Jack White **Unleashes** Solo LP

Inside the guitarist's first new album since the White Stripes split

F RZA HADN'T BAILED on a session at Jack White's Third Man studios in Nashville last year, White might have never made his debut solo LP. "I had the musicians here, and I didn't know what to do with them," White says at his Third Man office. "I didn't want to send them home - I felt bad." So White decided to dust off a few demos with the band. "That," he says, "started the ball rolling."

Since opening Third Man Records in 2009, White has produced more than 140 records there, by everyone from the Insane Clown Posse to Conan O'Brien. He cherry-picked the best musicians from those sessions to back him on Blunderbuss, forming separate male and female squads to attack each track - Ruby Amanfu, his backup singer on the single "Love Interruption," had worked with him on a 45 by bluesman Seasick Steve, and he poached monster drummer Daru Jones from Detroit rapper-producer Black Milk.

"I wasn't even aiming to make an album," White adds. "But then things started really cookin'. And when it's cookin' I just want to
