Did You Know?

The first act of America's first Congress in 1774 was to ask a minister to open with prayer and to lead Congress in the reading of four chapters of the Bible.

By 1867, the church at the Capitol was the largest church in Washington, D. C., with up to 2,000 persons per week attending Sunday service in the Hall of the House.

In the United States Capitol the declaration "In God We Trust" is prominently displayed in both the United States House and Senate Chambers.

The purposes of the Caucus are to 1) recognize the role that prayer by individuals of all faiths has played in uniting us as a people and in making us a more generous, more cooperative, and more forgiving people; 2) collect, exchange, and disseminate information about prayer as a fundamental and enduring feature of American life; 3) use the legislative process to assist the nation and its people in continuing to draw upon and benefitting from this essential source of our strength and well-being.
