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H.R. 667 — To redesignate the Dryden Flight Research Center as the Neil A. Armstrong Flight Research Center and the Western Aeronautical Test Range as the Hugh L. Dryden Aeronautical Test Range.

H.R. 667 — To redesignate the Dryden Flight Research Center as the Neil A. Armstrong Flight Research Center and the Western Aeronautical Test Range as the Hugh L. Dryden Aeronautical Test Range. (McCarthy, R-CA)

<u>Order of Business</u>: The bill is scheduled to be considered on Monday, February 25, 2013, under a motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill, which requires a two-thirds majority vote for passage.

<u>Summary</u>: The legislation would redesignate the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Hugh L. Dryden Flight Research Center in Edwards, California, as the Neil A. Armstrong Flight Research Center and the Western Aeronautical Test Range as the Hugh L. Dryden Aeronautical Test Range. Any reference in a law, map, regulation, document, paper, or other record of the United States to the flight research center referred to in this Act shall be deemed to be a reference to the "NASA Neil A. Armstrong Flight Research Center". Lastly, any reference in a law, map, regulation, document, paper, or other record of the United States to the test range referred to in this Act shall be deemed to be a reference to the "NASA Hugh L. Dryden Aeronautical Test Range".

<u>Committee Action</u>: The legislation was introduced by Rep. Kevin McCarthy on February 13, 2013.
