American Brain Tumor Association: New special projects discovery grant program offers support for fresh and creative research ideas for solving the challenges of brain tumor diagnosis and treatment. High-risk, high-impact projects that are deemed to have the potential to change current diagnostic or treatment options for adult and/or pediatric brain tumors will be awarded a one-year, \$50,000 grants. Health Resources & Services Administration:

State Implementation Partnership Grants are available for expanded studies and the establishment of innovative programs with respect to traumatic brain injury (TBI). These grants are to be used by states to establish an infrastructure for the delivery of TBI related services and to improve states' ability to make system changes that will sustain the TBI service delivery infrastructure. Any public or private entity that can document previous experience addressing the issue, including faith-based and community-based organizations, are eligible to apply for funding. Lowe's Toolbox for Education: Grants of up to \$5,000 will be awarded for facility enhancements or landscaping/clean up projects at local schools. Projects that encourage parent involvement and build stronger community spirit will be favored. Any individual nonprofit public K-12 school or parent group associated with a nonprofit public K-12 school that is more than two years old is eligible to apply. National Endowment for the Humanities: Collaborative Research Grants are available to support original research undertaken by a team of two or more scholars or research coordinated by an individual scholar that, because of its scope or complexity, requires additional staff and resources beyond the individual's salary. Eligible projects include: research that significantly adds to knowledge and understanding in the humanities; conferences on topics of major importance in the humanities that will benefit ongoing research; archaeological projects that include the interpretation and communication of results (projects may encompass excavation, materials analysis, laboratory work, field reports, and preparation of interpretive monographs); and research that uses the knowledge, methods, and perspectives of the humanities to enhance understanding of science, technology, medicine, and the social sciences. National Endowment for the Humanities: Scholarly Editions and Translations grants are available to support the preparation of editions and translations of pre-existing texts and documents that are currently inaccessible or available in inadequate editions. Grants typically support editions and translations of significant literary, philosophical, and historical materials, but other types of work, such as musical notation, are also eligible. U.S. nonprofit organizations or institutions with IRS 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status are among those eligible to apply. New York State Department of Health: Applicants are asked to submit proposals for initiatives to accelerate the pace with which basic findings are translated into clinical practice for the benefit of spinal cord injured (SCI) persons. Specifically, the successful application will focus on a set of well-defined problems that promise transition to clinical trials within a decade. Although the Spinal Cord Injury Research Board has not developed a formal list of research priorities, projects targeting tissue regeneration, repair or restoration of function through biomedical and bioengineering research are of strongest interest, as are the under-studied areas of bowel and bladder function.
