An Historic Agreement: Linking Conservation Compliance and Crop Insurance

The Agricultural Act of 2014

The 2014 Farm Bill includes an historic new agreement that is one of the most significant strides in land and water conservation policy in decades. The agreement, reached between conservation and agriculture organizations, requires farmers to engage in conservation compliance practices in order to receive federal crop insurance support. The agreement ensures crop insurance will remain strong while conserving millions of acres of vulnerable lands and natural resources that our nation's farmers and ranchers will rely on for generations to come.

For decades, farmers have engaged in conservation practices on highly erodible lands in exchange for federal agricultural benefits like the direct payment program, ensuring that millions of acres of wetlands and other vulnerable lands would remain healthy and productive for future generations. As the Senate Farm Bill eliminates direct payment subsidies and transitions to risk management support like crop insurance, it is incredibly important that crop insurance also be linked to conservation compliance.

According to the USDA, conservation compliance has resulted in saving 295 million tons of soil per year, and up to 3.3 million acres of vulnerable wetlands have not been drained as a result.

Historic Reform: Ending Direct Payments, Transitioning to Responsible Risk Management

One of the most landmark reforms of the 2014 Farm Bill is the elimination of direct payments and other subsidy programs and transitioning to responsible risk management, based on crop insurance. Traditional subsidy programs pay farmers even in good times. On the other hand, crop insurance only provides support when farmers take a loss.

And unlike direct payments, farmers pay into crop insurance, purchasing a policy every year so that they will have support in the case of disaster. Federal crop insurance support is not a payment made to farmers; it's a discount on the high premiums farmers pay to protect themselves.

The Farm Bill yields \$24 billion in total cuts to agriculture spending, and over \$16 billion of that savings comes from ending subsidy programs while strengthening crop insurance.

It is important that farmers—and farm jobs—are not wiped out by weather disasters. Avoiding widespread farmer bankruptcy also protects American families from sudden spikes in food prices.

Across the country, the availability of affordable crop insurance is the number one priority of farmers to keep themselves protected from disaster.

Major cuts to crop insurance would likely mean more spending in ad hoc disaster relief. And putting strict caps on crop insurance support could mean larger operations opting not to purchase crop insurance—raising premiums for small producers and increasing costs for taxpayers.

Even more seriously, if larger operations are barred from federal crop insurance support, they would avoid being bound by the historic new conservation compliance agreement included in the Farm Bill—creating an incentive for these farmers to drain wetlands and plow up highly erodible lands.
