Mr. Charles Peterson;

Thank you for answering my call with your letter. I was real glad that I caught you in when I called last month. As I told you on the phone, I think about my days at Camp Lejeune pretty often. My experience there and especially your letter of recommendation, were two very big contributing factors for me getting my job. I am sorry that it has taken me so long in thanking you for writing that letter, but I am very grateful and do thank you very much.

One of the good things about waiting so long is that I can tell you about how I am getting along on the job and how much I enjoy it. First let me tell you about getting the job. When I first got back to Indiana I made a call to the Dept. of Natural Resources and they told me that my name would be put on a waiting list and they would call me when they were going to hire more Conservation Officers. Well, about a year latter I recieved a letter from them to come to Indianapolis to take a test. I went to Indianapolis along with 500 other ambitious young men. They told us that through a process of elimination that only 14 would be sent to training. They also told us what our pay was going to be and that made a few get up and leave. Sometimes when I get my check I think I would have been better off if I would have followed suit. But, that is another story. Well as you know I made it through the process and was sent to school. Our training consists of three weeks of almost boot camp all over again. The school is put on by our own Dept. with different Divisions (11) personel teaching us what to look for while we are out in the field. Due to recent legislation concerning Enforcement Schools in Indiana our school lasts 4 weeks. Out of the 14 that started the school 9 of us graduated, and if I may be permitted to brag a little bit I graduated first in the class.

My assignment was to Porter county. It is located in the north west corner of the state, the north border of which is Lake Michigan. The past two summers I have been spending most of my time patrolling the Lake in a 28' cabin cruiser (Marimette). We have pleasure boating laws that we enforce and also fishing laws, of course, commercial and sport fishing. This year I will be in charge of the enforcement of the Indiana Dunes State Park. I will have seven Park Patrolmen working for me. Some of the older officers don't like Park duty, they would rather stay out in the field and be "Game Wardens". Personally I enjoy all phases of my work from tromping through the woods and along streams to fighting the Hippies at the Park. And I do mean fighting, by being this close to Chicago we get all sorts of this type of "riff raff".

For information sake we have a salmon stocking program going on up here. We are going into our fourth year. This year our fishermen have enjoyed catching salmon anywhere from 2 lbs. to 30 lbs. next year we expect to be catching up to 50 pounders.

Also, as I told you on the phone we have a Wild Turkey program. That is going on in the southern part of the state and so I don't have too much information on that. I do know that this is the third year for hunting them, the first year they only allowed 300 hunters, the next year 600 and this year it was open to anyone who wanted to apply for a permit. If you want any more information about our program I can get you the name of the Biologist in charge and I'm sure he would be happy to correspond with you on the subject.

Well, I guell I have bent your ear about long enough. I am enclosing the regulations you requested. These are the pamphlets that we pass out to the public, if you would like I could send you our regular Fish and Wildlife Code and Regulations books. They go into a little more detail than the pamphlets do.

One more thing, if you ever happen to run into the Gunny say Hellowfor me. Oh yes, so far I haven't caught any fox yet, the weather son't cooperate with me.

