AMENDMENT TO H.R. 3221 OFFERED BY MR. BOUSTANY OF LOUISIANA

In title II, add at the end the following new subtitle:

1	Subtitle D—Energy Security and
2	Foreign Policy Integration
3	SEC. 2401. NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL REORGANIZA-
4	TION.
5	(a) Amendment.—Section 101(a) of the National
6	Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 402(a)) is amended—
7	(1) by redesignating paragraphs (5), (6), and
8	(7) as paragraphs (6), (7), and (8), respectively; and
9	(2) by inserting after paragraph (4) the fol-
10	lowing:
11	"(5) the Secretary of Energy;".
12	(b) Establishment of a Directorate of En-
13	ERGY.—A Directorate of Energy shall be established with-
14	in the National Security Council which shall be the lead
15	United States Government entity in charge of formulating
16	and coordinating the national energy security policy of the
17	United States. The responsibilities of the Directorate of
18	Energy shall include—
19	(1) directing the development of the national
20	energy security strategy of the United States;

1	(2) coordinating an interagency approach to the
2	national energy security policy of the United States
3	with the Department of Energy, the Department of
4	Defense, the Department of State, the Department
5	of the Treasury, the Central Intelligence Agency, the
6	National Economic Council, and other relevant Fed-
7	eral entities, as appropriate, to address the integra-
8	tion of national security, foreign, and domestic pol-
9	icy on the national energy security policy of the
10	United States;
11	(3) coordinating interagency monitoring of
12	international and domestic energy developments to
13	gauge their impact on the national energy security
14	policy of the United States, and implementing
15	changes in such policy as necessary to maintain the
16	national security and energy security of the United
17	States;
18	(4) identifying foreign sources of energy critical
19	to the national energy security of the United States
20	and developing strategies in conjunction with the
21	Department of State for ensuring United States ac-
22	cess to critical foreign energy resources;
23	(5) developing strategies for reducing United
24	States dependence on foreign sources of energy, in-
25	cluding demand reduction, efficiency improvement,

1	and development of alternative and new sources of
2	domestic energy;
3	(6) developing strategies to reduce energy infra-
4	structure vulnerability to terrorist attacks and nat-
5	ural disasters, both domestic and international, to
6	help guard against supply disruptions;
. 7	(7) developing strategies in conjunction with the
8	Department of State for working with major inter-
9	national producers and consumers, including China,
10	Russia, the European Union, India, Brazil, and Af-
11	rica, to minimize politicization of global energy re-
12	sources while ensuring access through global energy
13	markets;
14	(8) developing strategies in conjunction with the
15	Department of State, the Department of the Treas-
16	ury, and other relevant Federal agencies to broaden
17	and enhance the capabilities of the International En-
18	ergy Agency to ensure open energy markets and up-
19	dated cooperative agreements among nations regard-
20	ing development and use of their strategic reserves;
21	and
22	(9) developing strategies with industry regard-
23	ing coordination of industry held reserves of oil and
24	refined petroleum products.

1	SEC. 2402. QUADRENNIAL ENERGY SECURITY REVIEW.
2	(a) QESR REQUIRED.—Every 4 years, during a year
3	following a year evenly divisible by 4, the President shall
4	conduct a quadrennial national energy security review (in
5	this section referred to as a "QESR") to set forth the
6	national energy security strategy of the United States and
7	to establish short and long term goals to achieve energy
8	security. In preparing the QESR, the President shall con-
9	sult with—
10	(1) members of the National Security Council;
11	(2) the Secretary of Energy;
12	(3) the Secretary of State;
13	(4) the Secretary of Defense;
14	(5) the Secretary of the Treasury;
15	(6) the Director of the Central Intelligence
16	Agency; and
17	(7) Congress.
18	(b) Report.—
19	(1) In general.—In a year following the year
20	in which a QESR is conducted under this section,
21	but not later than the date on which the President
22	submits the budget for the next fiscal year to Con-
23	gress under section 1105(a) of title 31, United
24	States Code, the President shall submit to Congress

a report on such QESR. Such report shall describe

the national energy security strategy of the United
States, including a comprehensive description of—
(A) the worldwide interests, goals, and ob-
jectives of the United States that are vital to
the national energy security of the United
States;
(B) the foreign policy, worldwide commit-
ments, and national defense capabilities of the
United States necessary—
(i) to deter political manipulation of
world energy resources; and
(ii) to implement the national energy
security strategy of the United States;
(C) the proposed short-term and long-term
uses of the political, economic, military, and
other authorities of the Unites States—
(i) to protect or promote energy secu-
rity and markets; and
(ii) to achieve the goals and objectives
described in subsection (a);
(D) the adequacy of the capabilities of the
United States to protect the national energy se-
curity of the United States, including an eval-
uation of the balance among the capabilities of
all elements of the national authority of the

1	United States to support the implementation of
2	the national energy security strategy;
3	(E) an assessment of current Department
4	of Defense energy-related vulnerabilities with
5	assessment of capabilities and recommendations
6	for overcoming such vulnerabilities; and
7	(F) such other information as the Presi-
8	dent determines to be necessary to inform Con-
9	gress on matters relating to the national energy
10	security of the United States.
11	(c) QESR FORM.—Each QESR shall be submitted
12	in unclassified form, but may include a classified annex.
