Statement from Congresswoman Sewell on the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting in favor of the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250:

“Today, I voted in favor of the of the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250, a bill that reaffirms Congress’ commitment towards striking a balance between promoting job creation, protecting the environment and promulgating agency regulations. While this bill is not perfect, it is an important step towards advancing the dialogue between federal regulators and the numerous industries that create jobs and provide economic stimulus to this country. It also gives our businesses time to implement these important policies in a way that makes environmental and economic sense.

It is important that we provide the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with enough time and guidance to draft regulations that are both environmentally conscious and practical for workers and businesses. In these recovering economic times, it is important that any new regulation helps businesses grow and encourages job creation. We cannot afford to implement rules that have a negative impact on our manufacturing sector or threaten jobs in Alabama. With additional time and guidance, I am confident the EPA can continue to develop proposals and regulations that help our environment, work for businesses and workers, encourage job creation and strengthen economic development.”

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011

Washington, D.C. –Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-47) released the following statement regarding H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011.

“Today, I voted in favor of H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011. This bill will ensure America’s workforce has access to the resources they need to obtain a good paying job, provide for their families and remain competitive in a 21st Century global economy.

I am pleased that my colleagues on both sides of the aisle came together and voted to ensure that this important federal program continues to provide assistance for hardworking Americans who lost their job as a result of unbalanced Trade policies and through no fault of their own.

By extending the Trade Adjustment Assistance program (TAA), we are helping get workers in the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and across this nation back on their feet, by getting them retrained and reemployed. We are also ensuring the adaptability, resiliency and efficiency of the American workforce.

Rebuilding the U.S. economy means more than just opening up new channels for trade. Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the United States-Korea and United States-Panama Free Trade Agreements

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting for the United States-Korea Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act, H.R. 3080 and United States-Panama Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act, H.R. 3079:

“Today, I voted in favor of free trade agreements with Korea and Panama, which demonstrate America’s commitment to strengthening our global economic leadership. These free trade agreements are critical to strengthening economic development in Alabama.

According to the Alabama Department of Agriculture, Alabama’s economy will greatly benefit from these trade agreements. For every \$1 billion created in export trade, 15,000 jobs will be created for Alabamians, and 15 percent of all manufacturing sector workers in Alabama depend on exports to sustain their jobs. These agreements will encourage and support the creation of thousands of jobs in Alabama, especially in agriculture and agribusiness.

According to the Alabama Farmers Federation, “These free trade agreements are important to both Alabama farm families and the overall economy. Collectively, the agreements mean more jobs for Alabamians because of increased exports of agricultural products, but will also result in a more-level playing field for American farmers as tariffs on American goods exported to these three countries are reduced or eliminated over time.”

These agreements will increase trade and allow American businesses to export more goods and services, which will strengthen economic development and protect and create jobs in the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and across this nation.

Free trade agreements must deliver results that work for and with American businesses, workers and families. When new channels for trade are opened up for American companies to sell their products and services, they expand and create jobs. I will closely monitor the impact of these trade agreements to make sure that they do not have any negative effects on our workers or economy.

I remain committed to building and maintaining a strong, competitive U.S. economy and U.S.–Korea and the U.S.–Panama Trade Agreements will help strengthen our position as a global economic power.”

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the U.S.– Columbia Free Trade Agreement

Washington, DC – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting against H.R. 3087, the U.S.–Columbia Free Trade Agreement (FTA):

“Today, I voted against H.R. 3087, the U.S.–Columbia Free Trade Agreement (FTA). While this agreement does offer our nation access to Columbia’s services market, it does so without providing basic human rights protection for Columbian workers.

The U.S.–Columbia FTA does not include a labor agreement to protect workers’ rights. Columbian workers have long been denied even basic rights, and Columbia has a history of adopting policies and practices that are aimed specifically at keeping workers from organizing and demanding rights and a safe and secure workplace.

In April, President Barack Obama and Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos announced an Action Plan that holds promise for Columbia’s workers. This plan is a step toward addressing basic labor rights problems and includes explicit obligations and time limits on workers’ rights and protections. Columbia has already failed to meet many of the deadlines detailed in the action plan. Additionally, Columbia is already backing off of many of the plan’s commitments, narrowly interpreting newly-passed labor laws, which is creating massive loopholes that allow employers to continue their abuse and mistreatment of workers.

I believe the focus should now be on carrying out this action plan, and a trade agreement with Columbia should be contingent on its meaningful implementation. H.R. 3087’s failure to even reference this plan is a glaring and major flaw. Therefore, in good conscience, I simply cannot support it. I am confident with time, Columbia can strengthen its commitment to workers’ rights, but until it shows meaningful commitment to raising labor standards and strengthening basic workers rights I cannot support a U.S.–Columbia FTA.”

Washington DC – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-07) issued the following statement on the passing of iconic Civil Rights leader and freedom fighter Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth:

“Today we mourn the loss of a true soldier for equality. Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth was a fearless freedom fighter and tenacious Civil Rights leader. I am deeply saddened by his passing today.

