RSC Amendment to CR Would Save \$84 Billion

This week, the House is scheduled to take up an FY 2010 continuing resolution to temporarily fund government programs for all 12 appropriations bills that have yet to be enacted. The current fiscal year (FY 2009) ends on September 30, 2009. No text is available, but it is expected that the CR will extend spending authority for one month, through the end of October. The CR may also include, among other things, language extending the highway bill by one month (the House is scheduled to take up a 3-month extension of this legislation today).

The Democrats have proposed an FY 2010 spending plan that will lead to a total spending level (through the "regular" appropriations process, so not including any additional emergency spending) of \$1.09 trillion. This is a \$77 billion or 7.6% increase over FY 2009. Counting *only* the non-security appropriations bills (so not including Defense, Military Construction-Veterans, and Homeland Security) the House Democrat spending plan increases FY 2010 spending by \$84 billion compared to FY 2008 (the spending levels in effect prior to the FY 2009 omnibus).

Representative Jim Jordan will file an amendment to the continuing resolution that would provide spending authority for the 9 non-security appropriations bills at *FY 2008 levels*. For the Defense, Military Construction-Veterans, and Homeland Security bills, the amendment will provide a funding level equivalent to the FY *2010 House-passed bills*. The amendment would allow the CR to remain in effect for all of FY 2010 (unless co-opted by passage of an FY 2010 spending bill). Compared to enactment of the House Democrats' FY 2010 spending plan, this amendment proposes a spending policy that would save **\$84 billion**. These savings are as follows:
