20	\$999,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2017.

2	For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
3	of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
4	office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant,
5	\$17,152,000, of which $$7,300,000$ shall remain available

9	and operation of the House office buildings, \$83,964,000,

1	(b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with

6	For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
7	not otherwise provided for, including development and
8	maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-

11	motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation
12	and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the
13	Library; activities under the Civil Rights History Project
14	Act of 2009; preparation and distribution of catalog
15	records and other publications of the Library; hire or pur-
16	chase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the
17	Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly
18	chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the
19	Board, \$422,024,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000

20	\$52,136,000, of which not more than \$28,029,000, to re-

24	vided, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-
25	pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-
