Dear Member of Congress,

On behalf of our faith-based organizations, representing millions of people of faith in all 50 states across our nation, we are writing today regarding the reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). As representatives of diverse faith traditions, we are committed to ensuring that all victims of violence have equal access to justice, strong legal protections and can access the lifesaving services they need to move from crisis to stability. We urge you to vote against House leadership's VAWA substitute bill and support the bipartisan, inclusive Senate VAWA reauthorization bill that recently passed the Senate in a 78-22 vote.

In times of crisis, victims often turn to their faith communities and leaders for guidance and support. Faith leaders are on the front lines each day identifying victims, providing refuge, referring victims and their families to VAWA programs and services, and offering hope and healing. We believe that the reauthorization of VAWA gives lawmakers an opportunity to build upon previous successes and make critical improvements to meet the changing needs of victims and provide more avenues for assistance and support.

Since its original passage in 1994, VAWA has dramatically enhanced our nation's response to violence against girls and women, boys and men. More victims report domestic violence to the police and the rate of non-fatal intimate partner violence against women has decreased by 64%. But violent crimes against women are still perpetrated each day. Despite great progress, more must to done to strengthen federal responses to violence and address the unmet needs of vulnerable victims, including Native women, immigrant women, LGBT victims of violence, and victims of violence on college campuses. We are disappointed that many of these critical protections are omitted from the House VAWA bill being considered this week and ask you to vote against this legislation and work in a bipartisan manner to pass the Senate bill.

Thank you for your steadfast commitment to working with faith communities to support victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. We look forward to working with you to swiftly reauthorize a strong, bipartisan VAWA in the 113th Congress.
