

PETE STARK'S LEGISLATIVE REPORT



FIGHTING FOR CALIFORNIA HOMEOWNERS

alifornia's housing market has been in serious decline for far too long. Data released by RealtyTrac, which compiles housing data, show that one in every 226 housing units in California had a foreclosure filing during August 2011 alone. That's more than twice the national average.

What's more, California's situation appears to be worsening; we've seen a 55 percent increase in foreclosures between July and August—the second highest in the country.

Congress and the Obama Administration need to provide more meaningful solutions for homeowners in California and nationwide.

On October 11th, Democrats in the California Delegation sent a letter to President Obama urging him to take some common sense actions that would help families keep their homes. In particular, homeowners have struggled with systemic problems with financial institutions' handling of mortgages and the foreclosure process. We need to fix the housing market in order to get our economy moving.

We've asked the President to:

- Urge Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to allow homeowners to refinance their mortgages and take advantage of historically low rates.
- Take steps to meaningfully reduce principal for underwater mortgages, including improving the bankruptcy process to give homeowners more leverage in dealing with banks.
- Institute a "Homeowner's Bill of Rights" to level the playing field for homeowners going through modification programs.

The President recently announced new steps the administration is taking that will make it easier for some homeowners with mortgages owned by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac to refinance their mortgages and lower their monthly payments. These changes will help more Californians remain in their homes, but far more action is needed. Homeowners can't wait any longer.

BLOCKING THE ASSAULT ON OUR ENVIRONMENT

ongress has already taken more than 170 votes this year that would undermine our nation's environmental protections and roll back action to combat climate change.

Instead of working to solve the problems facing families struggling to make ends meet, the House

Majority has spent precious time attempting to block the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from enforcing the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act. At nearly every turn, they've also inserted anti-environmental policy riders into annual appropriations bills.



Micromanaging the EPA is not where Congress' focus should be.

One bill, H.R. 2250, would nullify EPA rules on toxic air pollution from large industrial boilers and incinerators.

Another bill, H.R. 2681, would block the EPA from implementing rules on mercury pollution from cement kilns—the second largest source of mercury pollution in the country. Mercury is a dangerous neuro-toxin that damages brain development in children. Yet another bill, H.R. 2401, would delay the EPA from finalizing rules regarding mercury pollution from power plants. I strongly opposed all of these bills.

Thankfully, these bills have little chance of becoming law. Although these measures passed the

> House, they are extremely unlikely to even be considered by the Senate, and the President has issued veto threats against them all.

> Environmental protections have a long history of bipartisan support in our country. The Clean Air Act and the creation of the EPA oc-

curred during the Nixon presidency. President Ford signed the Safe Drinking Water Act and President George Bush Senior strengthened the Clean Air Act to reduce acid rain. We should continue this tradition of working together to protect our environment.

We do not need to choose between a strong economy and clean air and water. Laws such as the Clean Water Act and the Clean Air Act have served our nation well in good and bad economic times. I will keep working to help restore that bipartisan approach to environmental protection.