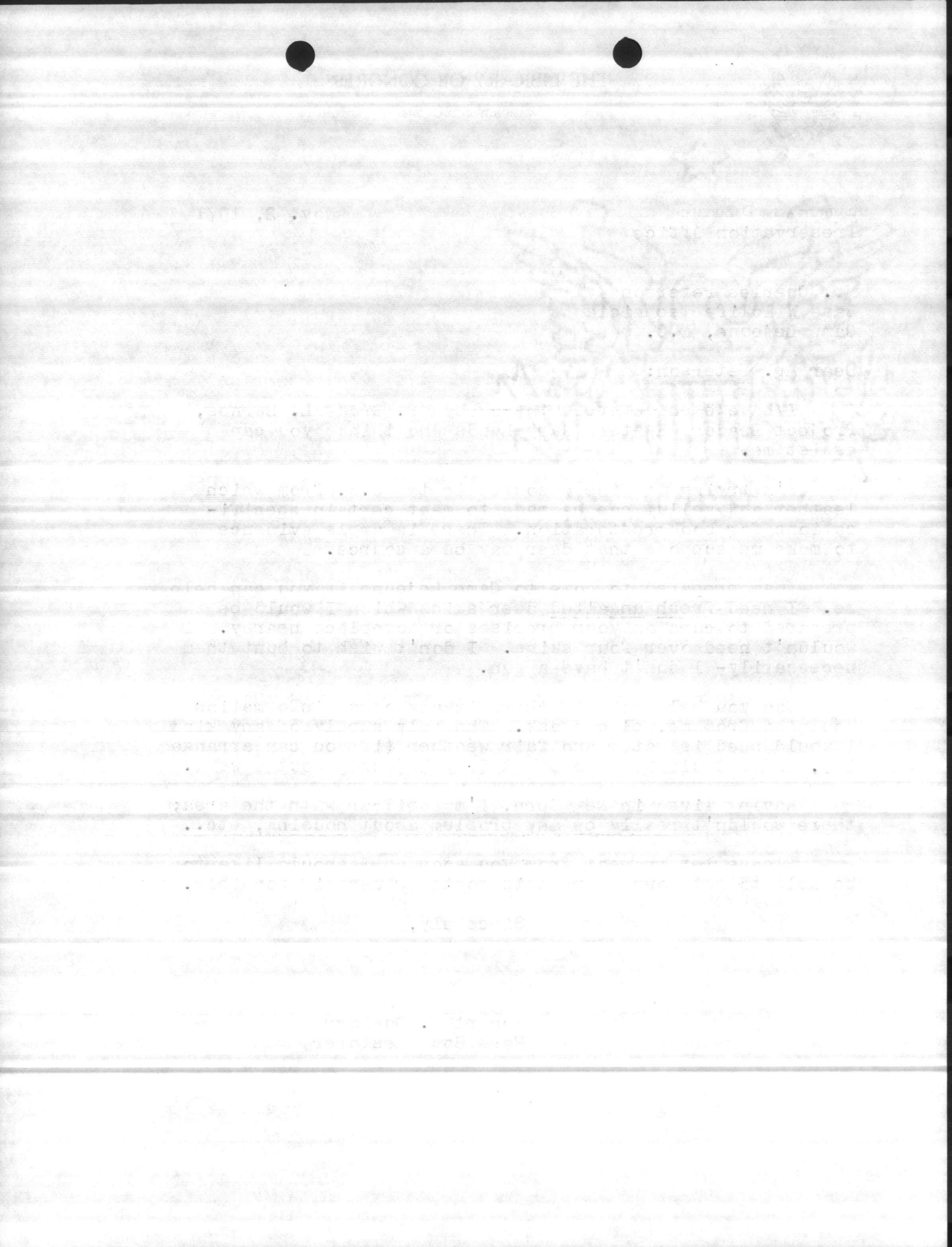

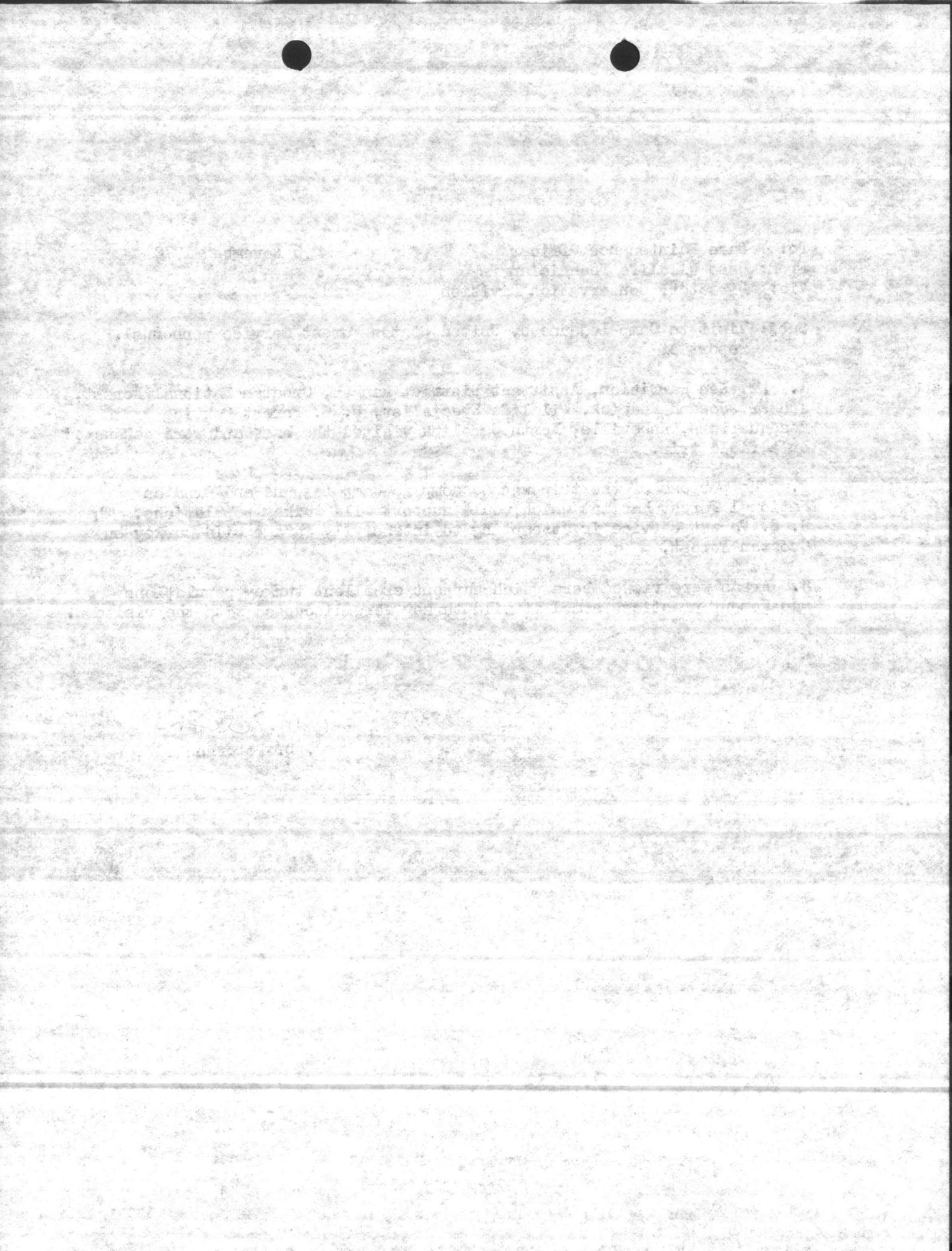

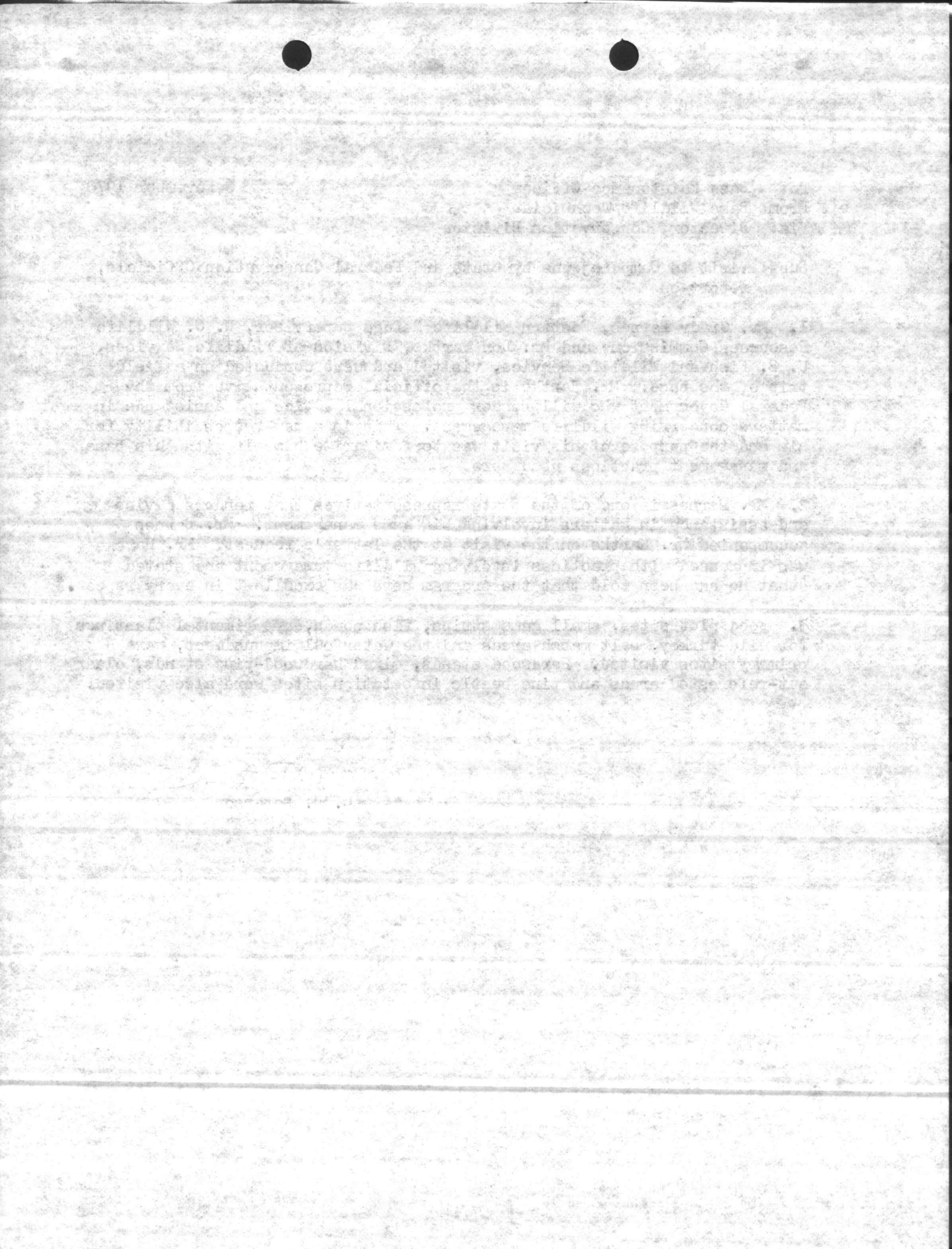

1. Mr. Grady Barnes, Eastern Wildlife Refuge Supervisor, N. C. Wildlife Resources Commission, and Mr. Don Hartke, Division of Wildlife Services, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, visited and were conducted on a field trip of the base. Mr. Hartke is the official representative from the Federal Government who will render professional advice and assistance in matters concerning wildlife management. This is a new responsibility for him and the purpose of his visit was to familiarize himself with this base and management practices used here.
2. Mr. Barnes is one of the State representatives that renders advice and assistance in matters involving big game management. Mr. Barnes accompanied Mr. Hartke on the visit at the latter's request. Mr. Hartke was impressed with practices involving wildlife management and stated "that he had been told that the program here was excellent in every respect."
3. Food plot sites, small game strips, fish ponds, ~~experimental~~ plantings for wild turkey, salt marsh areas and the waterfowl impoundment, were primary sites visited. Hardwood stands, mixed hardwood-pine stands, clear out-reforested areas and pine beetle infestation sites were also visited.

I noticed your request for comments in the Newsletter concerning reproduction of wild turkey this year and decided to send you the following information pertinent to the Camp Lejeune flock.

I believe that the juvenile population at this time is about 85 percent of the total brood hatch. Most broods sighted average from seven to ten juveniles when with a mature hen.

