- 450 External power supplies have become regular fixtures in
- 451 homes and workplaces around the world, as we have expanded
- 452 our use of rechargeable batteries to power a wide array of
- 453 electrical products every day. Because these products are so
- 454 common, lowering their power consumption translates into
- 455 substantial energy savings for both consumers and businesses.
- 456 Provisions included in the Energy Independence and Security
- 457 Act started us on a path to efficiency improvement in 2007.
- 458 Earlier this year, the Department of Energy finalized a
- 459 rule to build on the earlier effort. H.R. 5057 creates a
- 460 short-term targeted exemption that will enable the transition

- 461 to more energy-efficient products to proceed in an orderly
- 462 and predictable way, both for manufacturers and for the
- 463 current owners of equipment that utilize an EPS.
- The prior energy efficient regulation included an
- 465 exemption for service and spare parts. This narrow exemption
- 466 enables manufacturers to continue to provide service and
- 467 replacement parts for existing equipment. It allows owners
- 468 of equipment to keep it functioning for the full intended
- 469 life of the product. Without the exemption, time and money
- 470 would be invested, bringing service and spare parts for
- 471 existing equipment up to the new standards. That does not
- 472 seem the best use of resources.
- 473 This Bill ensures the exemptions provided for in this
- 474 legislation will not result in a significant delay in
- 475 reaching the new energy efficiency targets for EPS equipment.
- 476 The Bill provides DOE with the authority to establish a
- 477 reporting requirement to track the number of parts that are
- 478 shipped, and that do not meet the efficiency standard. Also,
- 479 if the Department finds that this exemption is undermining
- 480 the energy savings that are projected under the new
- 481 efficiency regulations, the Secretary can issue a rule to
- 482 limit or rescind the exemption.
- 483 H.R. 5057 strikes an appropriate balance that keeps us
- 484 moving forward on efficiency goals for external power

- 485 supplies, while providing manufacturers and owners of current
- 486 products assurance that service and spare parts will be

- And with that, Mr. Chair, I yield back the balance of my
- 493 time.
- 494 The {Chairman.} Gentleman yields back his time.
- 495 Are there other Members wishing to speak on the Bill?
- 496 Seeing none, the question now occurs on favorably reporting
- 497 H.R. 5057 to the House.
- 498 All those in favor will say aye.
- Those opposed, say no.
- 500 Opinion of the chair, the ayes have it, and the Bill is
- favorably reported.
- 502 Without objection, the staff is authorized to make
- 503 technical and conforming changes to the legislation reported
- 504 by the committee today. So ordered.
- 505 And without objection, the committee stands adjourned.