Throughout his life, Reverend Shuttlesworth fought racism and injustice and worked tirelessly for equal rights. His efforts alongside Reverend Martin Luther King Jr. paved the way for the passage of the Civil Rights Act and for America to live up to its ideals of democracy and equality. Over the years, he built a well-deserved reputation as an outspoken equality activist and distinguished community leader. His achievements will leave an indelible mark on the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and the nation and will continue to inspire people to stand up for what they believe in for many years to come.

I know that I stand on the shoulders of Civil Rights icons like Reverend Shuttlesworth. It was the sacrifices and courage of Reverend Shuttlesworth and so many others that forged the path for me to be elected Alabama’s first African American Congresswoman, and for that I am eternally grateful.

Today, as we pause to remember Reverend Shuttlesworth, let us also honor the legacy of fairness and dignity for all races that he left on the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and this nation.

Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell Announces \$200,000 in Rural Development Funding for Sumter and Greene Counties

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) announced that the Alabama State Association of Rural Cooperatives was awarded \$200,000 in funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for rural development projects in Sumter and Greene Counties. The Rural Development funds will be used to help disadvantaged farmers grow crops more efficiently, create jobs and provide safe and quality produce for families throughout the 7th Congressional District and the State of Alabama.

“It is great news that this funding has been awarded to help small producers in the 7th Congressional District,” said Rep. Sewell (D-AL). “Small farmers and producers play an important role in the local economies of Alabama’s rural communities. This funding gives Alabama’s economic development organizations resources to continue providing valuable assistance to create and sustain jobs throughout our state.”

“This grant will help family farmers in Greene and Sumter counties, but moving forward we hope to work beyond the black belt,” said John Zippert, Project Director. “The grant will help small farmers raise more vegetable crops, create local farmers markets, increase access to commercial markets and utilize new technologies like drift irrigation so that small farmers can increase their productivity and sustainability.”

Funds from the Small, Socially Disadvantaged Producer Grant Program are awarded competitively to cooperatives and/or associations of cooperatives. The Greene/Sumter Farmers Market Cooperative has approximately 65 small farmer-members, which is composed of more than 98 percent of socially-disadvantaged African American producers.

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on H.R. 2608, the Continuing Appropriations Act

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting for H.R. 2608, the Continuing Appropriations Act, which will fund the government through November 18, 2011:

“Today I voted for H.R. 2608, the Continuing Appropriations Act, which will fund the government through November 18. The bill will enable the government to continue to provide many vital services to millions of American families. The bill will protect good-paying American jobs and provide essential emergency disaster relief for families, small businesses and communities.

As families in the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and across the country struggle in the face of a difficult economy, many communities have also endured hurricanes, tornadoes, floods and wildfires. The 7th Congressional District and the State of Alabama were hit hard by the severe storms and tornadoes of April 27, 2011. It is our responsibility in Congress to keep the Federal Government fully functioning for American families. We must also provide relief to communities in their effort to rebuild from natural disasters. Unlike the bill I voted against two weeks ago, this bill responsibly provides emergency disaster relief without requiring an unprecedented offset that would have jeopardized American jobs.

I remain committed to responsibly reducing the deficit, but not at the cost of critical programs that provide assistance to the victims of disasters or that service and support our most vulnerable communities. I look forward to working with my colleagues to develop a solution for the 2012 budget that will adequately fund disaster assistance, encourage job creation, reduce our deficit and strengthen the economy and the lives of our children, seniors and families.”

Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell Announces \$ 5,239,571 in Funding for Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-7) announced that \$5,239,571 was awarded to the Birmingham Airport Authority to update and renovate the facilities at Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport. The U.S. Department of Transportation funds were awarded by the Federal Aviation Administration.

“This funding will improve the current facilities and enhance safety at Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport, which will and allow them to manage more traffic, improve travel for passengers and attract new businesses” said Rep. Sewell. “When new businesses are attracted and more passengers can be transported, jobs are created and more goods are shipped across the country. These are the types of funding opportunities that will make the State of Alabama and the 7th Congressional District stronger.”

“We have been very fortunate to continue to secure funding for the purpose of undertaking development projects such as the Terminal Modernization Project (TMP),” said Al Denson, President and CEO of the Birmingham Airport Authority. “The funding will enable the Birmingham Airport Authority to upgrade the aging airport infrastructure which is part of our strategic plan to grow the state’s largest airport. It will greatly enhance the convenience and access for our passengers. It will greatly enhance the convenience and access for our passengers. We appreciate the continued support of our federal delegation and the FAA.”

According to the Birmingham Airport Authority, this grant will fund the airfield improvement portion of the larger Terminal Modernization Project currently underway at the airport. Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport is a small-hub primary airport associated with Birmingham, Alabama.

Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell Announces \$2,702,213 in Funding for Tuscaloosa Regional Airport

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-7) announced that \$2,702,213 was awarded to Tuscaloosa Regional Airport to decrease airport congestion and improve runway safety. The U.S. Department of Transportation funds were awarded by the Federal Aviation Administration.

“This funding will modernize and improve safety at the Tuscaloosa Regional Airport, which will allow them to manage more traffic and attract new businesses,” said Rep. Sewell. “When new businesses are attracted jobs are created and more goods are transported across the country. These are the types of funding opportunities that will make our 7th Congressional District stronger.”

