Survey: 95% of Hill Staff See Media Bias

06.26.2012 A landmark survey released today by George Washington University, that includes responses from nearly 3,000 congressional staff and Washington, D.C. lobbyists, provides valuable insight as to how people communicate with lawmakers in the U.S. Congress and their staff. In a joint effort by GW Professor David Rehr in the Graduate School of Political Management and the Original U.S. Congress Handbook, the study, "The Congressional Communications Report," provides a glimpse into the intersection of federal public policy and advocacy.

"Here's some reassuring news from a new George Washington University survey: Ninety-five percent of congressional staff members believe that political bias in the media influences or shapes decision-making in Congress. Seventy-five percent of Republican Hill staff believes there is 'a lot' of bias compared to 53 percent of Democratic staff. Fortyone percent of Democratic staff says there is 'some' bias compared with 24 percent of **Republicans.**"

Their op-ed takes the position that one of the deadliest political scandals in American history has been blown out of proportion by Republicans in Congress, and their contempt vote was meant only to score political points against the Obama administration.'

"NBC's Nightly News on Friday offered a one-sided segment touting Barack Obama's decision to lift the threat of deportation to young people who came to America illegally. The report featured six clips of individuals or groups thrilled by the reaction, only two against. It began by touting, 'Young people covered by the new policy cheered the announcement outside the White House.'

CNN interviewed eight guests who favored President Obama's new immigration policy, and only one guest who opposed it... The airtime for guests in favor totaled over twice as much as the time given to the one guest who opposed the policy. NPR [also] rushed out of the gate on Friday afternoon to defend President Obama's announcement to 'lift the shadow of deportation' from young illegal immigrants.

[A New York Times article] devoted precisely two of its 28 paragraphs to opposing views from 'angry' Republicans in Congress. The rest were devoted to Obama's announcement, joyful illegals, and their liberal supporters happy that immigrants could finally...'come out of the shadows.'
