





EARLY CHOW FOR FLIGHT CREWS

1. Flight crews and personnel requiring early chow because of training obligations, will subsist at the following times:

2. Eating utensils will be provided by the dining facility, with the exception of cups and glass. Ensure that personnel bring their canteen cups to chow with them.

3. Metal trays will be used at the field dining facility. Each tray will be <u>CLEANED</u> by the person who uses it; as follows:

- (a) Place plastic ware and paper trash in first G. I. can.
- (b) Put food waste in second can.
- (c) Dip tray in third can containing cold water to remove most of the food still clinging to tray.
- (d) Scrub tray and canteen cup in fourth can with brush provided. This can will contain hot soapy water.
- (e) The fifth can will contain hot clear water for rinsing.
- (f) The sixth can will contain scalding hot water for sanitizing trays by killing bacteria.

(g) Prior to individual turning in his tray, it will be inspected for cleanliness.

4. At the start of the chowline, there will be a can of hot water to sanitize canteen cups and trays. This will also warm the tray and food will stay warmer longer.

5. The last hot meal is scheduled for breakfast 12 Dec 81.

6. Morning and evening meals will be provided in the field during the period 7 to 11 December 1981. Starting with the evening meal 7 Dec.

7. Personnel on COMRATS and all officers will pay for meals as they are eaten. Meal cards will be required by all other personnel.





1. Medical



2. <u>Dental</u>. Pre- arranged Dental appointments for dates the exercise will be kept by using the shuttle service.






WEAPONS ISSUE AND TURN IN SCHEDULE






OVERVIEW OF EXERCISE

1. Westland Forces. In the last 30 years Westland has become a dominant world power. Everyone, including women, are conscripts. They are trained from 8 years old until 45. The women are used as security forces around the country and within technical fields. In 1955 Westland and five other countries formed the Eastern Alliance to counter the threat of NATO. Under the Alliance each country agrees to defend each other if one is invaded or brought to war. In the past, military strength of the Alliance was judged by Socialist/Military Propaganda rather than by evidence. However, Western observers say the eastern Alliance is no longer a territorial force but a world power. Over the past six years the Westland Army and Air Force has leveled off in growth. The Navy, on the other hand, moved into a rapid expansion. The Navy has built a new Blue Water Fleet which includes nuclear and conventional ships and submarines. The war machine of Westland is a modern and up to date force in every aspect. They can be expected to use both conventional and nuclear weapon systems.

2. Norvia. Since the Second World War Norvia has been under the influence of Westland. Westland had occupied Norvia for a short time. Norvia was given independence in 1945 along with North and South Freeland. The first elections left sympathetic supporters of Westland in power. By early 1950 these supporters had nationalized industry and agriculture. In 1952 as the agriculture had reached an all time low, citizens began to resent Socialist Government and Westland. In 1955 Norvia joined the Eastern Alliance, and requested help from Westland to guell the riots and restore order in the Port City of Norfolk. Westland and Norvian Security Forces crushed the revolts in the late 1950's. In 1964 the Westland troops withdrew from Norvia at the insistance of the Western Alliance. In 1975 the Stalwarts Labor Movement was formed for the common workers. It was ignored until 1975 when it began calling for Nation Wide Strikes. These strikes brought Norvia to an economic halt in the early 1980's. Norvian Government granted unpresidented concessions to the workers to prevent further strikes. However, Westland Army and Air Forces began heavy military manuevers along Norvian borders, with implied intervention into Norvia and to bring Norvia back into socialist form. Norvian forces use the same conventional arms as Westland forces. They are modern and up to date in weapons and tactics.

3. North Freeland and South Freeland. North and South Freeland was granted independance in 1945. They are relatively small in size and can only control thier internal security. They both have border and coastal surveillance, but could not withstand a concentrated effort by a well equipped force from the outside. Offensively it is limited to operations against smaller, more poorly equipped forces. North Freeland contributed a battalion to the UN Peace Keeping Forces in the Middle East. South Freeland had one Mech. infantry regiment and one fighter/group with U. S. Forces in operations in South Vietnam. In North Freeland Political involvement of military personnel is minimal, no active duty personnel may serve in the Government. However, in South Freeland only a handful of active duty military personnel may serve in the Government during a time of war. Both militaries are highly respected by the populace of the respective countries.