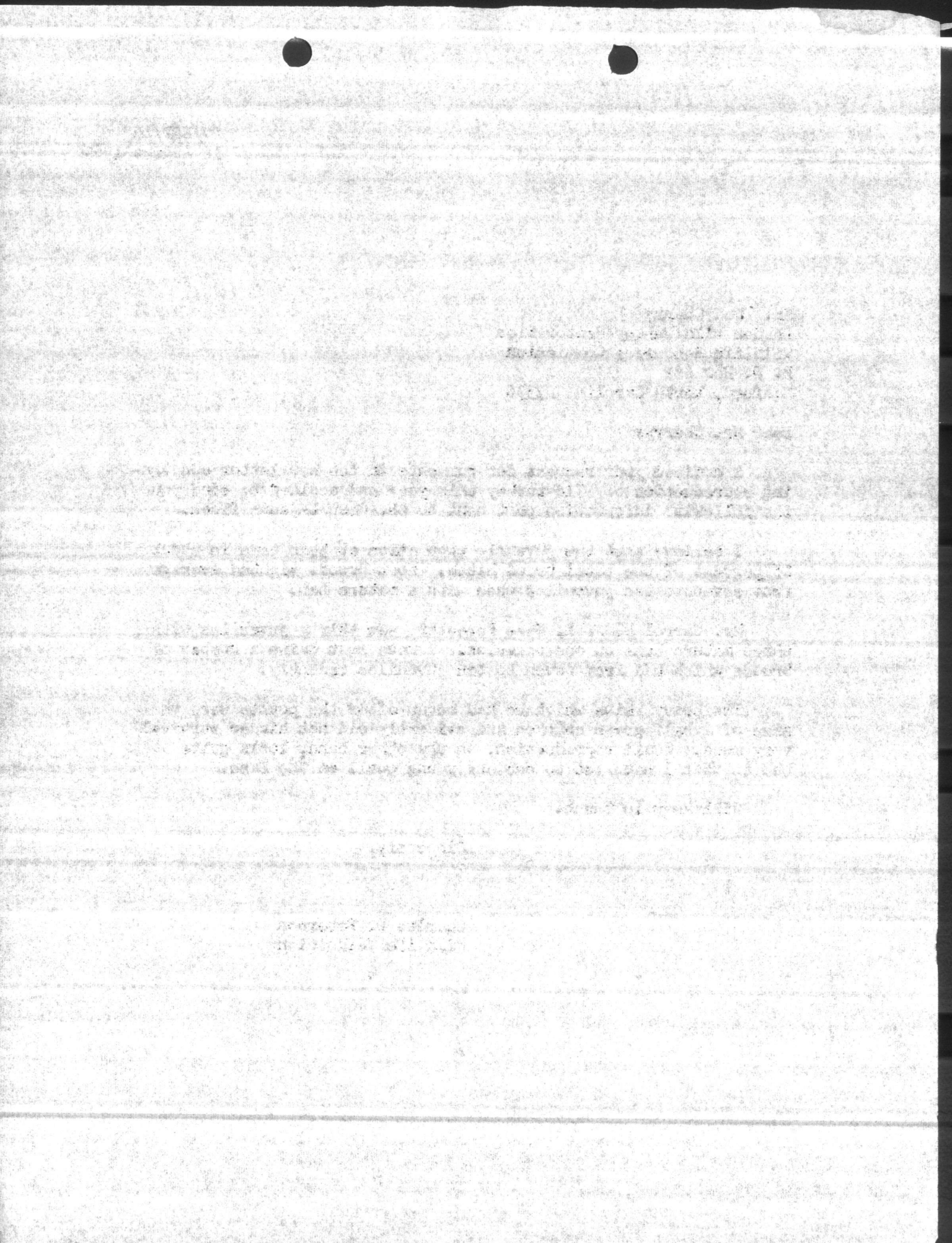
Mr. Carrol RUSSELL, Base Forester, saw thirty juveniles with three mature hens on one occasion. I have seen quite a number of broods which had from seven to ten juveniles recently.

The heavy rains which we had began after the poults were the size of a half grown chicken and evidently did not hinder survival very much. Quail reproduction, on the other hand, looks quite bad in that I have yet to see any young quail on the Base.

Civilian personnel are also referred to the U. S. Commissioner. However, in all instances, administrative action may be taken by the Provost Marshal to suspend or revoke their base hunting and/or fishing privileges.

