#### Executive Summary

#### **Introduction:**

North Carolina suffered weak economic growth and sharp job losses from 2001-2003 but has since rebounded. Economic growth and job creation in NC over the past three years was stronger than the US average. Yet all net new private sector jobs created over the past seven years in NC have been in health care and education. These industries provide little productivity growth, pay lower wages than the manufacturing jobs that are being lost, export little but do not face significant import competition or outsourcing.

The state's per capita income rank among the 50 states fell from 31st in 2001 to 36th in 2006, -11% lower than the US average. Growth of per capita income in NC ranked 44th last year, barely ahead of US price increases. Like the rest of the US, NC is producing and earning far less than it is spending, importing to make up for the production shortfall, piling up worsening record levels of asset sales and debt obligations.

Worsening record trade deficits reduced US GDP in every year from 1995 to 2006 although the overall deficit is improving in 2007. Although US GDP growth was far slower than world growth, the US will accumulated over \$4.3 Trillion in Current Account trade deficits between 2001 and the end of 2007. Some theorists claim that importing what others can produce more cheaply allows a country to concentrate on what it makes best, the sales of which will pay for imports, raising living standards for all. But chronic and massive US deficits (including for technology) and borrowing show that the world is now more complex.

China is, by far, the largest single source of these massive deficits, accounting for about one-third of the total and rising. With it's global Current Account surplus soaring to 9.4% of GDP in 2006, China's double-digit growth and trade surplus has accelerated each year since 2001 allowing the buildup of \$1.4 Trillion in foreign currency reserves. Unlike Japan of 20 years ago, China's successful industrial policies have drawn virtually every major transnational corporation to build modern operations and products in China, usually in joint venture with Chinese state-owned firms. Now the world's leading manufacturing center, China's current, 11th 5-Year Plan forcefully targets home grown innovation, with its own giant companies and brands in all fields including professional services and finance. The state-owned Industrial and Commercial Bank of China recently passed Citigroup as the world's most highly capitalized bank.

- North Carolina and the US have grown slower than the world economy since 2001 while China has grown almost three times faster.
- The US services trade surplus with China remains in the range of \$2-to-\$3 billion per year while the US now has a services trade deficit of about \$1 billion per year with Hong Kong.
- China accounts for almost half the recent US' manufacturing trade deficits of over \$500 billion per year as the US pays over \$6 for imports manufactured in China for each \$1 earned from exports to China.
- Despite record consumer borrowing, the growth of US manufacturing output during the current economic expansion is the weakest on record even including periods of double-dip recession.
- Since 2001, the US manufacturing trade deficit with China has been concentrated in machinery and electronics not in textiles, apparel, shoes and toys.
- Beginning in 2002, the US lost its traditional global trade surplus in Advanced Technology Products that includes modern technology products from jumbo jets to computers and semiconductors.
- The overwhelming source of the US ATP trade deficit is China with a deficit now nine times larger than with Japan.
- US payments for imports of ATP products made in China outweigh US export earnings \$4-to-\$1.
- Aside from large passenger jets -- which China has targeted for its own development -- soybeans, raw cotton, pulp wood, copper and hides are the major net exports from the US to China.
- State export data can be misleading because it refers only to where the entire final product began its export journey but these data show China as North Carolina's fourth largest market with 6.3%.
- State export data show North Carolina's main exports to the world and to China are chemicals, computers/parts and machinery.
- Import data do not exist but state export data for goods show that exports account for 5.7% of North Carolina's GDP, and that percentage has generally been rising in recent years.
- North Carolina's goods exports to China jumped in 2006 to 0.4% of the state's GDP.
- Using the state export data and allocating all US imports among the states based on percentage of population, suggests that 48 states have global trade deficits and that North Carolina's trade deficit in 2006 was \$33.8 billion -- one and one-half the size of all reported state exports.
- Allocating both US goods imports and exports to states based on population suggests that North Carolina's goods trade deficit with China in 2006 was about \$6.9 billion displacing the production from over 54,000 jobs or about 5,700 more jobs than were displaced in 2005.
- Over the past seven years, North Carolina has created 176,000 net new jobs -- 121,000 in the private sector and 55,000 in federal, state and local government agencies. The private education and health care industry added 131,000 jobs during the period, more than accounting for all private sector job growth while leisure/hospitality added 61,000 jobs and manufacturing lost 216,000.
- Compensation for employment in the manufacturing sector was 128% of North Carolina's average in 2005 while compensation for private education and health care is 77% and 91%, respectively, and compensation in the leisure/hospitality sector is far less.
- Although manufacturing continues to lose jobs in the state, overall job growth in North Carolina in 2007 is well ahead of the US average.
- Per capita income in North Carolina fell to 36th among the 50 states in 2006 and rose by only 3.8%, barely above the 3.2% rise in prices nationwide.
- Personal, business and government debt has exploded in the US in recent years and current household savings have plunged to their lowest levels since 1933.


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
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# Economic Growth During Last 6 Years US Growth Half the World Pace, China 3 Times As Fast




## Over -\$5.2 Trillion of US Losses Since 1994





### **Global Current Account Balances**


%: Annual Current Account Balances % of GDP for the US and China


## **US Trade Balance With China**



\$ Billions Per Year: Manufacturing Trade




# **US Manufacturing Trade Deficits With China Worsening Much Faster than with other Countries**

% of US Manufacturing Deficit Attributed to China




2001-'07: Has Weaker Manufacturing Growth even than 1970-'76 and 1980-'86 % Change of Manufacturing Output From End of Recession



# **US Trade Deficits With China**The Rapidly Changing Composition


\$ Billions: Annual US Balance in Trade Goods


Surpluses Through 2001; Deficits Every Year Since

\$ Billion: Annual US Global Trade Balance in ATP




# China is the Dominant Source of new US Tech Deficit US ATP Deficit with China Now Nine Times The Deficit With Japan




# North Carolina's Job Growth

# North Carolina's Manufacturing Job Decline



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


\$ Trillions: Total Personal, Business and Government Debt, Financial AND Non-Financial


% of GDP: Total Personal, Business and Government Debt, Financial AND Non-Financial
