Dear Chairman Pallone:

On behalf of the over 4,000 members of the Laborers' International Union of North America who put their lives in danger to help with the recovery and reconstruction efforts and all the people in the vicinity of the World Trade Center who were made sick when the twin towers fell, I am writing to urge you to vote for the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act (H.R. 847) when the bill is marked up in the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health. This bipartisan bill would provide medical monitoring, treatment, and compensation to emergency responders, recovery and clean-up workers, and community members suffering serious diseases as a result of hazardous exposures resulting from the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

On September 11, 2001 and during the following days and weeks, tens of thousands of emergency workers, construction workers, and others rushed to the World Trade Center (WTC) to assist in rescue and recovery operations. These workers and residents, and others near Ground Zero, were exposed to a toxic mix of dust and fumes from the collapse of the WTC and the subsequent fires, some of which lingered for weeks. Now thousands of these individuals are suffering from serious respiratory diseases and other health problems.

It is essential that the health and monitoring programs in the legislation be funded though mandatory spending. A discretionary program subject to the fluctuations of the annual appropriation process would lead to inconsistent delivery of health care services. H.R. 847 as introduced capped the number of responders and residents who could participate in the program. To ensure that costs are contained, we expect that the manager's amendment will also cap the mandatory spending for the health program at \$5.1 billion over 10 years — the cost of the health program estimated by CBO in its earlier estimate on the bill.

The attack on the World Trade Center was not only an attack on New York; it was an attack on our country. Had the Congress known that the effects of
