
1. In response to your request for assistance in selecting safety equipment, a meeting with the Base Fire Chief was conducted to discuss needs and available equipment. In addition to this meeting, trade journals and NFPA Codes were researched. Following is a list of personal protective equipment that should be made available to NREAD forest firefighting personnel:

- a. Head protection (hard hats)
- b. Safety toe footwear
- c. Eye protection
- d. Flame resistant coveralls
- e. Escape hood, with particulate filter
- f. Fire shelter
- g. Water (for consumption)
- h. Radio

2. In addition to the above items, radio communication capabilities with State Fire Service personnel is crucial to the safety of NREAD firefighters when conducting joint NREAD/State operations.





4. Places Visited:

5. Narrative Summary:

This is the Annual Cooperator School conducted by the N. C. Forest Service. All state, county and federal agencies, private timber companies and forestry schools involved in forest fire suppression discuss equipment and personnel availability. Safety, readiness, communication, organization and tactics were discussed.

SUBJ: TRIP REPORT

During the second day, a field problem was carried out in the Hoffman Forest with all the activity and organizaitonal responsibility of a working fire. Emphasis this year was placed on safety, as always, sound tractor plow tactics and rural/urban interface.

6. Problems Encountered:

a. Personal safety equipment is not available or is not being used.

b. Tractor plow units are not properly equipped and maintained with operable wenches and cable, extra pins, quick disconnect plow hitches, cable cutters, hydraulic hoses, oil and fittings, fire extinguishers, ax, hoses and nozzle for pressurized water tank, drip torch, and radios with Camp Lejeune Fire Department, Base Forestry, and N.C. Forest Service frequencies.

7. Recommended actions:

a. All personnel who might respond and take part in a suppression effort should be issued and required to wear the following items:

- 1. Head protection (hard hats)
- 2. Safety toe footwear (when around heavy equipment)
- 3. Eye protection
- 4. Flame resistant coveralls
- 5. Escape hood with particulate filter
- 6. Fire shelter
- 7. Water (for personal consumption)

8. Radios (with frequencies for Camp Lejeune Fire Department, Base Forestry, and N.C. Forest Service)

This list of required equipment was developed by the Base Safety Manager in cooperation with the Camp Lejeune Fire Department and the Base Forester. Personnel reporting to the incident without the required equipment will not be used on the suppression effort.

b. This problem has several possible solutions. The equipment and operators could be assigned to the Base Fire Department which is directly involved in wildfire suppression or the equipment could remain under Base Maintenance. The situation will remain a problem until the unit in control of equipping and maintaining tractor-plow units and hauling units places a high enough priority on the equipment to ensure readiness. This is an unsafe situation and needs correction immediately.
