

H.R. 5119 — No 2H2O from Iran Act (Rep. Pompeo, R-KS)

FLOOR SCHEDULE:

Scheduled for consideration on July 13, 2016 under a closed rule.

TOPLINE SUMMARY:

<u>H.R. 5119</u> would prohibit any federal department or agency from purchasing heavy water produced in Iran in any fiscal year; or from issuing a license for the purchase of heavy water produced in Iran.

COST:

No Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimate is available.

CONSERVATIVE CONCERNS:

DETAILED SUMMARY AND ANALYSIS:

H.R. 5119 would prohibit any federal department or agency from purchasing heavy water produced in Iran in any fiscal year; or from issuing a license for the purchase of heavy water produced in Iran.

According to recent <u>news reports</u>, the Department of Energy is planning on purchasing 32 metric tons of heavy water from Iran, worth \$8.6 million. Heavy water has the potential for combining with uranium to produce weapons-grade plutonium. Furthermore heavy water purchases were not a requirement of the Iran nuclear agreement.
