**New York City Office of Mental Health:** This grant is intended to provide access to affordable, independent housing and support services based on the needs of adults with severe and persistent mental illness and who reside in New York City. Supported housing is long-term/permanent housing. Recipients are not required to move from housing as their need for services change and housing is not lost during hospitalization. There are no program requirements and no length of stay restrictions. These supporting housing units and services will be made available to individuals who are currently residents of either Office of Mental Health (OMH) Psychiatric Centers or OMH-operated residential programs and have resided there for a period of one year or longer. Individuals with Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) status and homeless persons residing in municipal shelters or on the streets are also eligible for priority access. Contracts will be awarded for a one-year period with four additional one-year renewals for a maximum of five years. Eligibility: Not-for-profit organizations with 501(c) (3) incorporation which operate in New York City and have experience providing housing and/or mental health services to seriously and persistently mentally ill individuals.
