2. Organizational Data

a. Designation and Location. MCAS(H) New River is located in the vicinity of Jacksonville, North Carolina, and is under the military command of the Commandant of the Marine Corps, who exercises his command through the Commander, Marine Corps Air Bases, Eastern Area. The Commandant of the Marine Corps provides primary logistic support for the Air Station and the Commandant, Fifth Naval District is the designated area coordinator. Aircraft, aircraft spares and related aeronautical support equipment logistics is provided by the Chief of Naval Operations and the Chief of Naval Materiel.

b. The assigned mission is to maintain and operate facilities and provide service and materiel to support operations of a Marine Aircraft Wing, or units thereof, and other activities and units as designated by the Commandant of the Marine Corps in coordination with the Chief of Naval Operations.

c. Period Covered. Period covered by this report is 1 January to 30 June 1975.

e. Average Strength. The average monthly strength during this period was 521 personnel. This figure includes officer and enlisted, permanent and attached personnel.

3. Personnel

a. During this period, 109 permanent personnel and 136 FAP personnel were joined. 56 permanent personnel were transferred and 107 FAP personnel terminated.

b. Twenty Marines re-enlisted and 32 Marines were released from active duty/discharged. Seventeen discharged and 6 transferred to FMCR.

(b) During this period 0 employees retired.

- (c) The civilian turnover was 6 separations and 9 accessions.
- * Ceiling adjustment authorized by HQMC includes a loss of one billet (Supply Dept), and a gain of 4 (2 closed microphone reporters and 2 Headquarters, Marine Corps Trainee Billets).

4. Training

a. General

(1) The Training Department is responsible to the MCAS(H) S-3 for providing aviation training to units of the Second Marine Air Wing Stationed at MCAS(H) New River.

(2) Personnel who man the Training Department are also directly responsible to the Commanding Officer of Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron for coordinating and implementing individual training of enlisted Marines which includes Rifle Marksmanship, Physical Fitness Test, Drown Proofing, Pistol Requalification and Familiarization Firing. Further, it monitors the command Weight Control Program, MCI, Essential Subjects Training, SNCO and NCO Leadership Training, and coordinates MOS Training.

b. Individual Training

(1) <u>Rifle Marksmanship</u>. 120 personnel fired for qualification with 91 qualifying and 29 unqualified.

(2) PFT. 337 personnel were administered the test and 16 were not tested. 246 of the personnel tested passed. Out of 91 people, 46 remain on remedial PFT.

(3) Weight Control Program. During this reporting period 30 Marines were placed on the Weight Control Program. At the end of the reporting period all except 8 have been transferred, discharged, or have been released from the program due to satisfactory improvement.

(4) Drown Proofing. At present 73 personnel are unqualified. Lack of qualified swim instructors precluded testing during the past two quarters.

(5) Pistol Regualification

(a) Three out of three officers qualified with T/O weapon 38 Caliber.

(b) 29 SNCO and below fired the Caliber 45/with 29 qualifying.

5. Airfield Operations

a. Crash Crew

(1) Crash Crew Division. The Crash Crew Division has 9 vehicles assigned for aircraft crash fire protection. In addition, two crash vehicles are on loan from MAG-26 and one from MAG-29 and are used to supplement the station equipment.

(2) Crash Crew assisted in, provided service for and accomplished the following during the period 1 January - 30 June 1975.

(a) Aircraft crashes: Three (3)

(b) Aircraft standbys: Sixty five (65)

(c) Manned equipment: The Station Crash Crew spent 2265.0 hrs manning the Hotspot position for landing and departing aircraft and also stood by for 129 defuels, 130 washdowns of fuelspills, plus 31 escorts.

(d) Training: 4487 man hours were spent on Crash Crew Training. Construction was started 6 June 1975 on the Crash Crew training area consisting of an 80 ft. concrete burn pit and 10000 gallon underground fuel storage tank.

b. Aircraft Maintenance

(1) During this period, 1542.3 aircraft flight hours were flown in aircraft assigned for Station Support (tenant helicopter aircraft Groups not included). Total flight time by type aircraft was as follows;

- (c) US-2B-460.1

(2) During this period an average of 257.0 hours per month were flown.

(3) Aircraft transactions were as follows: Aircraft BUNO 136452 was transferred on 7 Jan 75; Aircraft BUNO 137689 transferred on 16 Apr 75; Aircraft BUNO 138300 received on 25 Apr 75; Aircraft BUNO 137689 received on 22 May 75. (4) Operational Readiness Report is as follows:

c. Flight Support

(1) The Flight Support Division supported an average of 55 pilots from 2d MarDiv, 2d ANGLICO, and H&HS New River. This support entailed 2931.8 pilot hours on 674 proficiency or logistic flights on the average of eight (8) aircraft assigned to this Station. This section also renewed eleven (11) Standard and four (4) Special Instrument Cards.

d. Weather Service Division

(1) Weather Service Division maintains a 24 hour daily forecaster and observational program, with forecasts produced and disseminated locally and observations transmitted via Air Force Teletype Circuit plus local dissemination.

(a) A total of 646 IFR, 579 VFR and 237 Local flight forecasts were issued; in addition, 74 destructive weather warnings were disseminated to parent and tenant commands at MCAS(H) and Camp Lejeune.

(b) Monthly Climatological, Astronomical, and Tidal Data was computed and published for use at the Air Station and Camp Lejeune.

(c) Blast Focus Forecasts were prepared and disseminated on a daily basis to Camp Lejeune G-2 Training, Range Control and Cherry Point TACC.

e. Air Traffic Control Division

(1) Air Traffic Operations. Operations for the reporting period totaled 49,273. There were 2834 passengers manifested of whom 137 were VIPs. The Visiting Aircraft Line serviced 906 transient aircraft. Total operating hours numbered 2330.5.

(2) Personnel. The personnel strength averaged 49 and three (3) civilians. These averages include Fleet Augmentation personnel.

(3) Facilities. Rehabilitation of the Control Tower continued during the period. These improvements included digital readout clocks and installation of improved crash alarm system. The project is ongoing. (4) <u>Training</u>. An Approach Control Course for local controllers was established during January. The course of study was approved as valuable training by the FAA ATREP at MCAS Cherry Point. The course has proven to be effective in providing advanced training and exposure to increasingly difficult control problems.

6. Dental Department

a. 1 January 1975 - The Dental Department became a Branch Dental Clinic under the auspices of the Naval Regional Dental Center Camp Lejeune.

7. Communications/Electronics Department

a. Modification to Plant and Facility. Under the VHF/UHF Modernization Program the old Air Traffic Control radio equipment was replaced with new 50 KHZ bandwidth equipment. Now installed is the AN/GRT-21 transmitter and the AN/GRR-23 receiver for VHF and the AN/GRT-22 transmitter and the AN/GRR-24 receiver for UHF. The installation was completed on 30 April 1975 by the NAVELECSUPENGCEN Portsmouth.
