Summary

The Recovery and Reinvestment Act (H.R. 1) will:

- > Create 3.5 million jobs across the United States;
- > Provide a tax credits to 95 percent of all working Americans; and,
- ➤ Invest in 21st century technologies and infrastructure.

For Connecticut, this legislation will:

- \triangleright Create approximately 41,000 jobs 8,100 in the First District;
- > Address critical funding shortfalls at the state level and buttress education funding for municipalities; and,
- > Invest millions in programs to aid Connecticut homeowners and renters.
- * Funding: The Recovery Act provides two different types of funding for Connecticut: formula-based and competitive. The Summary section of this document breaks down the formula funding headed to Connecticut in the areas of Education, Energy, Housing and Transportation. The Resource section provides information on how organizations around the state can best prepare for competitive funding that will be applied for and distributed through the federal departments.

Education:

- > **\$97 million** in increased Title I funds.
- > \$136 million in additional IDEA funds.
- > \$545 million from the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund.
- ➤ <u>4.8 million</u> in Education Technology Grants.
- ➤ Qualified School Construction Bonds These are a new category of tax credit bonds for building or rehabilitating schools. Funds may also be used to purchase land for the purpose of new public school construction

Transportation:

- ➤ Over **\$300 million** is allocated to repair Connecticut's highways and bridges.
 - The funding will be dispersed using federal formulas enacted as part of the SAFETEA-LU Authorization.
- ➤ \$143 million for Amtrak Non Security and Life Safety Projects.

o Windsor Locks: \$27,000.00

- **\$8 million** for Security and Life Safety Projects.
- ➤ Nearly \$48 million will be used to modernize Connecticut water systems.
- **\$9 million** for transportation enhancement projects.
 - o East Hartford/Manchester I-84/I-384 Trail: \$2,000,000.00
 - o Torrington Sue Grossman Stillwater Greenway: \$900,000.00
 - o Southington Linear Park: Plantsville to Cheshire: \$3,342,400.00
- ➤ **<u>\$8 million</u>** for Bradley International Runway Rehabilitation Project

In total, the state of Connecticut will receive \$487,480,166 to repair and modernize its roads, bridges, transit and water systems.

Energy:

- ➤ \$63.5 million for Weatherization Assistance Programs in CT:
 - o Weatherization eligibility expanded to 200% of the federal poverty level.
 - o Maximum funding grant increased to \$6,500. This will help an additional 17,000 Connecticut households save on energy costs.
- **<u>\$45.9 million</u>** for Connecticut's State Energy Program to help Connecticut address its energy priorities, conserve energy, and reduce its dependence on foreign oil.
- ➤ \$32.2 million for Connecticut's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants to help states reduce energy costs by increasing energy efficiency while also reducing fossil fuel emissions.

- **\$20 million** for unemployment compensation
- ➤ <u>\$4 million</u> for the Wagner-Peyser Act for re-employment services to connect unemployment insurance claimants to employment and training opportunities that will facilitate their re-entry into employment.
- ➤ \$11 thousand for Workforce Investment Act Youth Activities
- ➤ \$ 4 million for Workforce Investment Act Adult Activities
- ➤ \$15 million for Workforce Investment Act Dislocated Workers

- ➤ <u>\$12 million</u> for the Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program, which allows states and local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime and improve the criminal justice system.

 - o Hartford Hartford Armory: \$981.000.00

Environment:

- > \$2 million for Leaking Underground Storage Tanks (LUST)
- ➤ **\$1.7 million** for CT Clean Diesel
- ➤ \$48 million for Clean Water State Revolving Fund (SRF)

Housing:

- ➤ The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act will invest over \$145 million in housing across Connecticut.
- ➤ The following is a breakdown of how the formula funding will be distributed to both the state, local housing authorities, and municipalities in the First District:

- Note that TCAP grant funds will be allocated to the state housing finance agency, which will then distribute awards on a competitive basis.
- Note also that the Project-Based Rental Assistance funds will be allocated to 140 existing Section 8 contracts in the state for 12 month contract renewals.

American Recovery and Reinvestment Act: Guide to Federal Competitive Grants

The House of Representatives took historic action to help the economy recover and America rebuild. The bold action we took in passing the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 is expected to create or save more than 3.5 million jobs across the country over the next two years. Millions of lives have taken a drastic turn due to the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression and we have invested \$787 billion in the American People to take the first step out of the deep and cavernous hole the previous Administration has left our country in. To ensure that this unprecedented investment in America is spent wisely it will be carried out with full accountability and transparency.

In the forthcoming weeks, federal agencies will be announcing their formula block grant awards and begin reporting their use of funds. In the beginning of May, performance plans will be publicly available, and federal agencies will begin reporting on their allocations for entitlement programs. By mid May, detailed agency performance plans will be made available to the public. Federal agencies should begin announcing their competitive grant applications by May 20th.

Through Congressman Larson's E-Newsletter, "Congress- ConneCTion," Congressman Larson's office will announce grant applications as they are made available to the general public and will schedule Grants Workshops in the 1st District to help put organizations in the best position possible to receive federal funding. In the meantime, to best prepare for the significant amount of grant applications to be announced we recommend that you sign up for email notifications from Congressman Larson's E-Newsletter, "Congress ConneCTion," www.Recovery.gov, www.grants.gov and all specific federal departments that traditionally handle funding that that you are interested in.
