Co-Sponsored Legislation

Second District Economic Development Tour

In November, I conducted my 2nd District Economic Development Tour. Making stops in Chicago, Kankakee and throughout the South Suburbs, I heard ideas from business owners on how I can support business growth and job creation in the district. I want to highlight a few of the businesses I visited on my first Economic Development Tour:

- Imperial Zinc, a family owned Chicago business, is the United States' largest producer of zinc alloy. For many years, the company has offered second-chance employment to ex-offenders. According to company president Mark Spellman, the ex-offenders have turned out to be the best workers.

During my visit, I learned the company's major concern is lack of reliable internet service — which is problem throughout the South Side of Chicago. I'm currently looking for ways to help improve internet access to facilitate Imperial Zinc's expansion and attract new businesses to the area.

- **Landaur** in Glenwood produces millions of radiation monitoring devises worn by medical

employees, nuclear power plant operators and military personnel. The company recently developed a wristwatch-like product used by soldiers to detect radiation in the combat fields. Landaur is eager to expand and modernize its plants and I will do whatever I can to support this initiative and protect our troops.

- Nucor Steel in Kankakee produces rebar (reinforcing bar) steel rounds, flats, and angles. Nucor is a Fortune 300 company and one of the largest steel producing companies in the world, providing a necessary resource to a variety of industries. While visiting we discussed the importance of improving our infrastructure to create jobs update the many overdue infrastructure sites across the country.
- CSX in Riverdale is the largest freight railroad transportation company east of the Mississippi. One in five of CSX's employees are veterans and the company has been recognized by GI Jobs as one of the top 10 places in the nation for veterans to work. While touring their facility I learned about many of their local projects and programs they have initiated to hire local and improve the community.

My primary goal as a Member of Congress is to provide more opportunities for residents and businesses. The economic development tour was part of my comprehensive plan to promote economic growth and job creation in the 2nd District.

Cleaning Up Pet Coke Mountains

Pet coke—short for petroleum coke—is a black, sandy byproduct of a refinery in Whiting, Indiana. On windy days, clouds of black sand can be seen blowing from the mounds into surrounding neighborhoods, coating homes and cars. Pet Coke may have the potential to cause respiratory issues for residents.

I recently co-sponsored a bill directing the federal government to conduct a comprehensive study on the health and environmental impacts of pet coke. I also sent a letter to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency expressing my concerns with a permit application submitted by KCBX to expand its pet coke operation. The IEPA denied the permit on November 19. Additionally, the U.S. EPA ordered the two pet coke storage facilities to install nine air quality monitors in nearby neighborhoods.

I want to thank local, state and federal officials for acting quickly to address the pet coke issue. I will continue working with them to limit the amount of pet coke being stored by KCBX and another company, Beemsterboer, until more is learned about the possible health and environmental impacts. And I'm happy to report that, in recent weeks, some of the pet coke has been removed.

I believe the health and safety of the community must always come first and will continue to work to protect residents from the potential hazards presented by pet coke.

News You Can Use: Preparing Your Home for Winter Weather

- 1. Seal drafty windows and doors: Spending a few dollars on weatherizing doors and windows will help you save on energy costs and is a wise investment to keep the cold out and heat in.
- 2. Change your air filter: Replace your air filter every 30-60 days to make sure warm air has a clean path from the furnace to your vents.
- **3.** Lower your water heater temperature: Set your water heater's temperature to between 120° and 125° to save money.
- **4.** Keep vents clear: Move furniture and rugs away from vents so warm air can circulate freely.
- 5. Store window unit air conditioners: Leaving inwindow units will allow cool drafts to come inside.
- **6.** Set your thermostat: If you can, program your thermostat to lower the temperature when you are not going to be home for 8 hours or more.
- 7. Keep fireplace damper closed: When you are not using it, make sure your fireplace is closed to keep cold air from leaking into your home.
- 8. Insulate your attic and basement: Having uninsulated attics and basements makes it more difficult to keep your home warm.
- 9. Keep shades closed at night: Shades help insulate windows and help keep your home warm.
- **10.** Open sun-facing shades: When you open shades that face the sun, you invite in natural heat that helps lower costs.