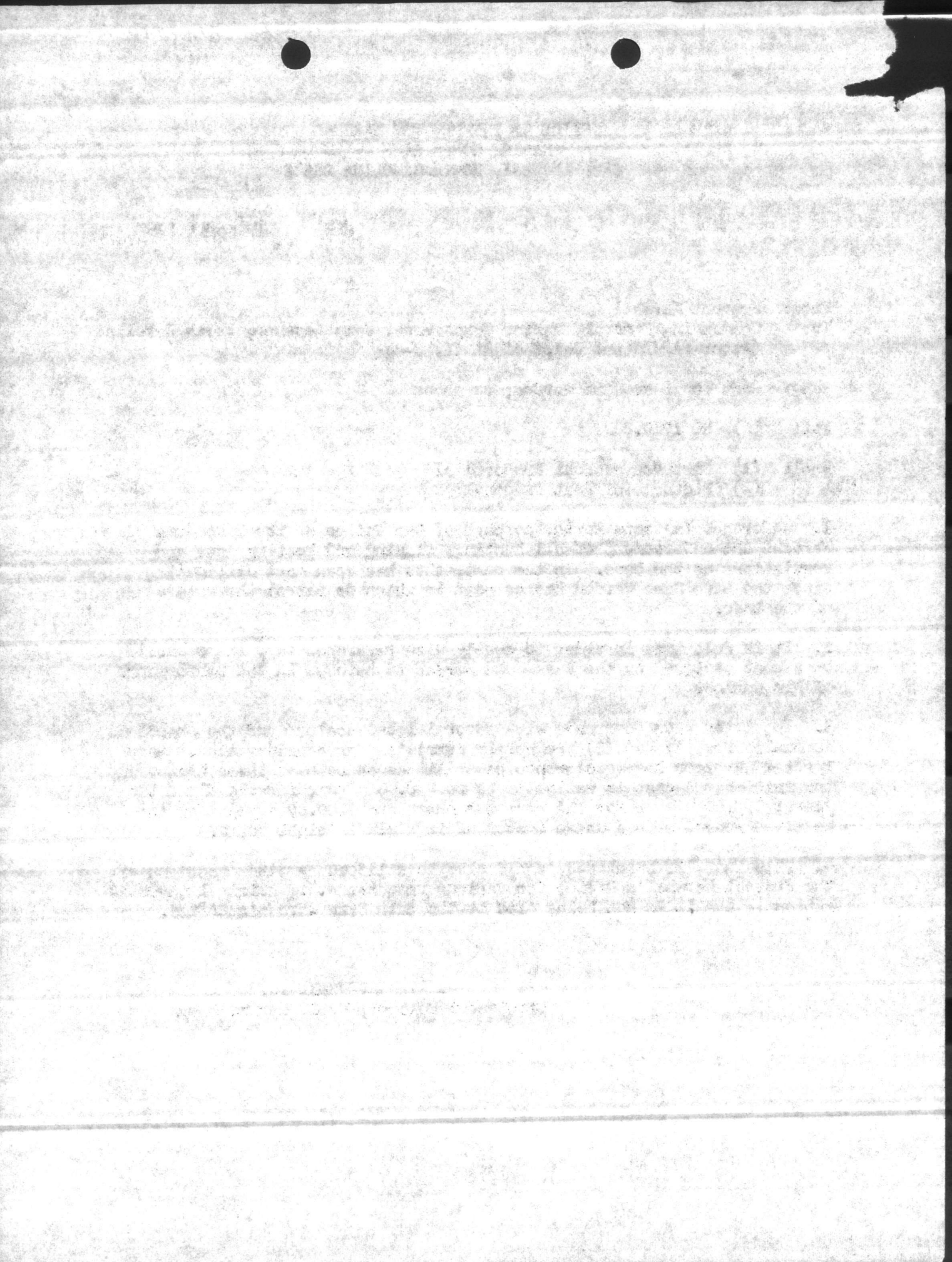
1. Reference (a) sets forth, as part of the duties of the Base Game Warden, the enforcement of all hunting, fishing and boating laws and regulations on the base. In the past, this has been most difficult since the Base Game Warden has no boat in which to patrol the waters of the base.

2. It is felt that in order to comply with reference (a), there should be a boat assigned to the Base Game Warden to be used in the performance of his duties.

3. Inquiries have been made with several local dealers and the proposals in enclosures (1) and (2) are hereby submitted for consideration. Base Special Services has maintenance capabilities on both of these boats, and the maintenance cost is estimated to be \$50.00 a year for the first two years; \$75.00 a year for the next two years and \$100.00 a year for the next two years, with a usage factor of from six to eight years.

4. This boat, if purchased, could also be utilized by other sections of the Provost Marshal's Office for various reasons, e.g., criminal investigations, when it is not being used by the Base Game Warden's Office.

