

H.R. 3457 - Justice for Victims of Iranian Terrorism Act (Rep. Meehan, R-PA)

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FLOOR SCHEDULE:

SCHEDULED FOR CONSIDERATION ON OCTOBER 1, 2015, UNDER A CLOSED RULE

TOPLINE SUMMARY:

H.R. 3457 would prohibit the President from lifting sanctions on Iran pursuant to the <u>Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action</u> (JCPOA) until the President has certified to the Congress that the government of Iran has paid each judgment against it related to the compensation to the families of victims of Iranian sponsored acts of terrorism.

COST

DETAILED SUMMARY AND ANALYSIS:

H.R. 3457, as amended would prohibit the President from taking any actions regarding the lifting of sanctions against Iran pursuant to an agreement described in the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, (42 U.S.C. 2160e(a)) including the JCPOA, until the President has certified to Congress that the Government of Iran has paid each judgment against Iran entered against it since April 24, 1996. The bill prohibits President from lifting any sanction described in Annex II of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, or the sanctions described in any other agreement related to the nuclear program of Iran that includes the United States. The bill would further prohibit the President from removing a foreign person listed in Attachment 3 or Attachment 4 to Annex II of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action from the list of specially designated nationals and blocked persons maintained by the Office of Foreign Asset Control of the Department of the Treasury, until the President has certified to Congress that the government of Iran has paid each judgement.
