Report to New Yorkers from Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney

APRIL 2004

Dear New Yorker,

This Congress is confronting issues that will have an enormous impact on the nation's health and on New York's future. At the top of the list is the struggle to create jobs and to protect Medicare as the growing national debt becomes an increasingly large threat. Please join me at the upcoming town hall meetings listed on the back of this mailing to discuss these issues.

I want to hear your concerns and ideas about the need to create jobs and advance New York's ongoing recovery since 9/11. Since 2001, our country has lost nearly 3 million private sector jobs. The number of long-term unemployed, people without jobs for more than 26 weeks, has tripled since January 2001. Instead of proposing solutions to put Americans back to work, the White House recently supported outsourcing jobs overseas!

I also want to hear more from you about the need to protect Medicare. Legislation that will fundamentally alter Medicare as we know it and turn over health care for seniors into the hands of private companies was signed into law last year. We must have a plan that solidifies the future of Medicare and gives seniors serious drug coverage, not the current benefit that will leave seniors with a \$2,800 gap in coverage, pressuring them to go without coverage for part of the year.

I hope you can join me at the town hall meetings to share your thoughts on how we can get increase good paying jobs and make sure our seniors have adequate health care long into the future.