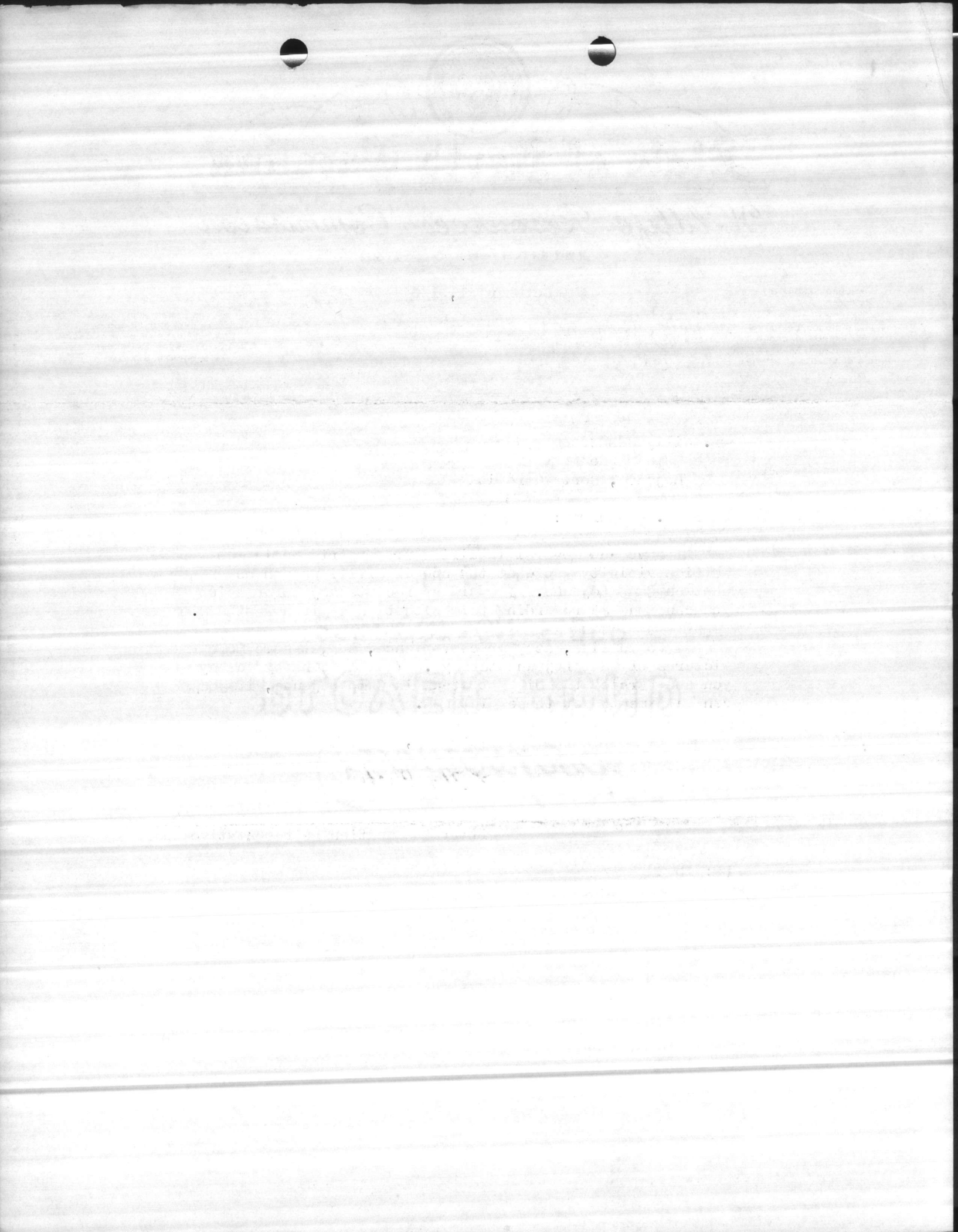

This is in reply to your letter of 19 March 1964 requesting information concerning billet titles and authorized allowances for personnel engaged in game management duties here at Camp Lejeune.

While there is an active and productive wildlife management and conservation program at this Base, the area available for hunting and fishing is small in comparison with that available at Camp Pendleton and no Game Management Section, as such, exists. Instead, there is organized, within the Provost Marshal's office, a Game Warden Section consisting of one (1) Game Law Enforcement Officer (GS-6) and two Assistant Game Wardens (SSgt 8111 and Sgt 0311). As the billet title implies, these personnel are responsible, primarily, for the enforcement of all hunting, fishing, and boating laws and regulations aboard the Base. In addition, this Section is responsible for the issuance and control of Base Hunting/Fishing Permits and for the annual collection of fees therefor (\$2.00 per military and civilian permit issued). Approximately 2,000 such permits were issued last year. During the hunting season, the Game Warden Section is reinforced by the addition of 30-40 military personnel who volunteer for duty as Deputy Game Wardens on weekends and holidays. A maximum of 6-8 Deputy Game Wardens are assigned duties for each hunting day. They work in pairs and are assigned a "jeep" to increase their range and efficiency.

