2. NARRATIVE SUMMARY

a. Personnel

(1) There were 126 promotions this period; 122 enlisted, 15 of which were meritorious, and 4 officers.

(2) During this period, there were 140 meritorious masts, 5 Commanding General's Certificates of Commendation, 77 Letters of Appreciation, 4 Navy Achievement Medals, 4 Humanitarian Service Medals, and 1 Navy Expeditionary Medal.

(3) The squadron completed the period with an overall retention rate of 62%. 43.2% of the first term Marines, 42.9% of the interim Marines, and 100% of the career Marines in the squadron approaching the end of their contract were retained. Emphasis was placed on retentnion of quality personnel.

(4) During this period, 110 Marines joined and 73 Marines were transferred by this command which is indicative of the high turnover rate experienced by the squadron. (5) There was a CMC T/O sponsored revision conference held from 20-22 May 1983 to accommodate the additional support requirements for the MAG-26/MAG-29 Mirror Image Concept. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Supply and Maintenance Departments along with the squadron S-1. The changes recommended included an addition of 23 billets.

b. Training

"The swimming pool was unavailable during this period due to renovation.

(2) An average completion rate of 90.6% was achieved for Marine Corps Institute courses. During this period, H&MS-29 personnel enrolled in 253 courses and completed 134 courses leaving 284 Marines enrolled in 369 courses.

(3) There were 613 command directed urinalysis samples taken and processed. Of these, 32 returned positive; 28 contained THC, two contained phenobarbitol, 1 contained cocaine and 1 contained amphetimine. Of the 32 cases, 4 resulted in NJP and 26 are awaiting NJP. In two of the cases, it was determined urinalysis conducted on 2 and 3 June 1983 accounted for 460 of the samples taken during this period. The DAACO conducted numerous classes on durg abuse and alcohol abuse, stressing the dangers of driving while under the influence of the substances and services available to help Marines overcome substance abuse

(4) On 20 April 1983, the Inspector General's team inspected H&MS-29 and assigned the following grades.

(5) H&MS-29 personnel augmented HML-167, MABS-29, and VMO-1 platoons during the reception ceremonies for HMM-162 on 10 January 1983, HMH-464 on 1 February 1983, HMM-263 on 1 April 1983 and HMM-365 on 20 May 1983. In addition, H&MS-29 personnel augmented MABS-29 for their change of command parade held on 16 May 1983 and participated in the MAG-29 change of command on 25 March 1983.

(6) The squadron took part in AVALEX 2-82 from 6-14 April 1983. The participation was limited to NBC defense exercises centered around a simulated gas attack and a simulated aircraft accident resulting in a chemical agent spill.

C. Logistics

(1) Embarkation and Facilities were inspected by the Inspector General's team on 25 April resulting in grades of average and excellent respectively. The grade received on facilities was one of the highest in the wing with the barracks being the best the inspector had seen.

(2) The squadorn held two parties during the period, a roller skating party on 6 January 1983, and the squadron 11th anniversary picnic on 1 May 1983 at the MCAS(H) New River Marina. Both parties were well attended by family and friends of squadorn members.

d. Aviation Supply

(1) The supply department was inspected by the Wing A&M inspection team from 7 to 18 February 1983, and received an overall grade of excellent. The department was inspected by the NAVMASSO inspection team from 21 to 25 February 1983, and received an overall grade of outstanding.

(2) The Mirror Image Concept began on 1 March 1983 with the transfer of some 18,000 line items from MAG-26 to MAG-29 enabling the department to support the CH-53E and CH-46E aircraft in addition to the OV-10A/D, UH-1N and AH-1T aircraft already on hand.

e. Aviation Maintenance

(1) With the addition of four new squadrons and two new types of aircraft to MAG-29, H&MS-29 has had to increase its maintenance capabilities to include T56 and T64 engines, CH-53E and CH-46E dynamic components and avionics systems.

(2) To increase the maintenance capabilities, additional MOS's were required resulting in the CMC T/O revision conference held on 20-22 May 1983.

(3) A reorganization of existing office and work spaces and identification of additional space requirements are underway in order to alleviate the space shortage generated by the new maintenance requirements.

f. Civic Events

(1) 38 Marines from H&MS-29 volunteered their time to help conduct the Special Olympics 21 April 1983.

(2) 27 Marines assisted in the DELALIO Elementary School Field Day held on 20 May 1983.

(3) The Navy Relief Drive netted better than \$2500 with 100% of the H&MS-29 personnel participating.
