12 The meeting was convened, pursuant to notice, at 13 2:10 p.m. in room 215, Dirksen Senate Office Building, 14 Hon. Ron Wyden (chairman of the committee) presiding. 15 Present: Senators Rockefeller, Schumer, Stabenow, 16 Cantwell, Nelson, Menendez, Carper, Cardin, Bennet, 17 Casey, Warner, Hatch, Crapo, Roberts, Isakson, and 18 Portman.

OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. RON WYDEN, A U.S. SENATOR FROM
 OREGON, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

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4 The Chairman. The committee will come to order. 5 In the interest of the time of all Senators, Senator 6 Hatch, when he arrives, and I will make brief opening 7 statements, and then I hope that we can quickly move to 8 the votes.

9 Today we are going to consider three nominations: 10 Sylvia Matthews Burwell to the be the Secretary of the 11 Department of Health and Human Services; Stefan Selig to 12 be Undersecretary of Commerce for International Trade; 13 and Darci Vetter to be Chief Agricultural Negotiator at 14 the Office of the United States Trade Representative.

Ms. Burwell is highly qualified and well-respected by Democrats and Republicans in government and in the private sector. Early last year, the Senate confirmed her nomination to be Director of the Office of Management and Budget by a vote of 96 to zero. And by all accounts, Ms. Burwell's confirmation process this time around has only reinforced that strong bipartisan support.

My view is that she will hit the ground running at the Department of Health and Human Services. And obviously, there are significant challenges there to address health care, child welfare, and family services.

That is why it is so important for the Senate to take up
 Ms. Burwell's nomination soon, after the Finance
 Committee does our part today.

I believe Ms. Burwell will work in a bipartisan
manner and will help us forge common ground on
challenging issues.

7 Stefan Selig has an important role to fill, helping 8 American business be as competitive as possible, as the 9 head of the International Trade Administration. He knows 10 the ins and outs of the global economy, and he is well-11 suited for the job.

12 And Darci Vetter, who, I am happy to add, is a 13 Finance Committee alum, will have an important task 14 fighting on behalf of American farmers and ranchers in 15 trade negotiations.

Both of these nominees will help to advance a trade agenda that focuses on creating jobs and a stronger economy for all Americans. I look forward to working with all three of these nominees once they are confirmed.

And I also want to thank Senator Hatch and our colleagues on both sides of the aisle for working with us to get these nominations cleared. Senator Hatch has been extremely helpful, and it is much appreciated.

As we wait for Senator Hatch, are there other Senators who would like to make brief remarks about any

1 of the nominees?

2 Senator Carper. Mr. Chairman?

3 The Chairman. Senator Carper.

Senator Carper. Jay, would you like to speak? Why
don't you go first? Just do not talk about Sylvia
Burwell; that is all I ask.

Senator Rockefeller. I am just so anxious to get
her done here and get her done on the floor, I have no
way of expressing it. Thank you.

10 Senator Carper. Mr. Chairman?

11 The Chairman. Yes.

12 Senator Carper. Jay said his piece on Sylvia

13 Burwell, and could I speak just a minute or so?

14 The Chairman. You certainly can. Senator Hatch is 15 about a minute away. That will be perfect.

16 Senator Carper. That is good.

I am privileged, as some of you know, to chair the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, and I lead that with Tom Coburn. We both think the world of her.

21 When she was first nominated by the President, I 22 noted she had worked in the Clinton administration. And 23 I called Erskine Bowles, with whom she had worked very 24 closely in the 1990s, and I said, "Tell me about Sylvia 25 Burwell." He said, "You mean Sylvia Mathews Burwell?" I

1 said, "Yes." And he said, "I have known people as smart 2 as Sylvia. I have known people who were as good at working with other people. I have known people as good 3 4 enough, you give them an assignment, they will get it 5 done." He said, "I have known people who are as good as б her and different people in individual instances. I have 7 never known anybody who is good as she is in doing all 8 those things."

9 We got to work very closely with her on OMB, the 10 management stuff that she works on Oversight. She is 11 just a joy and a real pro.

12 The Chairman. The Coburn-Rockefeller introduction 13 was resounding, and maybe we can hear a little bit more 14 from Senator Rockefeller on that.

Would you care to add anything, Senator Rockefeller? Senator Rockefeller. I hope that minute passes quickly for Senator Hatch to get here. [Laughter.] There is a distinguished Senator over there, Mr.
Chairman, who wants to say something.