Responsibility for the wildlife conservation program rests, primarily, with Base Maintenance. Here, again, there is no game management or conservation section, as such. Base Maintenance has two full-time Foresters (GS-7 and GS-11), whose primary concern is the conservation, reproduction and harvesting of pulpwood and sawtimbers. In addition, the Forestry Section, with the assistance of 2-3 laborers, clears, plants and maintains wildlife food plots throughout the Base. There are, at present, approximately 200 cleared plots, of which 67 are planted. The Game Warden Section provides considerable assistance in the management and supervision of the food plots and other areas of conservation, particularly during the extended period between hunting seasons, and maintains close and continuous liaison with local and State Game Conservation officials. Our wildlife management and conservation program also receives considerable assistance from an active and enthusiastic Rod and Gun Club membership.

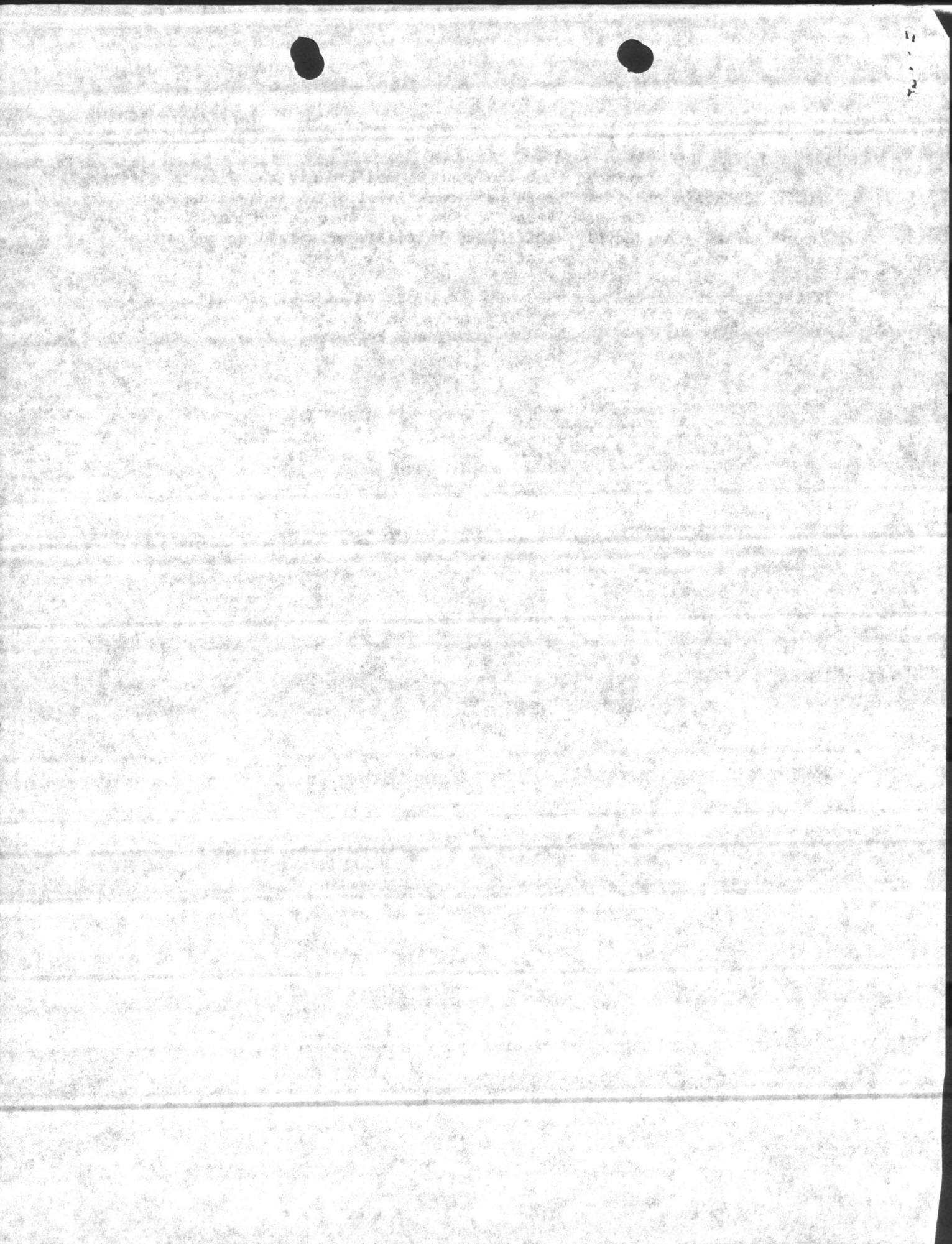
