

How your lawmakers voted

SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY PROGRAMS

Voting 292-126, the House on Thursday scaled back a bill, HR 5116, authorizing \$86 billion over five years for science and math education, as well as basic science and technology research at federal agencies. This Republican motion shortened the bill to three years, barred new programs, slashed spending, added pro-military items and barred federal employees from viewing pornography on computers at work.

A "yes" vote backed the motion.
