Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on Mercedes-Benz Addition of Fifth Model to Vance Plant

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-7) released the following statement regarding Mercedes-Benz announcement to build a fifth model at the Alabama plant in Tuscaloosa County:

"It is exciting that Mercedes Benz is adding a fifth model to its plant in Vance. This \$350 million dollar investment into Alabama's economy will create 400 new jobs. The new model, coupled with the launch of the C-Class sedan in 2014 will bring a total of 1,400 new jobs to the 7th Congressional District. For 18 years, Mercedes-Benz has maintained a strong manufacturing presence in Alabama and is a source of jobs for thousands of employees and suppliers within the 7th Congressional District and the state of Alabama.

It is great news that Mercedes-Benz will continue to make critical investments in our local economy. I applaud the company for its innovation and continued efforts to create jobs and strengthen economic development in Alabama."

According to the project description, these investments will total \$2.4 billion that will be invested into the economy. The Mercedes-Benz plant is located in Vance, AL in Tuscaloosa County.

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the Dedication of the Martin Luther King Jr. National Memorial

WASHINGTON, DC – Today. Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement today after the dedication of the Martin Luther King Jr. National Memorial:

"The Dr. Martin Luther King Memorial stands as a reminder of the sacrifices that he and other freedom fighters made to make our nation a place free from racism and hatred. Dr. King's values and work in the face of hostility, apathy, and ingrained prejudices remind us that when one person is willing to speak up against injustice and inequality, they can change the world. The story of the 7th District, State of Alabama and this nation cannot be told without remembering Dr. King, whose vision and courage created a path toward liberty and equality for all Americans. We should all carry his lessons of bravery, inspiration, and fortitude with us.

Dr. King's struggle for civil rights and his march for equality marked a turning point in American history, an extraordinary step forward in the fight for civil rights. It is a true testament to the impact that Dr. King's work in the name of equality has had on this country that the first African American President of the United States was among those who took part in today's memorial dedication.

As we honor the life and legacy of Dr. King and dedicate his memorial, we not only commemorate the memory and mission, vision and values, of one of America's greatest leaders, but also we recommit ourselves to the ideas of freedom, equality and fairness for all people. Let his memorial stand as a reminder that there is much more that unites us as Americans than divides us."

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the Coal Ash Bill

Washington, DC—Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell released the following statement after voting against H.R. 2273, the Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act:

"Today I voted against H.R. 2273, the Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act. This bill would allow each state the authority to issue permits for the disposal of coal ash and other coal combustion residuals, which would circumvent the federal government's ability to create uniform standards that would protect American communities. Likewise, this bill does not address the need for contingency plans regarding the storage and disposal of coal ash from applicants applying for permits from state agencies.

Since the devastating Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) coal ash spill in Kingston, TN in 2008, we now understand that there are severe environmental and economic consequences associated with coal ash spills. The coal ash retrieved from the TVA cleanup was relocated to Perry County Alabama, which is located in the 7th Congressional District. Therefore, it is of particular concern to me, my constituents and Americans across the country that anyone seeking to locate coal ash within our communities must, at the very least, have an emergency contingency plan to address the possibility of any contamination.

Although I disagree with the bill's underlying premise, I did offer an amendment that would have required an emergency contingency plan. Unfortunately, this amendment was not allowed to be brought to the floor for a vote. My amendment would have required that the businesses applying for coal ash permits provide states with two critically important reports, a description of how their coal ash containment structure would protect against spills of coal combustion residuals and a plan for addressing potential spills of coal ash to minimize the impact to local residents and businesses. At a minimum, these two requirements would have helped states protect public health, jobs and the economy in the event of an unforeseen coal ash spill.

I believe that this bill is bad public policy and deleterious to our communities. I will continue to be vigilant in my insistence that regulations regarding coal ask are stringent and protect the health and well-being of my constituents.

Statement from Congresswoman Sewell on the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting in favor of the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250:

"Today, I voted in favor of the of the EPA Regulatory Relief Act of 2011, H.R. 2250, a bill that reaffirms Congress' commitment towards striking a balance between promoting job creation, protecting the environment and promulgating agency regulations. While this bill is not perfect, it is an important step towards advancing the dialogue between federal regulators and the numerous industries that create jobs and provide economic stimulus to this country. It also gives our businesses time to implement these important policies in a way that makes environmental and economic sense.

It is important that we provide the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with enough time and guidance to draft regulations that are both environmentally conscious and practical for workers and businesses. In these recovering economic times, it is important that any new regulation helps businesses grow and encourages job creation. We cannot afford to implement rules that have a negative impact on our manufacturing sector or threaten jobs in Alabama. With additional time and guidance, I am confident the EPA can continue to develop proposals and regulations that help our environment, work for businesses and workers, encourage job creation and strengthen economic development."

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011

Washington, D.C. –Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-47) released the following statement regarding H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011.

"Today, I voted in favor of H.R. 2832, the Trade Adjustment Assistance Extension Act of 2011. This bill will ensure America's workforce has access to the resources they need to obtain a good paying job, provide for their families and remain competitive in a 21st Century global economy.

I am pleased that my colleagues on both sides of the aisle came together and voted to ensure that this important federal program continues to provide assistance for hardworking Americans who lost their job as a result of unbalanced Trade policies and through no fault of their own.

