
President Obama's tax plan would allow portions of the 2001 and 2003 tax cuts to expire, resulting in steep tax hikes beginning in January 2011 for small businesses and those earning \$250,000 or more. The tax hikes would significantly affect the economy in Georgia, most notably in the number of jobs and change in personal income.

Among the results, from 2011 to 2020, the state of Georgia would:

- Lose, on average, 21,481 jobs annually.
- Lose, per household, \$7,793 in total disposable personal income.
- See total individual income taxes increase by \$12,721 million.



TOTAL EMPLOYMENT Annual Change in Jobs




REAL DISPOSABLE INCOME

Annual Change per Household




TOTAL INDIVIDUAL INCOME TAXES
