On Capitol Hill

The United States Capitol is among the most architecturally U.S. Capitol impressive and symbolically important buildings in the world. It has between Constitution and housed the meeting chambers of the Senate and the House of **Independence** Avenues Representatives for almost two centuries. Begun in 1793, the Capitol 202-224-4048 has been built, burnt, rebuilt, extended, and restored. As the focal Open Daily 9:00 am to 4:30 point of the government's Legislative Branch, the Capitol is the pm Monday-Saturday centerpiece of the Capitol Complex. Closed Thanksgiving & Christmas Congressional Staff led tours can be given to groups of no more than 15. They are informal and led through the Cannon tunnel should be scheduled by calling your congressional office. The Capitol Guide Service conducts free guided tours of the Capitol Monday through Saturday, 9:00 AM to 4:30 PM. The first public tour begins each day at 9:00 A.M. and the last at 3:30 P.M. Tours last approximately thirty to forty minutes. Visitors must obtain free tickets for tours on a first-come, first-served basis, at the Capitol Guide Service kiosk located along the curving sidewalk southwest of the Capitol (near the intersection of First Street, S.W., and Independence Avenue; see the map below). Ticket distribution begins at 9:00 a.m. daily. Ticketholders will be directed to the South Visitor Receiving Facility, which is located south of the Capitol; from there they will proceed to the Capitol to begin their tour. Maximum tour size is 40 people. Large group tours can be reserved by calling 202-225-6827. Please have a pen and paper available as you may receive important information from a recording. Tickets are \$27 or adults, \$14 for children 4-12, free for children under four.