By extending the Trade Adjustment Assistance program (TAA), we are helping get workers in the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and across this nation back on their feet, by getting them retrained and reemployed. We are also ensuring the adaptability, resiliency and efficiency of the American workforce.

Rebuilding the U.S. economy means more than just opening up new channels for trade. The TAA is a critical federal program which should have never been allowed to expire, and moving forward, the extension will guarantee that unemployed American workers have access to the training and resources they need to obtain new jobs and contribute to our economic growth and recovery."

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the United States-Korea and United States-Panama Free Trade Agreements

Washington, DC—Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting for the United States-Korea Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act, H.R. 3080 and United States-Panama Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act, H.R. 3079:

"Today, I voted in favor of free trade agreements with Korea and Panama, which demonstrate America's commitment to strengthening our global economic leadership. These free trade agreements are critical to strengthening economic development in Alabama.

According to the Alabama Department of Agriculture, Alabama's economy will greatly benefit from these trade agreements. For every \$1 billion created in export trade, 15,000 jobs will be created for Alabamians, and 15 percent of all manufacturing sector workers in Alabama depend on exports to sustain their jobs. These agreements will encourage and support the creation of thousands of jobs in Alabama, especially in agriculture and agribusiness.

According to the Alabama Farmers Federation, "These free trade agreements are important to both Alabama farm families and the overall economy. Collectively, the agreements mean more jobs for Alabamians because of increased exports of agricultural products, but will also result in a more-level playing field for American farmers as tariffs on American goods exported to these three countries are reduced or eliminated over time."

These agreements will increase trade and allow American businesses to export more goods and services, which will strengthen economic development and protect and create jobs in the 7th Congressional District, the State of Alabama and across this nation.

Free trade agreements must deliver results that work for and with American businesses, workers and families. When new channels for trade are opened up for American companies to sell their products and services, they expand and create jobs. I will closely monitor the impact of these trade agreements to make sure that they do not have any negative effects on our workers or economy.

I remain committed to building and maintaining a strong, competitive U.S. economy and U.S.—Korea and the U.S.—Panama Trade Agreements will help strengthen our position as a global economic power."

Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell on the United States— Colombia Free Trade Agreement

Washington, DC – Today, Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) released the following statement after voting against H.R. 3087, the U.S.–Colombia Free Trade Agreement (FTA):

"Today, I voted against H.R. 3087, the U.S.—Colombia Free Trade Agreement (FTA). While this agreement does offer our nation access to Colombia's services market, it does so without providing basic human rights protection for Colombian workers.

The U.S.—Colombia FTA does not include a labor agreement to protect workers' rights. Colombian workers have long been denied even basic rights, and Colombia has a history of adopting policies and practices that are aimed specifically at keeping workers from organizing and demanding rights and a safe and secure workplace.

In April, President Barack Obama and Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos announced an Action Plan that holds promise for Colombia's workers. This plan is a step toward addressing basic labor rights problems and includes explicit obligations and time limits on workers' rights and protections. Colombia has already failed to meet many of the deadlines detailed in the action plan. Additionally, Colombia is already backing off of many of the plan's commitments, narrowly interpreting newly-passed labor laws, which is creating massive loopholes that allow employers to continue their abuse and mistreatment of workers.

I believe the focus should now be on carrying out this action plan, and a trade agreement with Colombia should be contingent on its meaningful implementation. H.R. 3087's failure to even reference this plan is a glaring and major flaw. Therefore, in good conscience, I simply cannot support it. I am confident with time, Colombia can strengthen its commitment to workers' rights, but until it shows meaningful commitment to raising labor standards and strengthening basic workers rights I cannot support a U.S.—Colombia FTA."

change - half of all current farmers are likely to retire in the next decade. According to the 2007 Census of Agriculture, the average age of farm operators was 57 years. Farmers over the age 55 own more than half the farmland in the U.S. But the number of new farmers and ranchers over the age of 35 is increasing, as does the number of smaller farms and ranches nationwide. A similar trend is evident for tree farmers nationwide. To address the needs of this changing generation, USDA allocates \$17.2 million to fund a Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program (BFRDP).

Alabama Incentives: Biofuel Production Facility Tax Credit

Companies that invest in the development of a biofuel production facility may be eligible for a tax credit of up to 5% of the capital costs of the project. Companies may claim this credit against the state income tax or the financial institution excise tax liability that the project generates each year for up to 20 years. For the purposes of the credit, biofuel is defined as a motor vehicle fuel that is produced from grain, starch, oilseeds, vegetable, algae, animal, or fish materials including fats, greases and oils, sugarcane, sugar beets, sugar components, tobacco, potatoes, and lignocellulosic or other biomass. To be eligible for the tax credit, the capital costs of the production facility must be at least \$2,000,000 if the facility is not located in a favored geographic area and \$500,000 if the facility is located in a favored geographic area. A favored geographic area is defined as an area or county that is designated as an enterprise zone or that the Alabama Department of Industrial Relations considers to be less developed.

Energy Upgrade Loans Now Available for Smaller Alabama Businesses - More Alabama businesses will have the chance to make upgrades that will save energy, reduce expenses and boost employment opportunities.
