; H.R. 823, for the relief
- 102 of Maria Carmen Castro Ramirez and J. Refugio Carreno
- 103 Rojas; and H.R. 824, for the relief of Daniel Wachira.
- I will support formally requesting a Department of
- 105 Homeland Security report on the beneficiaries of these five
- 106 private bills. However, I want to make it clear that I am
- 107 still gathering additional information related to a number
- 108 of the bills. And until I get the facts, I will hold off
- on making a decision on moving forward with these measures
- 110 until we receive the reports.
- I would ask that the written statements regarding

these private bills by unanimous consent for both the chair and the ranking member be made a part of the record, or the written record, as they are exactly the same as last year. [The information follows:]

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117 Mr. Gallegly. And the motion would be to waive Rule 4

- 118 of our Rules of Procedure for Private Immigration Bills and
- 119 Requests for these private bills.
- 120 Is there a motion?
- 121 Ms. Lofgren. There is a motion to do that, and I
- 122 would ask unanimous consent to place my statements on
- 123 behalf of these bills in the record and note also that
- 124 these are matters that the committee acted on last year, as
- 125 the chair has referenced.
- 126 And we will receive information and continue to
- 127 evaluate them, noting that because the Senate operates
- 128 under rules different than our own, we have been
- 129 unsuccessful in adopting even those matters that the House
- 130 believes are worthy. So that is another matter that we may
- 131 wish to discuss off calendar.
- 132 And with that, I would yield back to the chair.
- 133 Mr. Galleqly. In relation to the unanimous consent
- order, hearing no objection, that will be the order.
- 135 Is there any further debate on the motion?
- [No response.]
- 137 Mr. Gallegly. Seeing none, all of those in favor, say
- 138 aye.
- [A chorus of ayes.]
- 140 Mr. Gallegly. Any opposed, say no.
- [No response.]
- 142 Mr. Gallegly. Hearing the ayes have it, the motion is
- 143 approved.
- And we will move on now with our hearing.
