Georgia Work Ready

Georgia Work Ready was created to ensure that Georgia's workers have the best skills, easy access to training and world-class job opportunities. It is also driving future economic growth for the state by ensuring companies can reliably match the right people to the right jobs.

Georgia Work Ready Certificates

The backbone of Georgia Work Ready is the **Work Ready Certificate**, a voluntary workforce assessment system measuring the real world skills of Georgia's workers. The assessment, powered by ACT WorkKeys® National Career Readiness Certificate, is a national certificate available to **all** Georgians beginning with high schools seniors at **no cost**. Georgians can use their Work Ready Certificate to prove their work readiness to potential and current employers. They can also use it to evaluate a career change by comparing their scores with those for over 400 occupations. Georgia also offers free on-line gap training tools aimed at helping improve Certificate scores, enabling career growth and continuing on-the-job success. Georgia Department of Labor

The Georgia Department of Labor's 53 electronically connected local Career Centers and One-Stop Centers throughout the state offer a wide range of services to both job seekers and employers. Unemployment Insurance Benefits

Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefit is temporary income for workers who are unemployed through no fault of their own and who are either looking for another job, have definite recall to their obs within 6 weeks of the last day worked, or are in approved training program. The funding for unemployment insurance benefits comes from taxes paid by employers. Eligibility for benefits is determined Eligibility for benefits is determined based on past wages, reason for job separation, and availability and job search requirements. Claims for unemployment insurance may be filed at any Georgia Department of Labor Career Center. When filing a claim, you should bring:

- Your social security number. A claim cannot be filed without a social security number.
- Employer-issued separation letter or notice, if one was provided.
- Names and addresses of all employers for the last 18 months and the dates worked for each.
- Proof of immigration status if not a U.S. citizen.
- Personal check with account number and bank routing number if you want benefits deposited directly into to a checking or savings account.
- Claims are effective on the date they are filed and are not retroactive to the last day worked.
