In 2007, I had the great privilege of commemorating my 20th year of service to our great city of San Francisco as your Representative in Congress, while taking the gavel as the first woman Speaker of the House of Representatives.

PROTECTING SAN FRANCISCO BAY -RESPONSE TO OIL SPILL

On November 19, I joined Mayor Gavin Newsom, House Transportation and Infrastructure subcommittee Chairman Elijah Cummings and Bay Area Members of Congress at a field hearing in the Presidio to examine the effects of the recent oil spill in the San Francisco Bay.

I have asked the Inspector General of the Department of Homeland Security to begin an investigation of the Coast Guard response to this spill so we can understand what happened and be better prepared for another environmental disaster. The Coast Guard must be held accountable for any delays in responding to the spill and delays in reporting the severity of the spill to local officials. The people of the Bay Area should have confidence that the responsible parties will be held accountable for their actions and that mistakes made in response to disasters of this kind will not happen again.

AMERICA A NEW DIRECTION FOR AMERICA

IN OUR first year of the 110th Congress, we are taking our country in a New Direction worthy of the sacrifice of our troops, the vision of our founding fathers and the aspirations of our children:

MAKING AMERICA SAFER

We have made America safer with the passage and enactment into law of HR 1:

- ➤ Requiring 100% screening of air cargo
- ➤ Requiring 100% screening of cargo containers before they reach U.S. soil
- > Basing anti-terrorism funding to cities and states on risk, not on political boundaries
- ➤ Improving emergency communications among first responders
- > Strengthening information sharing with local law enforcement to prevent potential terrorist attacks
- Taking aggressive steps to prevent terrorists from acquiring weapons of mass destruction

ENERGY SECURITY AND REDUCING GLOBAL WARMING

The Energy Independence and Security Act makes the largest investment ever in homegrown biofuels and renewable energy sources, which will reduce our dependence on foreign oil. It provides groundbreaking provisions to increase fuel economy standards to 35 miles per gallon by 2020 for new cars and trucks. It will train a workforce for "green" collar jobs. And the landmark fuel efficiency standards and energy efficiency provisions will not only save consumers money, but will significantly reduce carbon dioxide emissions.

STRENGTHENING OUR ECONOMY

The New Direction Congress passed the first increase in the minimum wage in 10 years as part of the broader goal of growing our economy and providing greater opportunity for all Americans. When the law takes full effect, the annual pay for a minimum-wage worker will increase by \$4,400 per year. The benefits of the pay raise will be felt by more than 13 million American workers, in addition to more than 6 million children of low-wage workers.

SUPPORTING INNOVATION

As the first major piece of the Innovation Agenda, Congress passed the America COMPETES Act to turn ideas into innovative technologies in order to boost our economy and create good-paying American jobs. The legislation addresses the technology gap in our workforce, expands the number of highly qualified math, science and technology teachers, and puts us on a path to double the funding for research at the National Science Foundation, the National Institute of Standards and Technology, and the Department of Energy.

COLLEGE AFFORDABILITY

This Congress passed the single largest investment in college financial assistance since the GI Bill. In recent years, the cost of attending college has increased so significantly that hundreds of thousands of high school students are prevented from attending college. The College Cost Reduction Act cuts student loan interest rates in half, increases Pell Grant amounts and forgives loans for graduates who devote 10 years to certain public service.

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COMMUNITY-BASED CARE

FIGHTING FOR SAN FRANCISCO HIV/AIDS FUNDING

This year, I worked to ensure a significant increase for the Ryan White Program, which provides resources for HIV/AIDS-related medical care and support services. This increase would both reduce previous harmful cuts and provide increases for a number of cities. Even after \$8 million was provided to reduce cuts in nine cities, including San Francisco, a \$15 million increase still remained for the other 45 cities that qualify for Ryan White assistance. This \$15 million is the largest increase in seven years.

For San Francisco, the agreement restores \$4.8 million of the \$8.5 million cut announced by the Bush Administration earlier this year. Although San Francisco developed the model of community-based care that served as the basis for the Ryan White CARE Act, our needs are still severe. AIDS continues to be the city's second-leading cause of premature death, and over 15,000 San Franciscans are currently living with HIV/AIDS - more than at any point in the history of the epidemic.

HONORING OUR COMMITMENT TO OUR VETERANS

The 110th Congress has voted for historic increases in veterans' health care and benefits programs to meet the needs of returning veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan, make up for past shortchanging of veterans, and keep the President's proposed fee increases from affecting veterans.

In December, the New Direction Congress passed legislation that provides \$43.1 billion for veterans' services, including health care – \$3.7 billion more that the President requested. We have an obligation to care for and honor America's service men and women, their families, and our veterans for their bravery and sacrifice. The New Direction Congress has proven our commitment by providing the largest increase in funding for veterans' health care in the VA's 77-year history. The historic investment adds to the \$5.2 billion for veterans provided by the new Congress earlier this year to strengthen health care for more than 5 million veterans.
