


## Crossword Puzzle

## **ACROSS**

- 1. A special convention met in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in the summer of 1787. The United States \_\_\_\_\_ was written and later agreed to by all 13 states.
- 4. Article 1 of the Constitution directs Congress to decide the location of a new "seat of government." A location along the Potomac River was chosen by the first President, George \_\_\_\_\_\_.