20 The Chairman. Oh, excuse me. Senator Isakson, of 21 course.

Senator Isakson. Mr. Chairman, I took the opportunity during the confirmation in the Finance Committee and in the HELP Committee to seriously question Ms. Burwell over an issue that was parochial in nature to

Georgia, but really commanded someone with a tremendous
 knowledge of OMB and somebody who would be willing to
 take on a tough question.

I just want for the record to show that she did so. She was forthright, and she was honest. I did not support the Affordable Care Act, but I believe with her in place, we will get answers to questions when they are asked, we will get accountability and honesty from the management of the Department, and that is a step in the right direction, and I intend to vote for Ms. Burwell.

11 The Chairman. Are there other colleagues who would 12 like to say anything?

13 Senator Stabenow.

14 Senator Stabenow. Well, if we are waiting for 15 Senator Hatch, I just want to lend my support as well for 16 Sylvia Burwell and share with Senator Isakson my complete 17 confidence that she will be responding to each and every 18 one of us in working with us.

I had a chance to meet with her yesterday. It was a very, very impressive meeting, and I am very excited about her nomination and her taking control as Secretary of HHS.

And also, I spoke about Darci Vetter as the USTR Chief Ag Negotiator before, Mr. Chairman, and she will do a tremendous job in that position. And so all three of

the nominees I think are outstanding, and I look forward
 to supporting them.

3 Senator Warner. Mr. Chairman?

4 The Chairman. Senator Warner.

5 Senator Warner. Mr. Chairman, I just want to add I 6 have known Sylvia for over 20 years, and she has a 7 remarkable list of places that she has worked.

8 I would like to ask Senator Rockefeller -- her first 9 listed employment was as a waitress at Kirk's Home of the 10 Hungry Smile in Hinton, and I wondered if you could make 11 any comment on that establishment.

Senator Rockefeller. Yes. Sharon, my wife Sharonand I honeymooned there.

14 Ms. Burwell. Did you take a rest stop?

Senator Rockefeller. Now, if you can tell me where it was, I would appreciate it. [Laughter.]

17 The Chairman. All right. I will now entertain a 18 motion that the committee favorably report the

19 nominations.

20 [The motion was agreed to and seconded].

The Chairman. We now have a motion and a second. I think what we will do, because Senator Hatch has asked that we wait so that he can be here for Sylvia Mathews Burwell, is move on to the other two nominations. And unless members insist on a roll call vote, we

1 will take a voice vote on each of the two nominations.

2 Is there a request for a roll call vote on either of the 3 other two?

4 [No response.]

5 The Chairman. Hearing none, the committee now will 6 consider the nomination of Stefan M. Selig of New York to 7 be Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade.

8 All those in favor, say aye.

9 [A chorus of ayes.]

10 The Chairman. All those opposed?

11 [No response.]

12 The Chairman. Hearing none, the ayes have it, and 13 the nomination is favorably reported.

14 The committee now will consider the nomination of 15 Darci L. Vetter of Nebraska to be Chief Agricultural 16 Negotiator in the Office of the United States Trade 17 Representative, with the rank of Ambassador.

18 All those in favor, say aye.

19 [A chorus of ayes.]

20 The Chairman. All those opposed, say nay.

21 [No response.]

22 The Chairman. The ayes have it, and the nomination 23 is favorably reported.

Colleagues, we are glad to have Senator Hatch here.Senator Hatch, we are prepared to vote on Sylvia Mathews

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Senator Hatch. Well, thank you, Mr. Chairman.
Sorry I am just a little bit late, but I just wanted to
note that I believe we have acted quickly on this
nomination with a level of urgency that is probably
appropriate for a nomination of this importance.

9 There were some delays in receiving Ms. Burwell's 10 paperwork from the White House, which I believe created 11 more tension and delays on this nomination than was 12 necessary, and I hope that in the future we can get more 13 cooperation from the administration on these nominations, 14 particularly when the hope is to process them in an 15 expeditious manner.

16 Let me just say this. I like Sylvia Burwell. Ι think she is an excellent choice. 17 I think we have a 18 chance of having a really great administrator in this 19 I hope that she will cooperate with the committee. area. 20 I hope she will work with both sides, and I believe she 21 will. I think she has that kind of personality and that 22 kind of capacity. And I very much support her, as I have 23 these other nominees as well.

The Chairman. Thank you, Senator Hatch.And I want to thank you for the cooperation. You

and the staffs on both sides worked very constructively,
 and I appreciate that.

The committee will now consider the nomination of 3 4 Sylvia Mathews Burwell, of West Virginia, to be the 5 Secretary of Health and Human Services. A recorded vote 6 is appropriate.