“I would like to personally thank Congresswoman Sewell for her leadership in securing funding for the modernization of the Tuscaloosa Regional Airport,” said Dr. Wayne Cameron, Tuscaloosa Regional Airport Manager. “The construction of Taxiway B will help resolve a serious safety issue so that planes no longer have to back taxi on the runway and it will open up the land on that side of the main runway for future development.”

According to the project description, the project will improve safety at the airport by constructing a new taxiway parallel to their main runway. Tuscaloosa Regional Airport is the general aviation airport associated with Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Section II PROGRAM FUNDING THROUGH FEDERAL AGENCIES

U.S. Department of Agriculture

Program: **NEW - Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program**

Description: The U.S. agricultural population is poised to make a dramatic change - half of all current farmers are likely to retire in the next decade. According to the 2007 Census of Agriculture, the average age of farm operators was 57 years. Farmers over the age 55 own more than half the farmland in the U.S. But the number of new farmers and ranchers over the age of 35 is increasing, as does the number of smaller farms and ranches nationwide. A similar trend is evident for tree farmers nationwide. To address the needs of this changing generation, USDA allocates \$17.2 million to fund a Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program (BFRDP). The deadline is November 22, 2011.

Program: **NEW - Agriculture and Food Research Initiative - Sustainable Bioenergy**

Description: This AFRI Challenge Area focuses on the priority to secure America's energy future. It supports the development of regional systems for the sustainable production of bioenergy and biobased products that contribute significantly to reducing dependence on foreign oil, have net positive social, environmental, and rural

economic impacts, and are compatible with existing agricultural systems.

Program: **NEW - Biomass Research and Development Initiative**

Description: The Biomass Research and Development Initiative (BRDI) is a joint effort between the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE). A two-phase technical evaluation process is used for applications submitted to BRDI in Fiscal Year (FY) 2011. BRDI requires that funded projects integrate all three legislatively mandated technical areas. These areas include (A) Feedstocks development, (B) Biofuels and biobased products development, and (C) Biofuels and biobased products development analysis.

Program: **NEW - Agriculture and Food Research Initiative - Food Security**

Description: This AFRI Challenge Area focuses on Food Availability and Food Accessibility. Adequate food availability implies that the population has a reliable source of food. Food security is achieved when food availability and food accessibility goals are met successfully.

Program: **Solid Waste Management Grant**

Description: Funds may be used to: Evaluate current landfill conditions to determine threats to water resources in rural areas; provide technical assistance and/or training to enhance operator skills in the maintenance and operation of active landfills in rural areas; provide technical assistance and/or training to help associations reduce the solid waste stream; and provide technical assistance and/or training for operators of landfills in rural areas which are closed or will be closed in the near future with the development/implementation of closure plans, future land use plans, safety and maintenance planning, and closure scheduling within permit requirements.

Program: **Technical Assistance and Training Grant**

Description: The Technical Assistance and Training (TAT) Grant Program has been established to assist communities with water or wastewater systems through free technical assistance and/or training provided by the grant recipients. Qualified private non-profit organizations will receive TAT grant funds to identify and evaluate solutions to water and waste disposal problems in rural areas, assist applicants in preparing applications for water and waste grants made at the State level offices, and improve operation and maintenance of existing water and waste disposal facilities in rural areas.

Alabama Incentives: Biofuel Production Facility Tax Credit

Companies that invest in the development of a biofuel production facility may be eligible for a tax credit of up to 5% of the capital costs of the project. Companies may claim this credit against the state income tax or the financial institution excise tax liability that the project generates each year for up to 20 years. For the purposes of the credit, biofuel is defined as a motor vehicle fuel that is produced from grain, starch, oilseeds, vegetable, algae, animal, or fish materials including fats, greases and oils, sugarcane, sugar beets, sugar components, tobacco, potatoes, and lignocellulosic or other biomass. To be eligible for the tax credit, the capital costs of the production facility must be at least \$2,000,000 if the facility is not located in a favored geographic area and \$500,000 if the facility is located in a favored geographic area. A favored geographic area is defined as an area or county that is designated as an enterprise zone or that the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations considers to be less developed.

Alabama homeowners who have been declared eligible to receive unemployment compensation benefits may apply. To qualify, applicants must have a total annual household income of less than \$75,740, and the unpaid principal balance on their home's mortgages must be less than \$258,690. Due to the overwhelming response Hardest Hit has received, please allow up to 6 weeks for Processing of your application. Storm victims who have been unable to return to work following the April tornadoes may be eligible for increased assistance of up to 18 consecutive monthly payments, or \$25,000, through Hardest Hit Alabama. Program providing \$162 million for the prevention of foreclosure in Alabama to provide assistance targeted at Alabama's unemployed homeowners. Eligible homeowners will receive assistance to pay their current mortgage payment and all other mortgage-related expenses, including payments on any

subordinate liens, while unemployed. HHA will provide up to 12 monthly mortgage payments not to exceed \$15,000, per household.
